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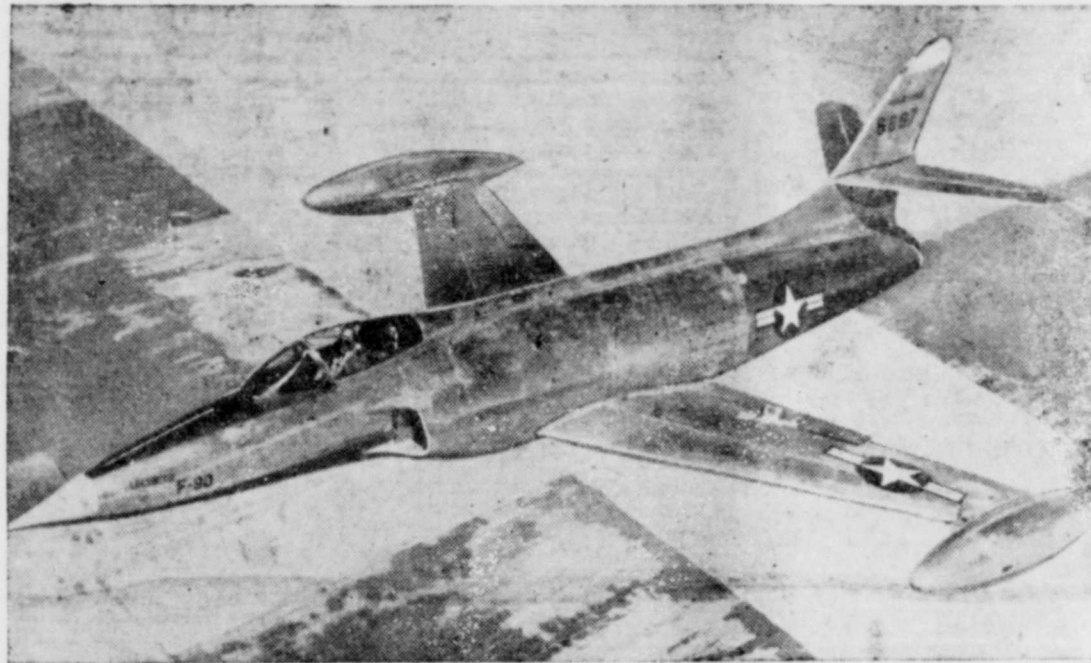

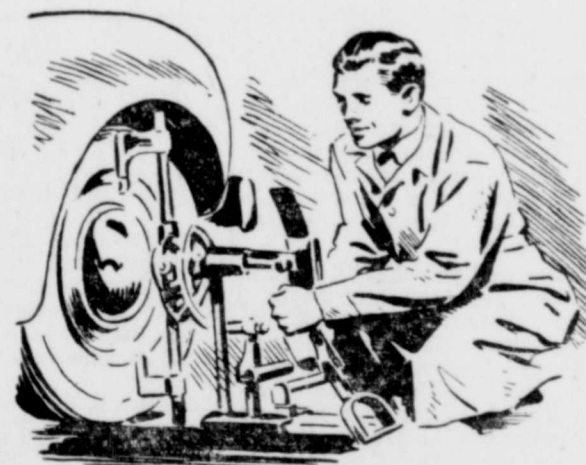

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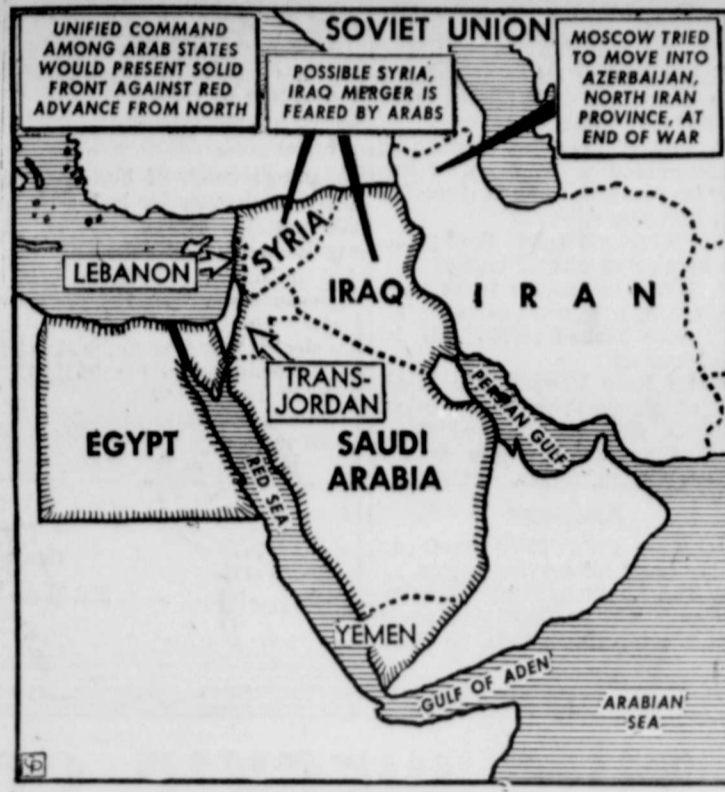


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ARABS CONSIDER MERGING ARMIES



SEVEN ARAB LEAGUE states—Egypt, Lebanon, Syria, Iraq, Trans-Jordan, Saudi Arabia, Yemen—are considering a mutual defense treaty with a unified supreme command. An economic treaty is a possible adjunct to such a pact among the strongly anti-Communist states. Possible merger of Syria and Iraq is a separate problem faced by these states, many of whom fear such a possibility. Egypt fears it on the grounds it would present a rival sphere of influence. Iraq is rich in oil, and is thus an interest of the western world.

cent who has a wife but no children, will receive \$10.50 additional per month. For one child an additional \$7 monthly is allowed. A veteran with a 50 per cent disability, a wife and three or more children will receive \$28 additional monthly. If 400 veterans establish their eligibility to additional payments, this will mean an estimated \$5000 additional monthly to New Mexico veterans.

3. Raise the rate on compensation for World War I veterans with "presumed" service-connected disabilities to the rate currently being paid to veterans whose disabilities are determined to be directly service connected.

(VA is unable to estimate how many New Mexico veterans come under the terms of this provision. The number is not believed large.)

4. Establishes new progressive ratings for veterans with arrested cases of tuberculosis. It provides for 100 per cent ratings for the first two years following the date the disease was arrested. For four years after that the rate is set at 50 per cent. The law also fixes disability ratings for longer periods, and requires veterans to submit to examination and to follow prescribed treatment. Failure to do so may result in a veteran's rating being reduced from 100 per cent to 50 per cent during the two years following the arrest of the disease.

(The above provision will materially affect the status of many New Mexico veterans, VA said, but no accurate estimate of the number of veterans involved would be possible. Many of the 1528 veterans now rated as 100 per cent may be entitled to additional compensation under the two and four-year provisions.)

5. Increase the death compensation to wartime widows with one or more children.

(Death compensation is not paid by the regional office in Albuquerque, so no information on

the number of eligible widows is available.)

6. Liberalizes present rules barring payment of compensation for injury or disease incurred, not as a result of own willful misconduct, while under military or civil confinement. It holds such confinement to be "in the line of duty" providing a court martial sentence or dishonorable discharge is remitted, or in cases of civil confinement, when the offense does not involve a felony where sentence is imposed.

7. Provides for an 8.7 per cent increase in peacetime rates for service-connected disabilities, as these are fixed by law at 80 per cent of wartime rates.

(Peacetime rates now are being paid 237 New Mexico veterans, VA said.)

In figuring the amount due under the new increase, VA advised veterans to divide their disability rating by 10 and multiply the resulting figure by \$15. Thus, a veteran with a 70 per cent disability would multiply \$15 by 7, as each 10 per cent rating is now worth \$15 a month instead of \$13.80. The new total would be \$105 against \$96.

VA warned veterans against figuring the increase on present payments for dependents or on statutory award such as for amputees. These remain the same.

Enforcement Of 'Share-Expense Law' Deferred

Enforcement of the new "share-expense ride law," which will affect many oil-field workers of North Eddy County, has been deferred to Nov. 16 by the State Corporation Commission, in order to clear the way for a speedy court test of the law's constitutionality, it was announced by Dan Sedillo, commission chairman.

Under the law, passed by the last State Legislature, it would be unlawful for workers or others to share expenses for transportation in a private vehicle, without payment of a \$10 fee. Sedillo said the order was being entered to hasten the test and determine if the law is valid. Administrative expense already has been eaten into commission funds and it is important to find out whether the law will stand, he added.

The Associated Building Contractors of New Mexico will give the law its court test, it was announced Tuesday.

A majority statement by Sedillo and Commissioner Eugene Allison said:

"Upon competent legal advice the commission believes that this

method will accelerate the proceedings and enable it to learn what the court's decision may be. In this manner, the way will be clear for a speedy test suit. "The corporation commission and the attorney general will cooperate in every way to secure an early decision as to constitutionality of the act."

Approximately 613 Buck Antelope Are Taken During Season

Approximately 613 buck antelope were taken by hunters during the recent split season in New Mexico, late Game Warden Elliott Barker said.

From the record to the Department of Game and Fish, according to Barker, it appears that about 53 per cent of the 879 hunters who turned out managed to get their buck. The first half of the season ran from noon Oct. 7 to sunset Oct. 21, while the second half began at noon Oct. 21 and closed at sunset Oct. 23.

There were no hunting accidents reported. The Magdalena appears to have had the biggest turnout with 147 hunters killing a total of 97 antelope. The biggest success as far as percentage went was the Lovelace area, where 9 hunters ran up a 97 per cent record by taking 38 antelope. The Bernalillo Range and the Brownfield area tied at low score with 9 hunters in each taking only four bucks.

"From all reports," Barker said, it looks as though the antelope season was a success. At least the 8 per cent who got their bucks will agree with me."

About Half Of Cotton In North Eddy Is Ginned

With the ginning of 14,463 bales of cotton up to Thursday by the five North Eddy County gins, it was estimated about one half of the crop has been picked and ginned.

The majority of the gins had ginned up only a small amount of unginning cotton was on hand. Prospects at this time are that approximately 29 or 30 thousand bales will be the total for the 1949 season in North Eddy County, which is an all-time record.

However, observers said further the Pecos Valley, in Chaves County, the crop will be short of a year's figure, from indications of the weather cleared cotton has been progressing in a better manner, with Mexican gins doing the greater part of the picking. Veterans Will Reap Large Financial Harvest Under Law Recently Signed

New Mexico veterans will reap a large financial harvest from the law signed recently by President Truman, which increases all service-connected disability compensation and provides for additional payments to veterans, their dependents, and beneficiaries.

The Veterans Administration Administration estimated increases under the law which becomes effective Dec. 1 and will be reflected in checks due Jan. 1 to more than 10,000 New Mexico veterans, may well run \$64,000 additional monthly or as much as \$800,000 annually.

Gene A Robens, manager of the VA regional office in Albuquerque pointed out that while such an annual increase in payments would be well above the national average, the figure is not believed inconsistent because of the large number of veterans in this state with arrested cases of tuberculosis. The new law materially liberalizes payments possible to convalescent tubercular veterans.

The new law known as Public Law 339:

1. Provides for a blanket increase of 8.7 per cent disability compensation payments. (More than 10,000 New Mexico veterans currently are receiving monthly compensation payments totalling \$550,000. Although the increase does not apply to statutory awards — only to rated disabilities — it will mean that New Mexico disability payments will rise an estimated \$35,000 monthly.)

2. Provides additional compensation for veterans with dependents who are rated 50 per cent or more. Heretofore only veterans with dependents who were rated 60 per cent or more disabled were eligible to receive additional compensation.

(At present approximately 1700 of the state's 2348 veterans with 60 per cent or more disability ratings are receiving additional compensation for dependents. The new law can affect 539 additional veterans who are rated 50 per cent

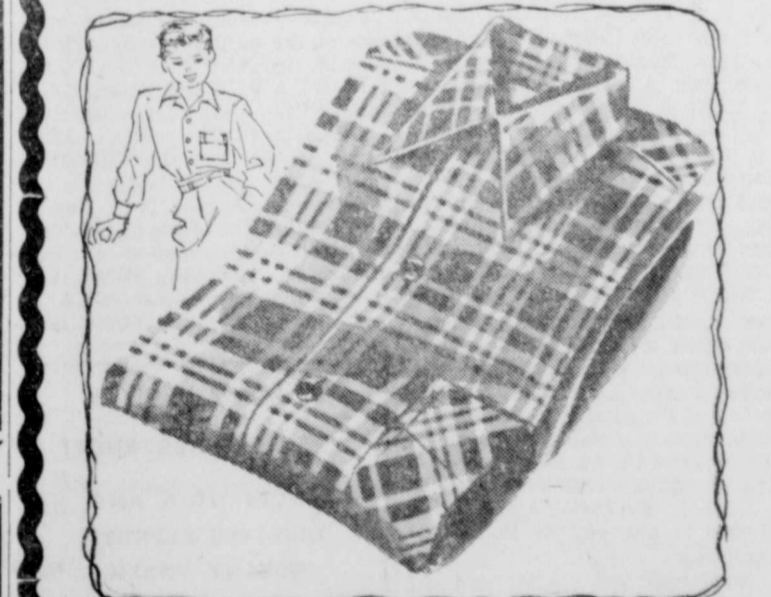

And further, if it dials the wrong number it tells the person answering the phone to call the Fire Department.

Warden Barker Explains Long Hunting Season At Vermejo Park

"Lack of understanding of the actual facts of the wildlife program at Vermejo Park appears to be responsible for some criticism of the State Game Commission's action in establishing a 42-day big game hunting season there," asserted State Game Warden Elliott S. Barker. He then gave the following explanation of the situation at Vermejo Park in order that all sportsmen may be fully informed.

"Elk were stocked on this area in 1908 by the original land owner entirely at his own expense. For years the whole area was under a 'Class A Park' permit which entitled the owner to kill game of all kinds at any time and in any quantity desired. That evil law was amended through the efforts of the Game Department so that it now applies only to areas of less than 3200 acres which are enclosed by a game proof fence.

"The present owner of Vermejo Park, William Gourley, has also acquired adjacent properties, bringing his total ranch holdings up to about 600,000 acres. Unlike his predecessor, Gourley is desirous of building up the wildlife resources on this vast area to the optimum condition possible. He has gone so far as to cut the stocking of cattle by 5000 head below the normal carrying capacity to provide a good and adequate habitat for wildlife. We hear much about the necessity for improvement of habitat for wildlife, but have any of us ever before heard of a rancher sacrificing range for 5000 head of cattle so that wildlife will have a suitable home with plenty of food and cover?"

"Gourley has also agreed to plant many grain feed plots for wild turkeys and to feed both deer and turkeys as needed in winter and to keep predators under control. Also, he is spending many thousands of dollars to re-establish many fishing lakes and his program is to do whatever is necessary to develop game and fish resources to the

most optimum condition possible on his extensive holdings.

"All he has asked of the Game Department is to establish a long-term hunting period that applies generally over the state. In consideration of his commitments for reduction of his livestock by 5000 below normal carrying capacity of the range in order to provide adequate food for game and his commitments for habitat improvement generally and for building up the game supply, the commission established a big game hunting season on his properties from Oct. 10 to Nov. 21. This will permit a more orderly hunt than to have all hunters there during a 10-day period.

"However, in so doing, the Game commission also limited the number of elk permits to 100 and the number of other big game hunters to 150 and provided that only bull elk and forked horn buck deer may be taken. Every hunter, resident or non-resident, must have the regular big game license or elk permit, as the case may be. This take is ultra conservative, for if every hunter bagged his game (and not half of them will) it would mean taking one elk to every nine square miles and one deer to every six square miles.

"The land owner provides horses, guides, houses to camp in and other accommodations and makes a \$250 charge for these accommodations and privileges. Since this is all posted privately owned land, no one can hunt there without the land owner's consent anyway, regardless of the length of open season there. Such has been the situation since 1906, except during a few seasons when the previous tenant permitted special deer and elk seasons there under supervision of the Game Department.

"The wild reports being circulated that game is being ruthlessly slaughtered there are utterly unfounded. Game Department wardens have full and free access to the area and have been urged to fully

inspect the hunting operations and check all their hunting. This is being done and hunting conforms to the regulations as above outlined.

"Last winter when some neighboring ranchers wanted a doe season to get rid of a lot of deer that were feeding on their hay stacks, Gourley hauled several tons of his own good alfalfa hay into the nearby foothills on their property so that the deer would have plenty of hay."

Changes Made In Refuges For Big Game

One big game refuge was established and three others were amended as a result of recent surveys by game technicians, Assistant State Game Warden Homer Pickens announced.

The refuge established, according to Pickens, was the old Manzano Big Game Refuge lying just to the south of the Isleta Reservation in the northern section of the Manzano Mountains. This refuge was re-established after Game Department technicians, in a number of recent surveys, found that the deer population was too low to merit an open season this year.

"The refuge," Pickens said, "is bounded on the north by the reservation, on the east and west by the National Forest boundary lines and on the south by Comanche Canyon. This area becomes a refuge immediately and will be posted with signs by the opening of the big game season."

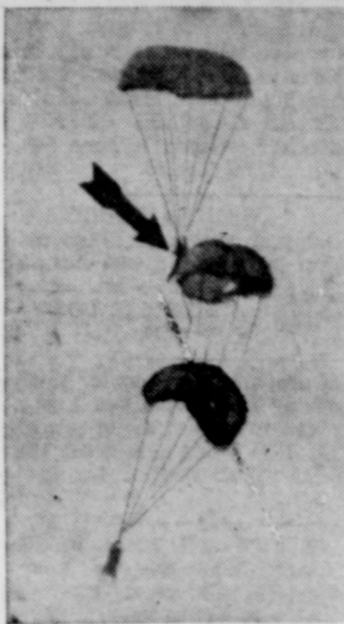
Of the three other refuges amended, according to Pickens, the Peloncillo Big Game Refuge in southwest Hidalgo County, was reduced in size to approximately half of the original area. This was done because it was found that the game had increased to the extent that over-population was possible.

The Santa Fe Big Game Refuge, which runs along the west slopes of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains to the east of Santa Fe, was amended to take in additional area for the protection of the big game wintering grounds and also the recreational areas for winter sports.

The Tequesquite Big Game and Bird Refuge in Harding County east of Mosquero, was also amended to take in additional area for the protection of wildlife.

"It is sometimes difficult for the sportsmen to take when the commission closes an area for a refuge, especially when it is a favorite hunting ground," Pickens said, "but when the hunting pressure becomes acute, as in the case of the manzano area and the big game

man said. He stressed that the present bridge is particularly hazardous in that it is one-way only and there is an unusually heavy amount of traffic over the highway.

The commissioner said that in the program, widening and straightening of the highway was not included at the time the planning committee met last year, but that the replacement of the bridge was given top priority. However, he said, the Chamber of Commerce at that time recommended new highway construction between Artesia and Hope.

He likewise explained why the two miles of proposed secondary road from Highway 285 has not been constructed to tie in with the six miles of blacktop road running south from Highway 83 two miles east of Artesia.

The commissioner said that the original plans as set up and approved were for the two miles of east-west road to be constructed six miles south of Artesia, or at the end of the north-south portion, however, the then planning committee for that area, H. R. Stroup, John Lanning and the late G. R. Brainerd, believing that the road would serve more people if it were constructed a mile north of the original location and running through Atoka, requested that it tie in five miles south of Artesia.

By making the recommendation at that time, when the State Highway Department was ready for bids only on the six miles of north-south road, Commissioner Haldeman said. However, he added, the two-mile section through Atoka has been approved and is now set up for letting next April.

Commissioner Haldeman said that the planning committee, in sitting up primary and secondary projects in June, 1948, recommended new construction on the highway from White's City through Carlsbad and Artesia to the Chaves County line. Some of this work has been completed, including a segment north from Carlsbad and plans have been made for an additional nine miles in the next segment.

However, Commissioner Haldeman said, at a meeting last week, the commissioners suggested to the State Highway Department that the next segment start at the Chaves County line and come south instead.

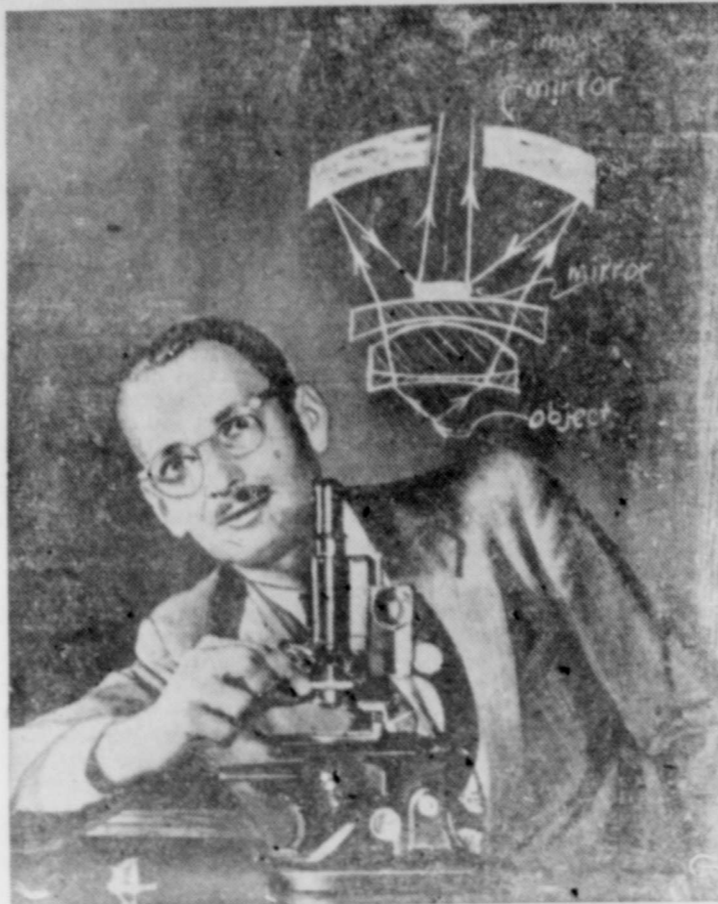

600,000 for loans during the present fiscal year, which ends next June 30. Written into the law is a provision that during the first year

no loans to new companies can be considered until all applications from existing companies already serving in the same area receive final action.

Judging by testimony from small independent companies and mutuals when Congress was gathering testimony on the rural telephone situation, the need of the small existing companies for loans is so great there seems slight chance that any new companies will be able to secure loans during the coming months, unless the existing companies are slow in making applications.

It was announced it is possible that in some sparsely populated rural areas, where economy is of the utmost importance, some organizational arrangement whereby use of the same poles for electric and telephone service can be made. Such joint-use arrangements have been made in the past between rural electric systems and telephone companies.

American Telephone & Telegraph, along with a few of the larger independent companies, bitterly fought the Hill-Page Bill in Congress on the grounds that it would mean subsidized competition to them. Proponents of the bill pointed out that it permits only loans in areas where adequate telephone service does not exist or is not planned for the near future and that the loans do not mean subsidization, as they must be repaid with interest.

Congressmen supporting the bill also pointed out that some such assistance in furthering rural telephone improvement and expansion is a necessity, since rural service has actually degenerated instead of progressing during the last few decades.

lieutenant at the time and who was shortly after appointed captain Captain White has been commanding the battery since Aug. 11, 1948.

The unit has grown from 17 enlisted men at the present time and members of the unit as well as the officers with the battery are constantly seeking new members who wish to make a little extra spending money as well as obtaining better ratings with the National Guard.

But it is hoped that this battery can look forward in the near future to many more men joining up who will help swell the ranks of the local unit to 140 enlisted men, which is the authorized strength of the unit.

The first sergeant is on duty full time at the armory Monday through Friday for anyone interested in learning more of the opportunities of the National Guard. The recent pay increase for the armed forces applies equally to the National Guard. In addition, the guard has a retirement plan as well as other benefits. Being a member of the guard is a good chance for former

Proper Grazing Is Key To Range Conservation

Balancing the number of livestock with the carrying capacity of range is the key to conservation of rangeland, says Larry Emerson, Agricultural Conservation program committeeman in charge of range conservation for Eddy County.

Stockwater dams may be constructed for better distribution of livestock, fences may be built to provide better control of grazing and the range may be reseeded with adapted grasses, he said. If the range is overstocked, however, these measures lose much of their value in conserving soil and water. The committeeman pointed out that it is the vegetative cover on the range that protects the soil, slows down the run-off and protects the watershed against erosion and floods. If the vegetation is eaten off until it no longer can serve as a protection, the dams and fences and reseeding won't hold soil and water.

These practices are effective in conserving both soil and water when they are used along with proper grazing. Emerson said that in arid range areas, grazing off more than 50 per cent of the top growth of palatable grasses starts the range downhill. The palatable species are not able to reproduce themselves. And as these species die out and are replaced by less palatable species, the value of the range deteriorates.

Emerson pointed out that some of the indicators of proper grazing are: Abundant litter between plants, topsoil intact and unbroken, gullies healing, little or no soil drifting, no places where the topsoil is worn through and clear run-off water and no dust when the wind blows. Another practical indicator is the condition of the livestock. Thriving livestock usually indicate properly grazed range.

Don't Take Less Than Support Price On Seed

"Don't take less than the support price for your cottonseed!" This is the advice of the Eddy County Production and Marketing Administration Committee, reminding cotton growers they can obtain a price-supporting loan of \$49.50 per ton on seed with a moisture content of 11 per cent or less, provided they have adequate storage available.

"Although lack of storage space and the possibility of excessive moisture content may appear as stumbling blocks to some farmers who would like to take advantage of the loan, we believe that both problems can be overcome in most cases," says Roy Forehand, committee chairman.

The committee believes that if growers will acquire adequate storage so that seed can be held off the market when market prices are below the support rate, there

is a good possibility that the storage bins will "pay for themselves." "Building materials and prefabricated units are plentiful, and the Commodity Credit Corporation will lend farmers up to 85 per cent of the actual cost of construction at 4 per cent interest," says the committee. CCC storage facility loans are negotiated through the county PMA office in the courthouse at Carlsbad and are repayable over

a period of five years. The other problem — that of excessive moisture content — can largely be solved by the farmer himself, according to the chairman. "If growers will make every effort to gin only dry seed cotton and take proper care of their seed after ginning, the average moisture content can be considerably lowered," Morehand said. "It is quite possible that available statistics on moisture content have

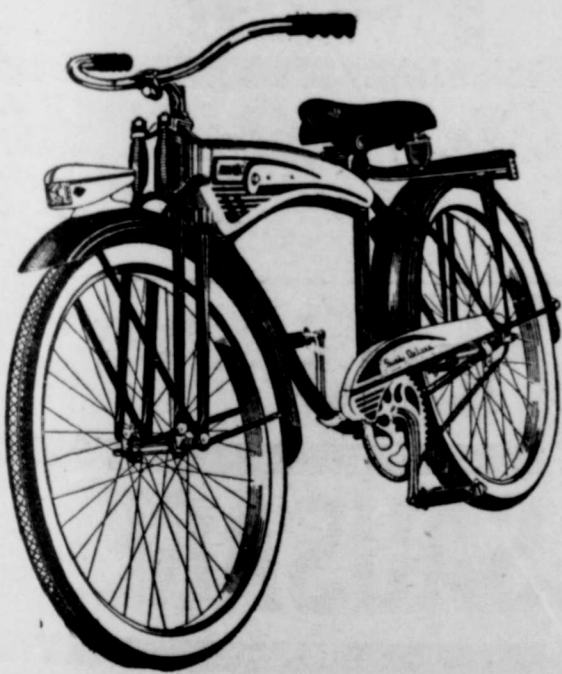

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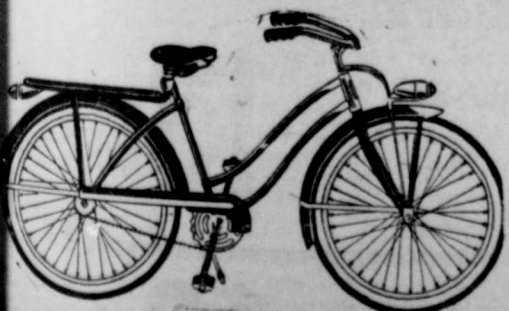

First Aid Kits Necessities For Farm Families

First aid kits can provide prompt and correct treatment of minor injuries occurring on farms or in farm homes. This reminder was issued by County Agent Dallas Rierson, who pointed out that such facilities may save a life or prevent serious infection from injury.

"A satisfactory first aid kit can be made at home and at small cost," he says. "A tight box, preferably metal, such as a cash box or fishing tackle box or even a tightly covered tin can, will serve as a suitable container. The box should be thoroughly clean and well labeled."

He recommended the following

articles for each kit: Rolls of adhesive tape of varying width, sterile cotton, swabs and sticks, sterile white cloth for large bandages and tourniquets, tube of sterile white vaseline for minor burns, scissors, boric acid, compound tincture of benzoin, an accepted antiseptic, aromatic spirits of ammonia.

"Several first aid kits should be provided on each farm so they may be located in the home, the barn, the farm shop and other work areas," he says. "Small kits might well be located on the tractor, combine and other important equipment."

Diverted Acres Pay Dividends

Farmers of Eddy County who turn their diverted acres to a good conservation use may well be making one of the best possible investments in security.

In voicing this opinion, Roy Forehand, chairman of the Eddy County Agricultural Conservation Committee, pointed out that, by using the land taken out of cotton for the building up of humus and fertility reserves, a farmer will be protecting the future productivity of his land, as well as protecting the price of this crop by seeding within his allotment.

Furthermore, the chairman explains, in many instances shifting some of the acreage from cotton to grass and legumes may boost the farm income. The experience of many farmers indicates that grass and legumes used as pasture and hay are often more profitable than the cash crops which preceded them.

"Certainly, with supplies in excess of market demands and bins, cribs and warehouse filling up, it would seem wise to adjust production by shifting the use of some of the land to commodities which are not in such excess," says the chairman. "And it is a real gain if in so doing the land can be built up so that it will become more productive in the future."

"With population in the United States increasing at the rate of two million a year, it may not be many years until the reserves we can build now may be needed to meet the needs of 170 million people instead of the 148 million people in this country now."

Forehand said the Agricultural Conservation Program for 1950 will emphasize conservation practices which may be used to build up soil reserves on the land taken out of cotton. He advises that information on financial assistance to help farmers in carrying out a number of these conservation practices is available at the county Agricultural Conservation Association office.

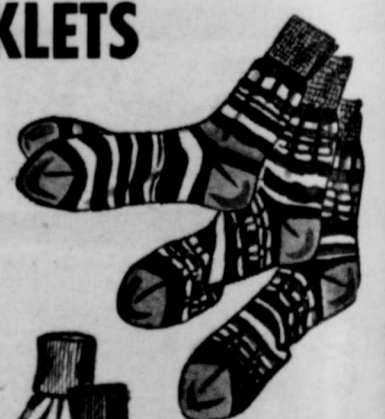
