One of the schemes, which is worked more often than any others, is some advertising scheme. And there are scores of these worked over the nation every day.

And they will continue to be worked just as long as we continue to buy them. Practically every one of these schemes is well known to local business people. We recently heard of an Artesia merchant who did just that. He advised the local person with the promoter if she would return to the store he would make an outright \$10 cash donation to the church but he wouldn't buy the advertising being submitted. The promoter didn't like that, of course. They

But we could do considerable to at least discourage if not to stop some of these sucker schemes if we would just refuse to participate in them. We are all glad to donate and contribute our money to a local church movement or a local project but most of us are not willing to donate when some 50 per cent of what we are giving is going to some

We can stop many of these schemes if and when we will stop participating in them. Those who work these rackets won't work in those towns and cities where the merchants have learned to say, "No," with emphasis .- O.E.P.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS ON ALL PLATS AND MAPS OF SUBDIVISIONS WITHIN THE CITY OF ARTESIA OR ADDI-TIONS TO THE CITY OF AR-TESIA, AND PROVIDING FOR MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR ENGINEERING AND LAND SUR-VEYING ON SUCH SUB-DIVIS-IONS AND ADDITIONS, AND REQUIRING APPROVAL OF ALL SUCH PLATS AND MAPS, AND REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE CITY COUNCIL OR ITS AUTHOR-ALL SIDEWALKS AND STREET IMPROVEMENTS, INCLUDING CURB AND GUTTER AND PAV-

SECTION I: All subdivisions or re-divisions of lands within the City of Artesia, and all additions or subdivisions to the City of Artesia, shall be surveyed by a licensed land surveyor in the field, and all block corners and lot corners shall be properly located on the ground with iron pins.

SECTION II: A plat or map of each subdivision within the City of Artesia, or addition or subdivision to the City of Artesia, shall be prepared and the City of Artesia shall e furnished with five (5) white prints thereof, which shall be drawn to the same scale as the City naster map, to wit, 1 inch equals 150 feet. All such maps and plats must be approved by the City Sup-ervisor and must be approved by the City Council, as required by aw, with reference to the continuity of streets and alleys on such maps and plats. All such maps and plats shall show known points of existing adjacent subdivisions or additions to the City of Artesia. and shall show at least one block of all contiguous subdivisions or

SECTION III: The plans, specifications and grades of all proposed sidewalks, curb and gutter and pavement or other street improvement to be done in any subdivision or addition to the City shall be submitted to the City Supervisor prior to commencement of construction, and such plans, specifications and grades shall be approved before any such work is commenced. In submitting plans for sidewalks, curb and gutter and street improvements, proper provisions shall be made for future extension to any existing streets.
