Education Standards

SOME YEARS AGO we endeavored to set up cer-tain standards for educators with the thought and intention, of course, of improving education as well as the qualifications of those instructing our boys and girls.

There was a day and a time when a college degree was all that was required to secure a good teaching job in a high school. Today that degree is of little value unless the individual having it has ad a certain amount of instruction in education. The fact that he or she is qualified and has a degree in their subject isn't sufficient.

And so we have reached the point today where it almost requires a master's degree to be a teacher in high school and a doctor of philosophy degree to teach in college.

And as these requirements are being stepped up and as pressure is being applied to require teachers to obtain these degrees we seemingly are forgetting altogether the value of experience. Yet we all know that experience is still the best

And in our program of more and better degrees we seemingly are forgetting to give any value whatsoever to experience. We are ignoring exper-

Certainly degrees in advanced work are a fine thing. Most of us agree that they perhaps raise our standards and vet if we accept degrees in place of experience-we don't believe that we have our val-

It begins to appear to us that we are going to have to backtrack a little; see that we are ignoring experience; give it the place it should have; and readjust these so-called requirements to include some experience or at least give credit for exper-

We aren't doing that today. We have gone all out for degrees and we have lorgotten the value

We know some individuals, who only have ordinary college degrees—some of them may have masters' degrees-and they are doing a much better job than some others are performing with doctors' degrees. They are doing a better job because their years of experience have given them more than another year of college work required to secure the doctor's degree can give. The fact of the matter is that they have learned and acquired more in the 10, 15 and in some instances 25 to 30 years of teaching and experience than they could ever acquire in the extra year or two years of college work.

If we were employing an instructor we would certainly prefer a man or woman with a master's degree and 25 years of experience to an inexperienced individual, who had a doctor's degree. We would prefer them because we are convinced that they would do a better job.

College degrees are fine things. And we are for education but we also are firmly convinced that experience is still the best teacher and that all of the college instruction in the world won't replace

And so it begins to appear to us that we had better do a little revising of our standards; we had better include in them the matter of experience; give credit for this experience and use those, who have acquired far more knowledge by their long years of experience than they could ever secure by adding another degree or two to their names.

Certainly even the schools or colleges will take the individual with the most experience when the degrees are equal but we all know from experience that the even a college degree can't take the place of years of work and study in a particular field.

And since most of us do realize that we have ignored this all important factor of experience in our standards for teachers and instructors, it appears the only wise thing to do is backtrack a little and give it the all consideration it should receive.

Democracy is based upon the right of the people to govern themselves as free men. America's government was founded upon principles which gave the citizens not only control of their government, it's the upkeep.

This latter protection is clearly defined in the Constitution and especially in the Bill of Rights, which contains many clauses restricting the powers of the government and emphasizing the rights of the citizens.

Our democracy is different from other governments and it is the first of its type in that its powers cannot extend into certain institutions and human relations. A person can rise as high as his merit will allow him, without restriction from governmental decrees, and he is at liberty to do as he pleases as long as he does not violate the right of others to do as they desire.

There are certain inalienable rights endowed by our Creator which the government has been forbidden to violate. Among these are freedom of worship and religion, of speech, of the press, of the right to assemble and freedom from want and fear. These are the natural heritage of all human beings and hence cannot be considered as derived from the government, the latter being able merely to reinforce and protect that which has already been granted us.

However, even with all these ideas realized democracy could not work unless there were attached also to this liberty a sense of responsibility. One can derive nothing from the mere realization that he is at liberty to do as he chooses. He must use this opportunity to accomplish the best that he can, being thankful that there is no totalitarian power to restrict his progress. 


