

MDA Launches New Program 'Cell Therapy'

Encouraged by promising laboratory findings, the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) has launched a crash program to develop an experimental "cell therapy" technique as a treatment for muscular dystrophy and related musclewasting disorders, MDA National Chairman Jerry Lewis announced earlier this week.

"No experimental therapy has ever held such tremendous potential for treating devastating muscle diseases," said Lewis. "We're going to pull out all the stops to learn if what works in the laboratory will work for 'my kids."

Lewis added, "I'm asking every American who cares about defeating the scourage of muscular dystrophy to support MDA as never before. To make the dream of cell therapy a reality, this year's Labor Day Telethon, seen on KLBK, Channel 13, must be the most successful ever."

MDA South Plains Chapter President Patty White, stated, "Our fund-raising efforts this year will be dedicated to providing our scientists with the support they need to move full speed ahead in this promising research."

The treatment approach involves injecting healthy immature muscle cells called myoblasts into diseased muscle tissue. MDA-supported research teams at Children's Hospital in Boston and the Montreal Neurological Institute have recently reported success in using the approach in a strain of dystrophic mice. The mice lack the same muscle protein, called dystrophin, the absence of which-due to a gene defect--causes Duchenne muscular dystrophy.


for an unprecedented meeting to discuss future studies in muscle disease patients, according to Jerry Lewis. Preliminary clinical trials, involving a limited number of patients, could begin within six months, he said.

While several problems, including the need for large numbers of myoblasts, must be overcome for cell therapy to become a viable treatment, scientists believe the approach could be effective not only in Duchenne muscular dystrophy, but in all forms of dystrophy and many other related muscle diseases.

MDA supports a worldwide research program to fund the causes of and cures for, forty neuromuscular diseases. It also maintains a nationwide network of 230 clinics providing a wide range of services to people affected by the disorders.

COLLEGE STATION - Ask any schoolchild to name the most important historic site in Texas and he will surely remember the Alamo. Or, perhaps, the San Jacinto battlefield.

Texas A&M University scholars want to add an equally important name to the list: Washington-on-the-Brazos, birthplace of Texas' Declaration of Independence and first capital of the new nation

"Washington-on-the-Brazos State Park receives neither the recognition nor the visitation that a site of its uniqueness deserves," says a report prepared by Texas A&M's Center for Historic Resources.

Researchers at the center were commissioned by the Washington-on-the-Brazos Park Association to develop a long-range plan to increase public awareness of the park and to stimulate increased visitation.

Nancy Volkman, an associate professor of landscape architecture and the principal investigator on the project, emphasized that most people are firsttime visitors and that 30 percent of all visitors come from Houston, which involves a 200-mile round trip. "This information suggests that a better entry and a clear route could encourage more trips and return trips," she said.

1939 **ROSS GOODMAN HAS IRRIGATION WELL FOR 160 ACRES**

R.C. Ireton, local driller, last week completed a good irrigation well for Ross Goodman on his farm about nine miles northwest of Muleshoe.

The well was sent down nine feet, first stratum of water being encountered at 38 feet which was 15 feet thick. The second stratum of water-being sand was struck at 65 feet, continuing on down to the bottom of the hole. The well is cased for 86 feet with 14 inch perforated.

A Peerless, vertical type centrifugal pump will be installed, propelled by a Ford V-8 commercial-type motor, and Mr. Goodman expects to have about 160 acres, planted in cotton, grain sarghums and alfalfa under irrigation this year.

ANNOUNCED Plans for a dial telephone system at Muleshoe were announced today by G.D. Shelley, District Manager for Southwestern Associated Telephone

After the City Council has approved plans and rates for dial service, the telephone company will make a canvis of suscribers to determine wheather they want dial service and are willing to pay the rates necessary Shelley said that if 70 percent approved of the new type service and rates, final plans would be made.

1959 **BAILEY RANKS 12th IN BALES GINNED IN TEXAS FOR 1958**

Bailey County ranked 12th in the state in the total bales of cotton ginned for the 1958 crop, according to a report issued this week by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census. Bailey County had an official total of 90,927 bales from the 1958 crop, an increase of 18,386 bales over the official 1957 crop figure compiled by the Bureau. Counties in Texas with more

than 90,000 bales included: Cameron, Crosby, Dawson, Floyd, Hale, Hidalgo, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Reeves and Terry.

Total ginnings for the state for the 1958 crop was 4,241,599 bales, an increase over the 3,600,836 of the previous year.







Swine producers from the South Plains and Far West Texas will gather here April 10 for a short course which will examine common production problems and present some possible solutions.

The training will begin at 7 p.m. in the Seminold Civic Center. It will be presented by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an educational arm of the Texas A&M University System. The program is free and is open to all swine operators.

The program will be led by Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, Extension Service veterinarian from College Station, and Dr. Ivan Munennink, veterinarian from Andrews. Among the items to be covered are vaccination and preventive health measures, and a television presentation and live demonstration of artificial insemination techniques.

Holst's suite is considered the cornerstone of a number of works written by British composers for concert band. Composed in 1909, it is one of the few band originals that have been transcribed for symphony orchestra (the reverse process being more common.)

As the name suggests, "Elegy" is solemn in nature. It was the fourth of five band compositions written by Chance before his accidental death in 1972.

"I don't want to see state taxes turn into a burden for folks who can't get to a field office. Our visits are a service we're happy to provide to Texas taxpayers," Bullock said.

Jim Chauncey, Enforcement Officer, from the Lubbock Field office will be at the Bailey County Courthouse, Commissioner's Courtroom from 10 a.m. to noon. Bullock said the public is welcome and there is no charge.

"I'm sending my employees out to help people with questions, filling out forms, and working out problems on a local, one-to-one basis. There's some things you just can't do as well over the phone or through the mail," Bullock added.

Muleshoe area taxpayers who can't attend the courthouse visit can still get individual tax assistance by calling the Comptroller's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-252-5555 from anywhere in Texas.

The Lubbock office, headed by David Cain, serves 19 counties, including Bailey County.

Texas Official Outlines Water Management Issues

Depth to water measurements taken by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 reveal an average decline of about one half foot in the groundwater levels of the Ogallala Aquifer in the Water District's 5.5 million acre service area during 1988.

Very poor soil moisture conditions prior to spring planting coupled with below average precipitation over most of the area during the growing seasons caused irrigators to apply larger and more frequent irrigations than normally required. This heavier pumpage reversed the trend of the previous three years where water levels were stable in 1985; rose 0.5 of a foot in 1986 and rose 0.9 of a foot in 1987.

These depth to water measurements are taken from a network of 1.012 observation water wells scattered across the 15-county Water District service area and are used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage within the Ogallala Aquifer. Since the majority of these irrigation wells are operational, Water District Technical Division staff members take depth to water measurements during January and February in an attempt to allow water levels to stabilize from the previous

irrigation season. By comparing the 1988 depth to water measurements with those taken from the observation well network during January 1987, staff members were able to note the change in groundwater levels.

The 1988 depth to water measurement data reveals average annual declines in nine of the 15 counties within the High Plains Water District. The largest decline was noted in that portion of Hale County within the Water District, where groundwater levels declined an average of 1.48 feet.

Other groundwater declines were noted in Castro County, 1.45; Deaf Smith County, 1.42 feet; Parmer County, 1.24 feet; Floyd County, 1.08 feet; Potter County, 1.03 feet; Lamb County, 0.75 of a foot; Randall County, 0.31 of a foot; and Lubbock County, 0.23 of a foot.

The remaining six counties within the Water District showed a rise in groundwater levels during 1988. Hockley County recorded the largest rise in groundwater levels with a 0.86 of a foot average increase. Other counties showing groundwater level rises include Cochran County, 0.53 of a foot; Armstrong County 0.46 of a foot; Lynn County, 0.45 of a foot; Crosby County, 0.14 of a foot; and Baileyl County, 0.13 of a foot.

The ten-year average annual change in water levels for the Water District service area shows a decline of 0.39 of a foot per year from 1979 to 1989. However, the average annual change in water levels from 1984 to 1989 marked an increase of 0.06 of a foot.

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 officials commend area producers for improving their water management, which has played a major role in slowing the rate of declilne from the Ogallala Aquifer.

Texas A&M sociologist studies universities' minority graduate programs

COLLEGE STATION - Learning why some major universities are more effective than others in enrolling and retaining minority graduate students is the focus of a new national study by a Texas AXM University sociologist who serves on several national education policy boards and committees.

Dr. Gail E. Thomas has received a \$350,900 grant from the Graduate Record Examination Board to assess the progress of top doctoral institutions ir. recruiting and retaining U.S. graduate students who are black and Hispanic.

"We are going to focus on six nationally known institutions which can be viewed as role models in higher education," Thomas said. "The institutions that we have selected are concerned aboat the status of blacks and Hispanics in graduate education and are attempting to do something about it."

The two-year project will examine each institution and its environment as well as the policies and practices that enhance or inhibit minority recruitment, enrollment and retention, Thomas said.

"What we're doing should be of interest to educational policymakers at the state and federal levels," she added. "Employers who are constantly seeking 'talented' minorities with higher education credentials should also be interested. I anticipate a larger amount of future research of this type to take place."
