#### **Old Licenses** Are Taboo, **Mulcock Says**

Persons who are operating motor vehicles in New Mexico and working in the state, while carrying out-of-state licenses, are subject to arrest and a fine, Deputy Sheriff J. B. (Buster) Mulcock pointed out this week.

He said some 1948 Texas licenses have been observed here, the owners of which hope to wait until April 1 to apply for New Mexico licenses and then to purchase them for only three-quarters of the year. The new licenses are not due until April 1 in Texas, whereas the deadline for them in New Mexico was Feb. 28,

Deputy Mulcock said. Offenders, whether they are from out of the state or are old New Mexico residents still using 1948 tags are subject to a penalty of \$1 a day since Feb. 28 plus a fine, he said. And besides, he added, they still have to buy 1949 tags.

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## Always Reaching Out

IF AMERICANS would show as much energy and as much application in preaching Americanism and in displaying the merits of our form of government as is shown by those, who seek to undermine our government, there would be less Communism and less Communistic activities in our nation

That, of course, is a pretty well-known fact. But as Americans we go along taking it for granted that everything is fine and permit others which we prefer in that combination to franks. to do things, which we are firmly convinced is their American right and privilege, even though we know they seek to destroy our way of life.

And those, who seek to destroy America, continue their work and their activities even when we know that the Communist party is not a political party but rather it is an organization formed and operating to destroy America.

to accomplish their purpose. They employ everything they can possibly use in their efforts. They reach out as far as they dare to reach in their work and in their program of causing discord, misunderstanding, confusion and dissension.

Recently one minister in the state received a letter from the Teachers Union in New York. This Kids Are Thoughtless letter requested that the minister write a letter to the superintendent in Brooklyn, N. Y., and requested that the superintendent discontinue his investigations and his questioning of one of his faculty mem bers. It urged that the superintendent be requested to halt his inquiries into the life, the beliefs, and the activities of this particular teacher, who has already been given two hearings.

The charges against the teacher is that he has slanted his lessons "pro-Soviet." And the argument is advanced that he is only carrying on the usual discussion of controversial subjects.

Personally we don't believe it is any of our business how the superintendent in Brooklyn runs his schools; how many investigations he makes; and how many hearings he conducts. We believe

ments. One of these is when an employe quits an employer and that employer takes the trouble to file notice that this employe has left their employment.

In such instances they can hold up or halt these payments to the former employe if they were the last employer.

And, as we stated, payments to a former employe can delay the firm earning a reduction in their rate of taxation. And it is the employer, who pays into the unemployment insurance firm-the employe does not pay into this fund. Usually the rate is 2.7 per cent of every dollar paid in wages must be paid in unemployment insurance. The firm can earn over a period of time a reduction in this rate and have it drop down to 1.9 per cent. That is considerable saving to the firms having large payrolls.

And they have their rights-the right to protest the payment of unemployment insurance first because they were the ones, who paid in this fund, and secondly because it does effect their earning of a lower rate if payments are made out of the sums, which they have paid in for unemployment insurance .- O.E.P.

## **Be Kind To Editors Week**

T WOULD BE INTERESTING to see a compila-tion of all of the special days and weeks to which the American people are subjected.

A number of them are splendid ideas, but the thing just keeps growing and growing, until there is a week or day set aside for the observation of almost everything, except, perhaps, "Be Good to Editors Week." Mmmm-it might be well to give that one some thought! But to get back to the original trend of "thought."





#### **Right To Protest**

EVERY EMPLOYER, who is paying in unemployment tax under the Social Security program, and who has an employe quit and who then promptly notifies the state office of this fact, has a perfect right to protest and to halt payment of unemployment insurance.

Many do not know this. Many employers fail to file their notice that an employe has left them; they fail to pay any attention to the notices, which are mailed to them and as a result oftentimes are unable to secure a reduction in the rate which they are now paying under the present pro-gram because of this fact.

There are many instances, of course, where employes are entitled to the unemployment insurance and where they should receive it. There are other cases where unemployment insurance is collected and the former employer has no right to collect these payments.

The program is so set up that the employer can always file his or her protest against these pay-ments. However, there are only some specific cases where they can halt or prevent these pay-

#### Federal Taxes

W MEXICO AND NEW MEXICANS paid in to the federal government in all types of federal taxes for 1948 approximately \$5,790,821 more than they paid in 1947, it has just been announced.

The federal government collected a total of \$56,069,800 in all types of federal taxes during the calendar year of 1948. This compared with \$50,-ceived medical treatment. They 278,979 in 1947.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1948, the total was \$55,320,140 as compared with \$48,116,-166 for the year ending June 30, 1947, \$45,944, 588 for the year ending June 30, 1946, and \$37,-685,763 for the year ending June 30, 1945.

And this sum in federal taxes is actually more by approximately \$4,000,000 than the actual revenues of the state from which appropriations for all purposes must be made.
