She said the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute and other related groups are continuing their educational efforts on
behalf of healthier hearts. The institute suggests these tips to lower blood cholesterol - Less than 30 percent of total daily calories should come from fat, and less than 10 percent of calories should come from
saturated fat. - No more than 10 percent of the 30 percent of calories should come from polyunsaturated fat, and 10 percent or more of the
total fat calories should come from monounsaturated fat
sources. - Between 50 and 60 percent of
taily calories should come from carbohydrates. - A daily diet should contain cholesterol, and calorie intake

## maintain a desirable weight. - While pure protein - While pure protein or carbohydrates contain four calor

 ies per gram, pure fat contains nine calories per gram. Alcoholprovides four calories per gram. provides four calories per gram.
Sweeten said Food and Drug Administration health and diet surveys conducted in 1986
showed that 43 percent of the that fats and fatty foods caused heart disease and 40 percent said holesterol caused heart disease fats and fatty foods caused heart disease and 45 percent indicated cholesterol was a risk factor. The specialist said that people
