

TEW YORK-This town these afternoons is flooded with Italian-made movies. There is a market for them in New York if they are good. for there are eight million men and women among us and there are thus bound to be a few thousand who are more interested in good acting than Betty Grable's legs or Clark Gable's dimples, which may be accepted as the normal mag-

film called Shoe Shine, which has won all kinds Involved in the writing of that one was a tall, slim young man named Sonio Coletti, who since

has advanced to the status of producer, his new one being something called It's High Time, soon

o arrive in America. Sitting in the Algonquin lounge the other afternoon, Coletti told me a story about It's High Time that tickled me and perhaps it will you. He preceded the story by telling me he was only one-sixteenth Italian, despite his fine old Sicilian name, and that he had been born on 81st street right here in New York and spent a good deal of World War II journeying up the boot of this same Italy with Mark Clark's Fifth Army. The star director of his company -SCP, which is too long in Italian to translate into English-is a man named Paul Tamburella who was born in Cleveland, so what degree of pure Italian that makes their films, I'm not sure.

We got the idea for It's High Time from a magazine piece called A Clock for Fiumicino, it having to do with the restoration of a village clock. We decided to film the movie right in the village where the story actually happened-but since it was to be a satire on the Communist movement, we ran into our troubles early," Coletti said, grinning.

"The mayor of Fiumicino said he couldn't permit us to work and a top Communist came from Rome, twenty miles away, to announce he would force a shutdown if we even started shooting."

"WE DIDN'T CARE TO FIGHT CITY HALL," Coletti went on, 'so we moved to a town called Terracina, halfway between Rome and Naples along the Fifth Army's line of advance, and started

to work. From the beginning, the Reds made life annoying. Since the SCP executives believe in the use of professional actors in the main, rather than amateurs as other Italian companies have done, they

didn't have much trouble with the players. However, there were incidents, especially in the mechanical end. "Hiccup strikes" plagued the company. A truck full of exposed film caught fire. Tamburella and Coletti sweated along, however, getting the picture made slowly but surely-until one day the Terracina Communist boss, a retired gasoline-station attendant, came to

them and threatened a general strike. The SCP governing board (there are five of them in this together) meditated the threat and then ushered the Red boss out. "There

will be a strike tomorrow, mind you!" he mumbled as he left. When he had gone, the movie makers set to work getting everything in position-equipment, lights and the rest. Then they grinned at one another and went home to a sound night's sleep.

When they arrived in the morning, sure enough, the Red boss was right; there was a general strike, with pickets marching and shouts and crowds milling and all the rest of the routine. So what did they do? So-they started up the cameras . . . and filmed the whole thing.

"YOU SEE," COLETTI EXPLAINED, "the script called for a general strike. We would have had to stage one, at great expense -whereas, instead and to our great delight, we were able to delete

one of our costliest scenes from the budget." When the Communists found out, they retired in downtrodden confusion and It's High Time was completed with reasonable quiet. It probably will remain unique—the only anti-Red film made with the fine and lusty co-operation of the Communist party.

Coletti told me that the Communist danger in Italy, while still very pronounced and prominent, has lessened somewhat from the violent situation of last year.

"But if it is weaker now," he reminded, "it also is strongerbecause when the 'heat is off' and people don't take it seriously . . . then the Red threat can really become just that -- a threat



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Roden Control Is Not Practical

Although excluding rodents an rabbits from mesquite-snakeweed range land may increase forage production greatly, present costs of controlling the pests are probably too high for the practice to be profitable.

This is one of the conclusions reached by J. J. Norris, state experiment station animal husbandman, in his recently-published Ex periment Station Bulletin 353 "Effect of Rodents, Rabbits and Cattle on Two Vegetation Types in Semidesert Range Land." the bulletin, Norris gives his findings from an eight-year study on the effects of rodents, rabbits, and cattle grazing mesquite-snakeweed range land and well-preserved black grama grassland.






