# City Council Okays SPS Rate Decrease

Although it may not have been "the shortest city council meeting on record," it probably was very close Tuesday morning.

During a 14-minute meeting. members of the Muleshoe City Council unanimously approved a new ordinance - authorizing Southwestern Public Service Co. to reduce their rates. The reduction will be effective on June 1,

In other action, City Manager Dave Marr told council members a public hearing will be at 5 p.m. on May 31, concerning the current Paving Program, combined with a hearing for an application of a new paving program.

He also said that on Monday, May 22, Senator Phil Gramm is scheduled to fly into the new airport east of Muleshoe and conduct ribbon-cutting ceremonies. The tentative time is 5 p.m.

He also said concrete will be poured for the foundation of new hangars sometime later this week. The new hangars will not be completed before Sen. Gramm arrives, but a grand opening of the airport will be scheduled at a

# Most Areas Still Needing From Six-Eight Inches

"Based on rainfall reports received around the county late last week," said Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley, "one or two areas received very beneficial amounts of moisture.

"For the dryland farmer, however, as a whole, not enough moisture was received.

"At this point, it's just real nice to know it can rain again," he added. "But in terms of establishing a dryland crop, we're still very short on soil moisture."

Tanksley said he is being asked frequently "How much fainfall do we need?" He said we need at least two inches or more of the right type of slow, soaking rain to be able to plant and hopefully, to establish a crop.

'At this time," he added, "we only have about 15 more days left to plant cotton. That doesn't mean that we won't see some cotton planted up to June 10. I feel we have to be established by that time in order to expect any type of normal yield."

He reminded that under the government's farm bill now, farmers must attempt to plant and establish a cotton crop before they can receive deficiency payments. He said a little dryland cotton has been planted already.

According to Tanksley, during the first two weeks of May, approximately 90 percent of the irrigated cotton has been planted and some cotton is up at this

"Soil temperature is above average and the warmth is causing cotton to germinate in a week, which is good," he added.

The county agent said we have received 140 heat units in April for cotton and over 400 for corn. Last year, we didn't get that much heat units through May, he

According to Tanksley, a good one-inch rain could germinate the cotton and get it out of the ground, and with another inch of rain a week later, the farmer would be ahead, he said.

"Many producers are very worried about wind and hail," said Tanksley. "It has been so hot and so dry for so long, the producers said a lot depends on how the rain falls now. If it is accompanied by wind and hail, the producers are afraid of what

it will do to irrigated crops already established.


"For instance, corn is reaching the 6-8 leaf stage, and is really starting to look good. Producers are in the process of fertilizing, and some are starting irrigation at this time."

Although the soil temperature is very good for planting, a main problem is concern for high wind Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

# **EMS** Asking Support For Hospital District

What did it mean to the Bailey County Emergency Medical Service during the 11 and one-half months West Plains Medical Center was closed?

Richelle Watkins, director of the EMS said it meant 317 seriously ill or injured persons being transported out of the community by ambulance to another hospital in another town.

Mrs. Watkins said they would like to encourage local residents to support the Muleshoe Area Hospital District.

She commented, "This is our perspective of the EMS while the hospital was closed -- at that time, we only had the EMS and Dr. Purdy's office ready to receive emergencies."

According to the records, of the 317 persons transported to other hospitals out of town -- several times the patient was in full cardiac arrest (their heart stopped) and the crew performed CPR all the way 35-40 miles to a hospital that could help. "Suppose some young mother

found her child choking, and took him or her to the emergency entrance of the hospital, and found a "CLOSED" sign on it -that actually happened time or two," she added. "We had people come to the ambulance building behind the hospital, and we treated them, and transported them, each and every one to out of town hospitals. Some of these were cardiac patients."

She continued, "We felt rather helpless when someone was bleeding to death, we had no x-rays on the ambulance, no x-ray technicians and no doctor, Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

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





lab or blood." A hospital, with a doctor ready, can do a lot to stabilize a patient while waiting for the helicopter to arrive to take the critical patient to trauma hospitals."

She talked about the many times the local ambulance met the medical helicopters on the highway somewhere to transfer a critical patient, because there was no hospital in Muleshoe to receive the patient and try to stabilize him or her.

Economy-wise, Mrs. Watkins added, "How can we encourage young, progressive people to bring their families to the community with no hospital. Most of them feel it is too scary to have small children and not have a hospital.

"When the hospital was closed, we saw businesses starting to close," she condinued.

"One grocery store operator said he 'knew to the penny' how much money he lost each month while the hospital was closed.

"Schools, churches and a hospital are vital for the growth and stability of a community, and without our hospital, we fear our community will die out. We have good doctors, and with a stable hospital, can get more doctors, and provide more medical services that can keep our medical patients in our own community.

"Nurses are a little afraid to go to work in a hospital that may be closed down at any time, and we have good nurses who currently live right here in Muleshoe, but have to work out of town. Most of them have families to support," she added, "and have to feel secure in their jobs. At this time, the nurses who have stayed with the hospital, are working without any insurance or other benefits. They are 'just sticking it out' and should be commended for continuing to work under those conditions.

The EMS director said four full time employees are on duty each day at the EMS, and all the EMS workers, paid and volunteer are well trained, and efficient.

There are five paramedics at the EMS, and one EMT-SS, who is approximately half through completing paramedic school. There are three EMT-SS (Special Skills); five EMTs; and four ECAs. With an EMT school currently underway, at least four of the students should be

certified and will be possibly joining the current EMS crew.

The EMS has two ambulances. One has advanced life support equipment and the other has intermediate equipment.

The local EMS and their two ambulances are responsible for covering nearly 950 square miles. When there are major disasters, and the EMS considers the accident last September involving five local teenagers as a major disaster, the Sudan ambulance is called, as it has been numerous time, to come over on 'stand by' while the local ambulances are busy.

"People like the small town atmosphere," added Mrs. Watkins, "but there is a price you have to pay for it. If you want the small town, friendly, easier type living, you have to fight for it, and pay the price for it."

The EMS director talked about a surgeon who lived and worked here, Dr. Muyshondt, considered 'outstanding' in the field of surgery, who tried to 'wait it out,' but was forced to move in order to support his family. She added we had a full pharmacy, a full lab and ICU, adding, we could have these again.

She spoke of Medicare, and the inconvenience, and often trauma involved, when older patients have to be transferred to out of town hospitals where they could be hospitalized in Muleshoe if and when necessary.

"EMTs can do a lot in the back of an ambulance," she added, "but we cannot do what a doctor can do. We cannot stabilize the patient, or necessary x-ray work or lab work.

"If someone you love stops breathing -- do you want them 10 minutes from a hospital, or 35-40 minutes?," she asked. "And, as so often happens, because of all the transfers to out of town hospitals, suppose both ambulances are already busy on emergency runs -- what's your alternative?"

She concluded, "People never realize how much they need medical attention until it's too

He said several things happened to wheat this year, and a combination of things caused the loss of most of the wheat crop.

Factors involved included late freezes, insects, disease and drouth. Each contributed to the loss of most of the wheat crop, he

Tanksley said that we not only have the loss of the grain from this year's wheat, but a loss of pasture for forage for cattle, and very few cattle are left in the

This includes a loss of native rangeland, which the county agent said was the main reason for a 'disaster' designation for the county already this year.

After last week's rain, the county agent said some farmers were back in their fields less than 24 hours, and planting contin-

"The potato fields look good, and little vegetables are just getting established," added the county agent. "There are some fields of onions, cabbage and

carrots right now." He added that a number of irrigation farmers benefitted very well from last week's rain, and up to two inches of rain in isolated areas has caused some delay in the farmers getting back into their fields. "But, unfortunately, not enough rain fell to help the dryland farmer very much, nor did it help rangelands very much at all."

# Texas A&M scientists test synthetic hormone to combat pesky fleas

COLLEGE STATION — It's a close race between the flea and the cockroach for the dubious distinction of America's most unpopular household pest, but scientists at Texas A&M University think the flea wins by a bite.

Dr. Roger Meola and Kathleen Palma, both Texas A&M entomologists, think a synthetic hormone they're testing for a Japanese chemical company promises to hit fleas where they live before they have a chance to reproduce

Meola and Palma are testing an artificial version of a naturally occurring hormone that promises to control the hopping, biting insects at least as effectively as insecticides — without the chemicals' undesirable side effects.

The synthetic hormone, known as an insect growth regulator or IGR, turns the hopping, biting insects into perpetual children, interrupting the normal maturing process before they're old enough to bite or reproduce, explained Palma.

Expert says 1987 law interferes with reform of teacher education

COLLEGE STATION — New teacher certification degree plans required by law, particularly a five-year extended elementary program developed at Texas A&M University are expected to accelerate the development of Texas teachers — but not as well as they could, says Texas A&M's associate dean for education.

The same law hampers institutions that train teachers, said Dr. Bryan Cole.

With several Texas universities wishing to duplicate the Texas A&M teacher education innovations made in response to Texas Senate Bill 994, those institutions — including Texas A&M — find themselves hampered by the same bill, said Cole.

"Senate Bill 994 does move in the right direction by requiring teacher candidates to major in an academic discipline, but it goes in the wrong direction by restricting the number of hours of professional education training a student can take," Cole said.

Educators are particularly concerned at the elementary level with the varied classroom settings, differing age groups and divergent student abilities elementary teachers face, Cole said. Teacher candidates may not receive enough training to effectively manage their classrooms, he warned.

The result could be fewer teachers in upcoming years. Studies show teachers leave the profession in the first three years due to an inability to effectively handle the complexities of their classrooms, Cole said.

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
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NOTICE OF ELECTION
THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF BAILEY

To the Resident, Qualified Electors of Bailey County, Texas:
TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the territory of the proposed Muleshoe Area Hospital District located in Bailey County on June 20, 1989, in accordance with an order adopted by the temporary directors of said District which is a part of this notice for all purposes and reads as follows;

AN ORDER by the Temporary Directors of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District calling a creation and tax election to be held within the proposed District boundaries in Bailey County, Texas, making provision for the conduct of the election and ordering other matters incident and related to the holding of such election.

WHEREAS, H.B. 1467 (the "Act"), relating to the creation of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District (the "District") was passed by the 71st Texas Legislature on April 18, 1989; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that the Muleshoe Area Hospital District (the "District") may be created and a tax may be authorized only if the creation and the tax are approved by a majority of the registered voters of the territory of the proposed district located in Bailey County or by a majority of the registered voters of the territory of the proposed district located in Parmer County voting at separate elections in the respective counties; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that a majority of the temporary directors of the District may order the separate creation elections to be held; and

WHEREAS, a majority of the temporary directors of the District agree to and hereby do order an election in Bailey County, Texas to determine whether or not the District shall be created and a tax authorized in accordance with the provisions of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that the provisions of Section 41.001(a) of V.T.C.A., Election Code, as amended, do not apply to an election ordered under the Act; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE TEMPORARY DIRECTORS OF THE MULESHOE AREA HOSPITAL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: An election shall be held on the 20th day of June, 1989, in the territory of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District located in Bailey County, Texas, which date is not less than forty-five (45) nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of the adoption hereof for the purpose of submitting the measure set forth below:

"SHALL the Muleshoe Area Hospital District be created in the territory of said District located in Bailey County, Texas, and shall an ad valorem be levied annually for hospital purposes at a rate not to exceed 25 cents on each \$100 valuation of all taxable property in the District?"

SECTION 2: Paper ballots shall be used in this election and for absentee voting in accordance with the provisions of V.T.C.A., Election Code, as amended.

The ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the applicable provisions of V.T.C.A., Election Code, as amended, so the voters may cast their ballots either "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid measure which shall appear on the ballot in substantially the following form:

"THE CREATION OF THE MULESHOE AREA HOSPITAL DISTRICT AND THE LEVY OF ANNUAL TAXES FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES AT A RATE NOT TO EXCEED 25 CENTS ON EACH \$100 VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE DISTRICT"

SECTION 3: The territory of the District located in Bailey County, Texas constitutes a single election precinct for this election and the polling place designated for such election precinct and the persons hereby appointed to serve as Presiding Judge and Alternate Presiding Judge for such polling place are shown in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as a part

bereof for all purposes.

Each Presiding Judge shall

appoint not less than one (2) nor more than four (4) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day, the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

Absentee voting for the election ordered hereunder shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of V.T.C.A., Election Code, as amended. The absentee voting clerk and the official mailing address for the absentee voting clerk hereby appointed to serve in such capacity for the election to be held in the territory of the District located in Bailey County are shown on Exhibit "A". For the period absentee voting for said election is permitted by law, the absentee voting clerk shall keep said office or offices open for absentee voting at least eight hours each weekday for the absentee voting period that is not a legal state holiday, such hours to be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on such weekdays.

SECTION 4: All resident qualified electors of Bailey County, Texas, shall be permitted to vote at the election ordered hereunder and held in the territory of the District located in said County, and on the day of the election, such electors shall vote at the polling place designated for the Bailey County Election Precinct. The election ordered hereby shall be held and conducted in accordance with V.T.C.A. Election Code, as amended, and the Act; and as may be required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 5: A substantial copy of this Order shall serve as proper notice of the election ordered hereby. Said notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the proposed District, the first of said publications to appear in said newspaper at least thirty-five (35) days prior to the date set for the election

to the date set for the election.

AUSTIN - In my four months as a Texas Senator and my 18 months as a candidate, I've learned that making the most of a good situation is important in politics. Although I work and work to make the best things happen to Senate District 31, only heaven really knows when another good thing is going to come our way. So, I'm of the opinion that we should make the best of the ones that do.

Fortunately, two positive events have taken place recently in Senate District 31 and we'll be getting a lot of mileage out of at least one of them. Two cities, Plainview and Amarillo, recently received designations for enterprise zones and simultaneously received state designations for enterprise projects. Both were used to lure new industry into this region as Azteca Milling Co. announced plans to open a masa processing plant in Plainview and ConAgra Fresh Meats, Inc. has begun transforming a vacant beef Escribientes Diputados de Votos packing plant into a state of the art meat processing plant that will open in June.

> The zones, which are established by the local taxing entities and designated by the Commerce Department are aimed at revitalizing economically distressed areas of the state. Though I wouldn't call either Amarillo or Plainview a "distressed area," the zones can be drawn in such a way to meet the criteria of the Commerce Department; mainly that the unemployment rate of the area be at least one and one-half times the state average, that at least 20 percent of its population be impoverished and at least 70 percent fall into low and middle income groups.

The designation is important because it allows cities to offer local and state tax incentives and rebates to induce businesses to move into the zone, thus creating jobs and revitalizing the "distressed area."

While Amarillo and Plainview were working to add the enterprise zone to their economic development toolbox, both cities had nominated prospects as Department of Commerce enterprise projects. The designated projects, in our case Azteca and ConAgra, may receive refunds of state sales or use taxes paid for building materials and equipment used to expand the business in the enterprise zone. Refunds are made to the project at the rate of \$2,000 for each new job created, up to 625 new jobs over a five year period. This can be an attractive business inducement and was a key factor in both companies decisions to locate in Senate Dis-

But I'm sure an additional factor in the companies decisions was working with both communities in pushing the projects through the Department of Commerce. Amarillo's zone and project designations were completed in record time, I'm told by my friends at the Department of Commerce. In fact, Camille Berry, who oversees the enterprise zone program for the Commerce Department, had nothing but praise for both projects. "You've got good folks out there in your territory," she said. "I do think Amarillo had one of the best applications I've seen since I've been here."

She said the Amarilio zone application will be used as a model for other communities, and the Con-Agra project, which should be completed start to finish in less than three months, will also be a centerpiece as the Commerce Department projects its enterprise project efforts around the state. "These are some quick success stories," she said. "Amarillo should get some good play off that.'

And only good things can come from the Department of Commerce singing the praises of Sepate District 31 around the state, especially since Memphis, Muleshoe, Hale Center and Tulia are all working on applications for enterprise zones. I think before too long, all of Texas will know that this region is interested in doing good things to make our state grow.

# Definition of Legal Publication

Art. 28A. Legal Publication, Definitions.

"The following terms shall, unless the context indicates otherwise, have the following respective meanings:

"(1) The term 'publication' shall mean any proclamation, notice, citation, advertisement, or other matter required or authorized by law to be printed in a newspaper or newspapers by any institution, board, commission, department, officer, agent, representative, or employee of the state or of any subdivision or department of the state, or of any county, political subdivision, or district of whatever nature within the state, whether to be paid for out of public funds or charged as costs or fees.

"(2) The term 'newspaper' shall mean any newspaper devoting not less than twentyfive per cent (25%) of its total column lineage to the carrying of items of general interest, published not less frequently than once each week, entered as second-class postal matter in the county where published, and having been published regularly and continuously for not less than twelve (12) months prior to the making of any publication mentioned in this Act, except that any weekly newspaper shall be allowed to omit two (2) publication issues in twelve (12) months and still retain its status as a newspaper eligible to make any publication mentioned in this

"(3) The term 'political subdivision' shall include cities, towns, and villages, but this definition shall not be exclusive.

"(4) The term 'district' shall include school districts of every kind, road districts, drainage districts, irrigation districts, levee improvement districts, conservation and reclamation districts, and improvement districts of every kind, but this definition shall not be exclusive.


"(5) The term 'shall' whenever used in this Act shall be construed as indicating mandatory provisions in this Act.

"(6) The officer, employee, agency, or persons charged with the duty of inserting any publication in a newspaper or newspapers shall select the newspaper or newspapers in which such publication is to be inserted."

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




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
