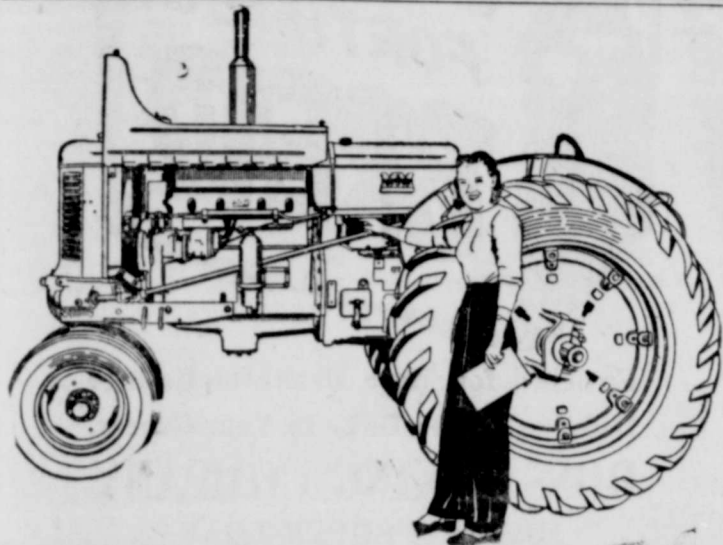

ITEM 1. 1470 square feet 6 inch concrete driveway. Driveway shall be poured in three sections; sidewalk section 5 feet wide; between sidewalk and building and between sidewalk and curb with 1/2 inch pre-molded expansion joint material on each side of sidewalk and between building and driveway slab, driveway from sidewalk to curb shall be curbed on each side.

ITEM 2. Bid on Item 2 shall include Item 1 and 480 square feet, 4 inch sidewalk 5 feet wide and 45 square feet 4 inch sidewalk 3 feet wide.

ITEM 3. Bid on Item 3 shall include Item 1 and 2 and 870 square feet sidewalk 5 feet wide.

GENERAL SPECIFICATIONS
Concrete shall be 5 sacks to the cubic yard and conform to the minimum specifications of the City of Artesia. Finish shall be wood float and brush finish.

Sidewalks and driveway shall be constructed to grades established by the City Engineer and subject to the inspection of the Building Inspector and approval at completion of job.

Bids per square feet shall include removing old curb and all excavation and fill. All fill shall be compacted to eliminate sinking of driveway or sidewalk.

Sidewalk shall have 1/2 inch pre-molded expansion joint material for every 50 feet of sidewalk and also at point of contact with curb. Pit run sand and gravel will not be used.

Bid items can be varied 10 per cent as to quantity by the City Council and any variation over 10 per cent has to be in writing, signed by both parties.

Payment will be made on completion of the work and will be based on final measurement of square feet of driveway or sidewalk in place at time of completion.

The City Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

a fixed fee, percentage, or consideration other than wages must have a contractor's license.

To obtain a license, the applicant must fill out an application blank and mail it with the fee to the State Contractors' License Board, Santa Fe. It will then be necessary to take an examination to qualify as being capable of doing the work which he is desirous of contracting. These examinations are given every three months at Santa Fe. The next examination will be given on Aug. 20. However, a special examination for all kinds of contracting will be given in Clovis on August 13. The examination is written, but is of a practical nature, designed to show an applicant's fitness to handle work in the line that he specifies.

Because of this qualification, by examination and by references on the application, the public has more assurance that in dealing with a licensed contractor they will receive better work and more value per dollar spent. The law was written to raise the standards of construction in general and increase the public safety, health and well-being.

The Contractors' License Board is composed of three non-salaried members, all contractors, each representing a different branch of the business. This board, with the aid of field representatives scattered over the state, enforces the contractors' law and the state building code.

A second group of contractors composes the advisory board. While this board is not completely organized, each member will represent a community of 5000 or salary, but will receive expenses

salary, but will receive expenses when necessary to travel to a meeting place. Each local member will dispense information on the state law as much as possible and will pass complaints and information on to the field representative or to the State Board direct.

The advisory board members will inform the contractors' board as to local conditions in each community, also will advise executive action desired.

A contractor's license may be revoked when cause is proved. Some reasons are failure to complete contract, failure to comply with the building codes and the like. Application blanks and information may be obtained from the State Contractors' License Board, Box 1179, Santa Fe or from Don C. Farver, field representative, 404 East Eighth Street, Clovis.

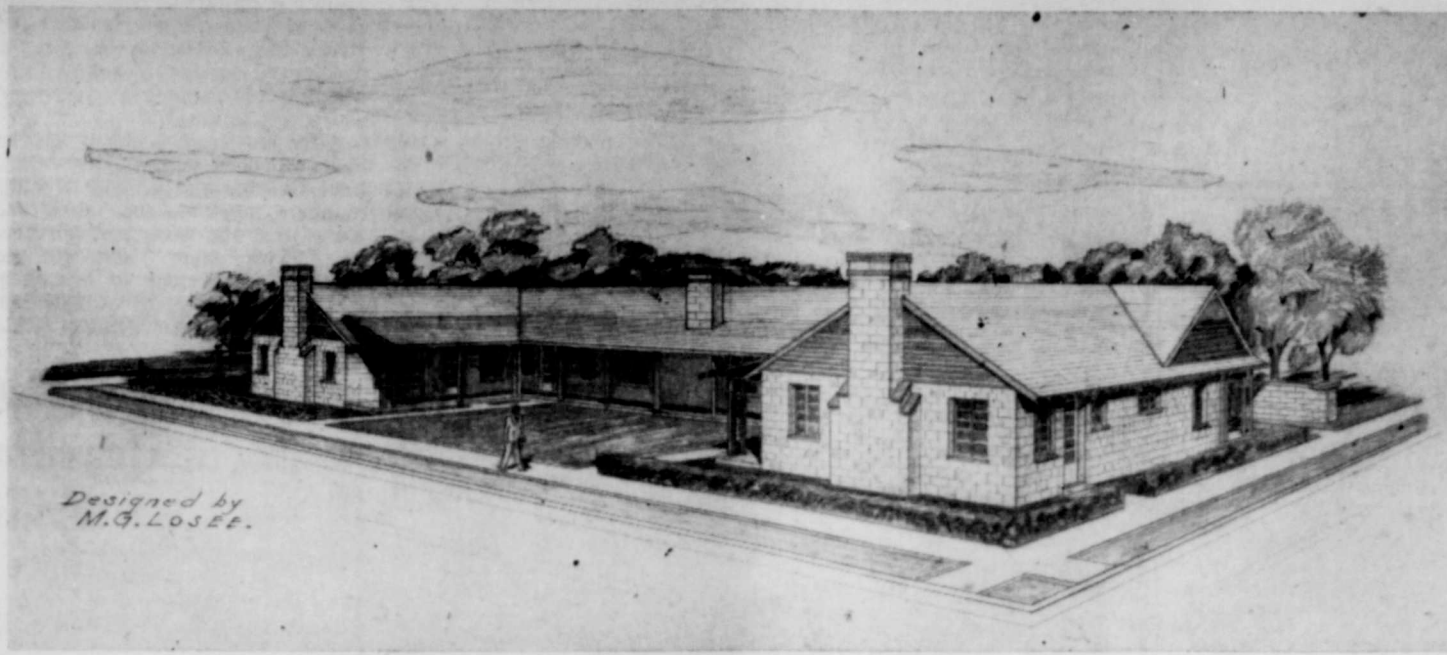

Woods Apartments, Twelfth and Main Streets, Near Completion



Nearing completion are the Woods Apartments at 12th and Main Streets, the first complete apartment building ever built originally as such in Artesia and believed to be the finest and most modern building of its kind in the state of New Mexico.

The beautiful new structure is owned by Mrs. A. T. Woods and was built for her by Losee & Company, whose head, M. G. Losee designed it. It will be ready for occupancy soon, with an open house planned.

In general, the apartment building is in the shape of a "U" with an apartment at each tip, one each at the two "L's" and a fifth in the center of the "U" which faces to the west on 12th Street, giving an unobstructed view across the school park north of Morris Field.

The apartments at the tips of the "U" have one bedroom each, while the others have two each. However, the second and fifth apart-

ments or those at the two "L's" are so arranged that by means of two doors, one on each side of the sill, each can be made into two one-bedroom apartments, each with its own bath and the larger complete with kitchen, the smaller, a bachelor apartment without kitchen.

The first, third and fifth apartments have fireplaces, all equipped with gas outlets.

However, each of the apartments has its own combination heating and air-conditioning unit, even the sections which can be made into bachelor apartments.

Likewise service meters for each apartment are separate and are to the rear of the building on a masonry wall, so occupants need never be bothered by meter readers. And seven wells have been constructed in the same area for the servicing of water softeners for those tenants who wish to obtain such service. For any of the utilities or services, the bachelor apartment

may be tied in with its parent apartment or through separate meters.

All five of the kitchens are equipped alike, with prefabricated metal cabinets and working shelves and electric ranges. In each is space for refrigerators up to 10-cubic foot capacity. The kitchen floors are covered with rubber tile. Each has an exhaust fan.

Likewise the seven bathrooms are similarly equipped and all have combination tub and shower units. The walls and floor are of tile and built into the wall of each bathroom is an electric heater for use if needed.

One of the striking features of the building is the ample closet space, for it seems wherever one turns, there is another closet. The same is true of electric outlets, which are found every few feet along the walls, not only near the floor, but higher up for the lighting of pictures. And more electric outlets are found by each front door on the front porch, which extends the entire distance of the inside of the "U". These are in addition to the porch lights.

The entire building has steel-sash windows.

In each apartment are two telephone inlets for a telephone or telephones, giving the occupants a choice of position.

The building is of masonry construction, with pumice insulation in the walls. And the ceiling is insulated with rock wool. Floors are concrete, covered with asphalt tile.

The porch floors are of polished red concrete and the roof is covered with hand-split shake shingles.

Losee said the yard will be landscaped in the near future, setting off the entire picture.

EJECTOR SEAT SCORES FOR BRITISH PILOT

London (AFPS)—Quick thinking, plus the use for the first time in Britain of a pilot's ejector seat, is credited with saving the life of a British test pilot flying a 500-mile-an-hour jet plane.

In a recent test flight the pilot, realizing that his plane was about to crash, pulled a protective screen over his face, automatically setting off an explosive charge that catapulted him 60 feet into the air. He landed, unharmed, by parachute.

Air National Guard Near Top Strength

Washington (AFPS)—The basic organization of the Air National Guard has been completed, with Federal recognition of the 147th Fighter Squadron, ANG.

A recent announcement, issued by Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, Chief of Staff for the Air Force, and Maj. Gen. Kenneth F. Cramer, Chief of the National Guard Bureau, said that the present strength of the Air National Guard (based on figures of May 31), is 40,997 officers and airmen. This is 69.0 per cent of the authorized strength of 59,274 officers and airmen for which the target date is June 30, 1951.

The organization, composed of 514 Air Guard units are distributed in the 48 states, the District of Columbia, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Headquarters of the 12 Wings of the Air National Guard are at Spokane, Wash.; Alameda, Calif.; Burbank, Calif.; Denver, Colo.; Houston, Tex.; Chicago, Ill.; Marietta, Ga.; Columbus, Ohio; Harrisburg, Pa.; Boston, Mass.; St. Louis, Mo.; and White Plains, N. Y.

Some 72 fighter squadrons and 12 light bombardment squadrons of the Air Guard are now operating from 78 municipal, state or Federally owned installations.

Yarmouth, England (AFPS)—Motherhood is a new experience for E. J. Longcroft, ex-Staff Sgt. of World War I—but it is paying off.

Compensation To Veterans Based on Conditions

Many of the questions received by the Veterans Administration concern disability compensation—whether a veteran is eligible and how much he is entitled to. Compensation is a monthly payment made to eligible veterans to

compensate for disabilities that resulted from or were aggravated by their service in the armed forces. To be eligible for compensation, a veteran must meet several conditions. For a World War II veteran, these conditions are:

1—He must have served sometime between Dec. 7, 1941 and Dec. 31, 1946; he must have been discharged or separated under conditions other than dishonorable; his present disability must be the result of an injury suffered or disease

contracted, in line of duty, or the result of an injury or disease made worse by his military service; his disability must have been incurred before July 25, 1947 and these injuries or diseases must not be the result of the person's own willful misconduct.

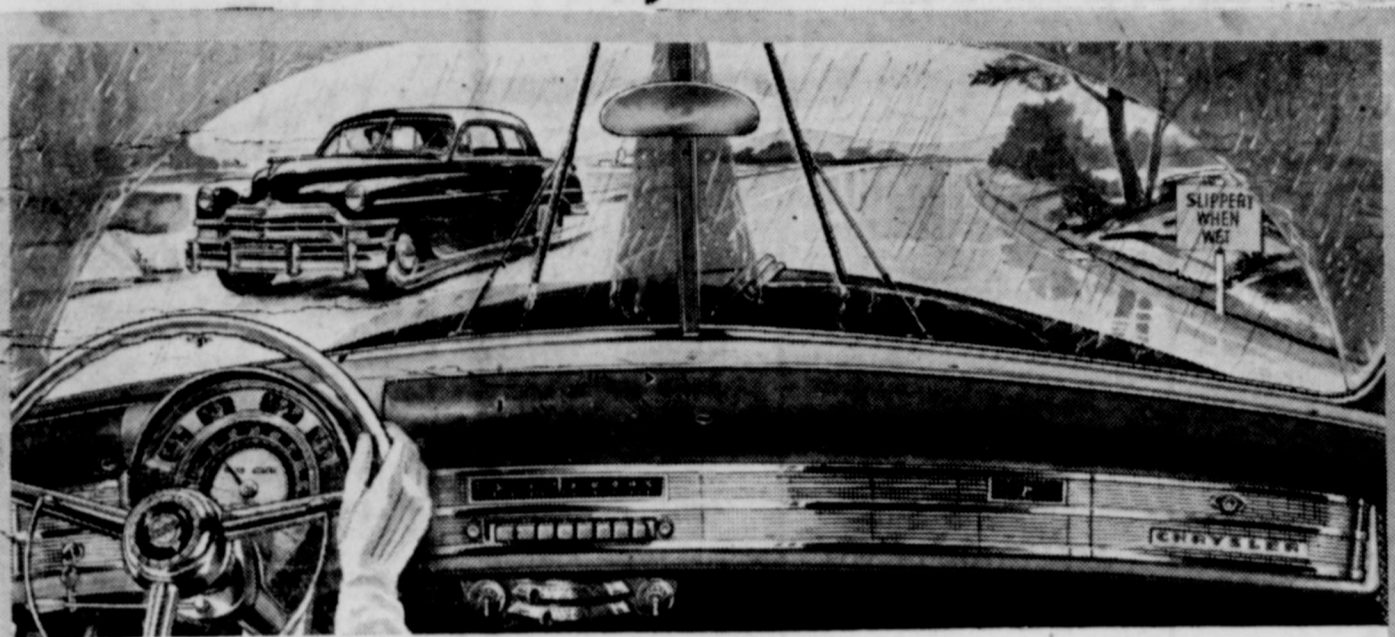
2—The amount of compensation a veteran may get depends on two factors, whether the veteran is entitled to compensation at "war-time" or "peace-time" rates and the percentage of disability. Peace-

time veterans are those whose service did not take place during time of war. Rates for these veterans are 80 per cent of the rates paid to wartime veterans.

A veteran who sustained an injury in service as late as July 25, 1947, is entitled to wartime rates only if he entered the service sometime before Dec. 31, 1946, VA said.

The amount of compensation the disabled veteran receives is based primarily on how disabling the in-

jury or disease is. A VA rating board—composed of doctors, lawyers and vocational experts—studies all the evidence in each case and rates the disability.

Compensation is not paid if the disability is rated at less than 10 per cent. If the disability is 10 per cent or more, \$13.30 per month is paid for each 10 per cent of disability. If a veteran is rated 100 per cent disabled, he gets \$138 a month.

There are two provisions that may make the monthly payment larger. One is the extra amount provided for veterans who are at least 60 per cent disabled and who have dependents. These extra payments range from \$14 a month for one child to \$91 for a man at least 60 per cent disabled and having a

wife, three or more children and two parents dependent on him.

Also, in cases of blindness, loss of limbs and certain other disabilities, a fixed monthly amount is provided. Compensation in these cases may go as high as \$360 a month, plus dependency allowances.

A veteran's compensation is not reduced if he accepts a job, VA pointed out. It may be reduced only if the disability itself is reduced. Many seriously disabled veterans are working.

ORDINANCE 127
 AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS ON ALL PLATS AND MAPS OF SUBDIVISIONS WITHIN THE CITY OF ARTESIA OR ADDITIONS TO THE CITY OF ARTESIA, AND PROVIDING FOR MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR ENGINEERING AND LAND SURVEYING ON SUCH SUBDIVISIONS AND ADDITIONS, AND REQUIRING APPROVAL OF ALL SUCH PLATS AND MAPS, AND REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE CITY COUNCIL OR ITS AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVE ON ALL SIDEWALKS AND STREET IMPROVEMENTS, INCLUDING CURB AND GUTTER AND PAVING.
 BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Artesia, New Mexico, as follows:
SECTION I: All subdivisions or re-divisions of lands within the City of Artesia, and all additions or subdivisions to the City of Artesia, shall be surveyed by a licensed land surveyor in the field, and all block corners and lot corners shall be properly located on the ground with iron pins.
SECTION II: A plat or map of each subdivision within the City of Artesia, or addition or subdivision to the City of Artesia, shall be prepared and the City of Artesia shall be furnished with five (5) white prints thereof, which shall be drawn to the same scale as the City master map, to wit, 1 inch equals 150 feet. All such maps and plats must be approved by the City Supervisor and must be approved by the City Council, as required by law, with reference to the continuity of streets and alleys on such maps and plats. All such maps and plats shall show known points of existing adjacent subdivisions or additions to the City of Artesia, and shall show at least one block of all contiguous subdivisions or additions.
SECTION III: The plans, specifications and grades of all proposed sidewalks, curb and gutter and pavement or other street improvement to be done in any subdivision or addition to the City shall be submitted to the City Supervisor prior to commencement of construction, and such plans, specifications and grades shall be approved before any such work is commenced. In submitting plans for sidewalks, curb and gutter and street improvements, proper provisions shall be made for future extension to any existing streets. Such sidewalk, curb and gutter and street paving shall comply with the

minimum requirements of the City as established by the City Supervisor or City Council as to grade and quality, and shall be inspected during construction by the City Supervisor and shall be subject to his inspection and approval. Any person dissatisfied with any decision of the City Supervisor with reference to any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be entitled to appear before the City Council of the City of Artesia and state his objections in writing; and the decision of the City Council on any disputed question shall be final.
SECTION IV: No map or plat of any subdivision or re-division within the City of Artesia, or addition or subdivision to the City of Artesia, shall be approved by the City Council unless such map or plat complies with the provisions of this Ordinance, and further with the provisions of law, and compliance with the provisions of the Statutes now in force or hereafter provided.
SECTION V: In the event any person, firm or corporation constructs any sidewalk, curb and gutter or street improvements without complying with the provisions of this Ordinance by submitting the plans, specifications and grades to the City Supervisor and obtaining his approval thereon, then the City of Artesia shall not assume any obligation whatsoever to repair or maintain or service said streets, sidewalks or curb and gutter; and in the event such improvements are so constructed without being approved by the City Supervisor, the City of Artesia may require such sidewalk, curb and gutter and street improvements to be removed and replaced with sidewalk, curb and gutter or street paving which meets the requirements of the City of Artesia as to grade and quality.
SECTION VI: This Ordinance shall be published once in the Artesia Advocate, a legal newspaper, and shall be effective five (5) days after its publication.
