GAME CONSERVATION throughout the United States has become a serious affair, one which has been taken seriously for only a relatively small number of years.

To the casual observer it would seem that New Mexico with its vast acreage and small population would have no game conservation problems. But the casual observer does not stop to think that thousands of hunters and fishermen from out of the state come here to hunt and fish. And the game and fish are not inexhaustable.

In fact, insofar as fishing is concerned, there would be little in New Mexico today if it were not for the continual operations and efforts of federal and state hatcheries.

We still have game-in fact are building it up -only through a rigid program of protection, conservation and policing.

Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, noted authority, recently made a study of the New Mexico Game Commission and Department of Game and Fish, their organization, policies and activities and laws under when they operate and made recommendations.

Among them was a recommendation that although the Game Department is doing a good job, twice the present revenue will be required to do an efficient job.

Foresee Possible Changes Among Navy's Top Brass Navy May Still Acquire New Giant Aircraft Carrie

TASHINGTON-The Navy-Air Force battle has not ended, at though congressional hearings on the inter-service squabb are over until next Jan. 3.

Two big questions remain: (1) Will the top Navy brass wh openly attacked defense planning as unsound and "immoral" fired and (2) will the Navy get its huge aircraft carrier Units States after all?

The first may be answered soon. Navy Secretary Francis Mai, thews reportedly is moving deliberately now to replace his to subordinates, but he must convince President Truman to take the step.

The second question may not be fully swered until sometime near the end of the 81g Congress' second session. Chairman Carl Vinson (D), Georgia, of the House armed services com mittee has already suggested legislation to give the Navy its super-carrier, thus, in effect, endon ing its bid to carry the atomic bomb.

However, any such legislation would provok a bitter and long battle on Capitol Hill.

Defense Secretary Louis Johnson refused to be

swayed by the Navy attacks on his administ

tion and assured the congressmen he will ahead with plans to effect savings. Actually, Johnson is caught in an econor cross-fire. The legislators earlier applauded his decision to force savings on the military estab lishment by using unification powers given him during the fire

session of the 81st. He finally came up with a proposed \$803 million slash, instead of the three or four billions Congress wanted saved. But, when t Navy painted a black picture of the results of such a cut, the at first, got a sympathetic ear from Vinson's committee.

Although the major part of the reduction would be made in the Navy, Johnson's only other feasible choice is to cut the Air Force which has much more congressional support.

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

If the vegetation is eaten off until it no longer can serve as a protection, the dams and fences and reseeding won't hold soil and water.

These practices are effective in conserving both soil and water when they are used along with proper grazing. Emerson said that in arid range areas, grazing off more than 50 per cent of the top growth of palatable grasses starts the range downhill. The palatable species are not able to reproduce themselves. And as these species die out and are replaced by less palatable species, the value of the range deteriorates.

Emerson pointed out that som of the indicators of proper grazing are: Abundant litter between plants, topsoil intact and unbroken, gullies healing, little or no soil drifting, no places where the topsoil is worn through and clear runoff water and no dust when the wind blows." Another practical indicator is the condition of the livestock. Thriving livestock usually indicate properly grazed range.

Don't Take Less Than Support Price On Seed

"Don't take less than the support price for your cottonseed!" This is the advice of the Eddy County Production and Market-Administration Committee, reminding cotton growers they can obtain a price-supporting loan of \$49.50 per ton on seed with a moisture content of 11 per cent or less, provided they have adequate storage available.

"Although lack of storage space and the possibility of execessive moisture content may appear as stumbling blocks to some farmers who would like to take advantage of the loan, we believe that both problems can be overcome in most cases," says Roy Forehand, committee chairman.

The committee believes that if growers will acquire adequate storage so that seed can be held off the market when market prices are below the support rate, there

Farmers of Eddy County who urn their diverted acres to a good conservation use may well be making one of the best possible investments in security.

In voicing this opinion, Roy Forehand, chairman of the Eddy County Agricultural Conservation Commi tee, pointed out that, by using the land taken out of cotton for the building up of humus and fertility reserves, a farmer will be protecting the future productivity of his land, as well as protecting the price of this crop by seeding within his

Furthermore, the chairman ex lains, in many instances shifting me of the acreage from cotton to rass and legumes may boost the arm income. The experience of many farmers indicates that grass and legumes used as pasture and hay are often more profitable than the cash crops which preceded

"Certainly, with supplies in excess of market demands and bins, cribs and warehouse filling up, it would seem wise to adjust production by shifting the use of some of the land to commodities which are not in such excess," says the chair "And it is a real gain if in so doing the land can be built up so that it will become more pro ductive in the future.

"With population in the United States increasing at the rate of two million a year, it may not be many years until the reserves we can build now may be needed to meet the needs of 170 million people instead of the 148 million people in this country now."

Forehand said the Agricultural Conservation Program for 1950 will emphasize conservation practices which may be used to build up soil reserves on the land taken out of cotton. He advises that information on financial assistance to help farmers in carrying out a number Phone 24 of these conservation practices is available at the county Agricultural Conservation Association office.
