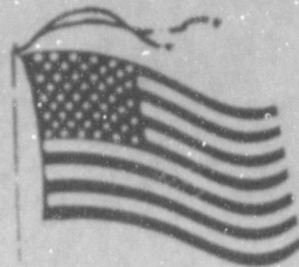

Muleshoe Municipal Airport Ribbon Cutting By Sen. Gramm

It was the full "red carpet" treatment for Senator Phil Gramm when he flew into Muleshoe late Monday afternoon for an official ribbon-cutting ceremony at the new Muleshoe Municipal Airport.

More than 150 people were on hand to greet the Senator and his entourage, and listen to several speakers.

Muleshoe Mayor Darrell Turner was first speaker after the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Ambassador and Ambassadors, along with other, officially greeted Gramm.

Mayor Turner said it was a privilege to welcome such a special guest to Muleshoe and to the official ribbon cutting ceremony for the new Muleshoe Airport.

He said that while some of the audience might not have met Senator Gramm, he is no stranger. Mayor Turner explained that Sen. Gramm is the 'Gramm' in the Gramm-Rudman Act that places controls and restraints on federal spending and he speaks 'one-on-one' with President Bush on a local level.

Sen. Gramm has appointed a 28-member Texas Rural Health Task Force, added the mayor, for the purpose of helping to alleviate some of the problems we are having with health care in rural Texas.

"With all his responsibilities and duties in Washington," said Mayor Turner, "he still has taken the time to visit Muleshoe twice within the past 14 months.

The mayor said "Phil Gramm is my kind of senator. Please help

me extend to his a good Muleshoe welcome."

Next speaker was Robert Montgomery, president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. He thanked Sen. Gramm for his involvement in legislation providing for appropriation funding for the Federal Aviation Administration participation in the new Muleshoe Airport.

Montgomery also thanked Dave Marr, members of the City Council and airport board for

their involvement over the past 14 years in helping make the new airport a reality.

"Everyone might not use the airport," added Montgomery, "but, everybody will benefit economically from a first class airport facility.

"When a prospective industry market inquires about Muleshoe, one of the first questions asked is what sort of airport facilities are available," he continued. "A quality airport is equally import-

Espinoza Given Scholarship For Hispanics

Andrew Espinoza, member of the senior class at Muleshoe High School, has been named recipient of a \$1,500 scholarship from the National Hispanic Scholar Awards Program, it was announced by Principal Wayland Ethridge.

The MHS student is among 500 Hispanic students from throughout the United States who are receiving scholarships for one year's study at the college of their choice. An additional 500 students will receive Honorable Mention Awards.

The National Hispanic Scholar Awards Program, sponsored by the College Board and funded by the Andrew W. Mellon foundation, has distributed a total of 5,200 scholarships and awards since its inception in 1984.

Students enter competition for the Hispanic awards by taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test as high school juniors, and by identifying themselves as Hispanic. From this pool, winners are chosen on the basis of their overall academic achievements, including their grade point average, high school records, test scores, and other criteria such as personal qualities and community involvement.

This year's winners were selected from among 3,200 semifinalists. The names of all semifinalists are listed on a roster of outstanding Hispanic students, which has been released to colleges and universities to encourage them to seek out these talented Hispanic students as potential candidates for admission.

Lazbuddie Freshmen Attend Area 'Retreat'

Lazbuddie freshmen Ricky Delao, Jerri Cozby, and Elpidio Pacheco attended a "Life Management Skills" retreat at the Ceta Glen Christian Camp from 5 p.m. Friday, May 12, through 3 p.m. Sunday, May 14.

Some 30 students in all 15 Panhandle School Districts participated in the retreat which was conducted by a six-member team of trained professional counselors and sponsored by the Texas Migrant Interstate Program, the Central Stream Migrant Program, the Migrant Cooperative of the Region XVI Education Service Center, and the participating school districts.

According to the Region XVI Education Service Center, "The special demands and stress experienced daily by migrant youth tend to adversely affect their academic performance, and characteristically, the migrant student is the most at-risk among his peers."

"Late school entry, early withdrawal, checkered school attendance, frequent school failure, limited English language proficiency, family financial difficulties, and the transitory lifestyle associated with migrant students are but a few of the factors that weigh heavily on the lives of migrant youth. Predictably and understandably, a large percent of them make early decisions to leave school."

The Education Service Center added, "The Life Management Skills strategy emphasizes life decision-making through a series of activities and events concentrated into a 45-hour retreat setting. The decision-making process is integrated into specifically designed activities in three major phases -- The Self or Interpersonal, Coping or Interpersonal, and Futuring or Implementation -- intended for use as a tool to enable students and

to begin the painful adjustment process on personal, social and psychological levels. Migrant students must experience these successful adjustments before they can experience academic adjustment and success."

They added, "The Retreat experience alone cannot be expected to solve all the difficulties associated with many at-risk migrant students. At the very least, the experience should be a positive psychological, emotional and social experience. At best, the experience should allow the students to look introspectively at themselves and to begin making positive changes that will impact their lives."

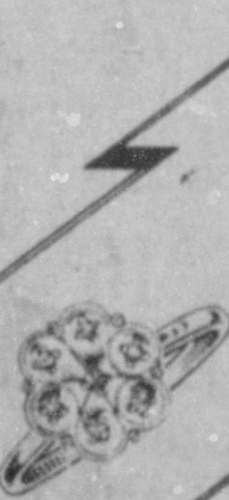

**More Citizens Link Diet
With Coronary Problems**

There is a growing perception by many Americans that link diet with heart disease problems.

Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, a nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said more people are eating more selectively in an attempt to reduce blood cholesterol levels.

"They believe the way to a healthy heart is through the stomach, and are attempting to reduce the risk of heart disease," Sweeten said.

She said the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute and other related groups are continuing their educational efforts on behalf of healthier hearts.

The institute suggests these tips to lower blood cholesterol and reduce risk of heart disease:

- Less than 30 percent of total daily calories should come from fat, and less than 10 percent of calories should come from saturated fat.

- No more than 10 percent of the 30 percent of calories should come from polyunsaturated fat, and 10 percent or more of the total fat calories should come from monounsaturated fat sources.

- Between 50 and 60 percent of daily calories should come from carbohydrates.

- A daily diet should contain less than 300 milligrams of cholesterol, and calorie intake should be adjusted to achieve or

maintain a desirable weight.

- While pure protein or carbohydrates contain four calories per gram, pure fat contains nine calories per gram.

Sweeten said Food and Drug Administration health and diet surveys conducted in 1986 showed that 43 percent of the people who responded believed that fats and fatty foods caused heart disease and 40 percent said cholesterol caused heart disease.

In a 1988 survey, 55 percent said fats and fatty foods caused heart disease and 45 percent indicated cholesterol was a risk factor.

The specialist said that people wanting to check their blood cholesterol should have tests prescribed by a physician and performed in a laboratory meeting standards set by Centers for Disease Control.

Sweeten said that new, portable cholesterol screening equipment is available at pharmacies, hospitals, health fairs and other locations to make blood cholesterol measurement readily available, rapid and quite affordable.

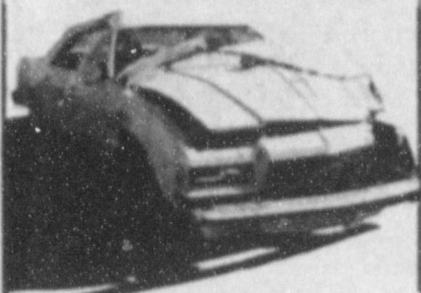

matched with \$250,000 local city funds.

Marr said money received from the sale of Edward Warren Field will be re-invested at the new airport and will be used to reduce the amount of local funds used.

During his talk, Sen. Gramm said, "Muleshoe Municipal is in a strategic location that will allow it to play an important role in the economic growth of the region."

Sen. Gramm added, "Not only will the airport greatly enhance the economic diversity of the Muleshoe area, it will make available emergency health care air ambulance service."

He pointed out that Texas has led the nation in rural hospital closings for the past three years.
Sen. Gramm holds a Ph.D in economics, a subject he taught at Texas A&M University. He serves as a member of the Senate Budget, Appropriations and the Senate Banking Committees. He was elected to the Senate in 1984 after serving three terms in the U. S. House of Representatives.

Montgomery, president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Montgomery's discussion was on the Muleshoe Area Hospital District election scheduled for June 20.

He gave a brief history of the proposed hospital district and how the CofC board had voted unanimously to help with the effort.

Montgomery said a steering committee of some 10 people was formed, to formulate strategy and help get the election successfully passed.

Meeting weekly, the primary concern was an intensive voter registration campaign, which Montgomery said appeared to be successful.

"The Chamber of Commerce feels our future growth and success depends on the hospital remaining open," said the CofC president. "A lot of people are donating a lot of time to this effort. We are not using 'scare tactics,' we are just telling the plain, honest truth, which we feel is the best way to get things taken care of."

According to Montgomery, there are two main issues involved.

The first is the 'tax issue.' "Anytime we ask for a tax increase, we tend to get a negative response," said the CofC president. "But, when you put it in perspective, the tax issue is very minor compared to the effects of not having a hospital. The tax is only one-fourth of one percent of the assessed value and that is the maximum that can be charged."

He added, "Our legislators believe that in the future, all of Texas will be in 'someone's' hospital district 'somewhere.' If we're going to be paying hospital district taxes, we need to be paying it in our own district."

He explained that under present Texas laws, another hospital district cannot annex without voter approval, but also

said legislators said that law will be changed in the future where residents won't have a choice and will be annexed.

One reason for this is that in the South Plains Association of Governments area, some 300,000 people reside. Of this number, 150,000 people currently are paying taxes for public hospitals. Montgomery said the 150,000 are 'getting tired' of carrying the entire tax load and are ready for a change. Thus, laws will be passed that will allow voluntary annexation not having to go through the legislature.

Montgomery said the second issue is the economic impact. "A hospital is a big drawing card for any industry looking at a community."

"I must also remind you that if our hospital closes, it will affect property values. Businesses will slow down, and/or close, as we saw when the hospital was closed for nearly a year."

He told the group that opposition exists to the hospital district, and solicited the assistance of each Rotarian in getting the vote approved in the proposed Muleshoe Area Hospital District.

The CofC president gave the boundary lines of the proposed Muleshoe Area Hospital District, and further explained that any qualified registered voter residing within the boundary lines would be eligible to go to the polls on June 20 to express their choice.

Offering other brief remarks, Tanksley said he attended a Rural Development Economic Conference in Lubbock on Monday, where Sen. Gramm was speaker.

Gramm spoke about the hospital in Muleshoe, as well as other rural hospitals, and their financial problems, mainly caused by inequal payments for Medicare and Medicaid.

He reminded that young people who go off to school will

not come back to an area without a hospital, and the elderly, who are looking for retirement locations will not consider a place without adequate health care, including a hospital.

Dr. Mark McClanahan said if the hospital district vote passes, there will be added facilities and services, including probably a surgeon again. He also said the quality of care will increase, because highly qualified personnel would be attracted to the Muleshoe hospital.

A discussion was also held on indigent care, with a reminder that Bailey County is funding indigent care now -- as required by state law. While the hospital was closed during 1987, the money for indigent care went out of the community. Montgomery also reminded that a tremendous amount of medical care dollars are going outside the community at this time -- never to return here.

"When we talk about a hospital," said Montgomery, "we are talking about a broad spectrum of medical services."

Dave Marr said 10 percent of the general tax revenue of Bailey County is budgeted for indigent care. If the hospital district passes, the hospital will assume indigent care, with the ultimate probability of a reduction of tax levy for the county.

In other Rotary action, President Nieman said Jay Feagley is a new Rotary member; and reminded Rotarians of the wrestling scheduled for this Friday night at the Civic Center at 8 p.m. He said Andy Perez had agreed to clean-up after the wrestling, freeing the Rotarians from that chore.

Governor Signs Jury Awareness Bill No. 54

Governor Bill Clements has signed a "truth in sentencing" measure that will enable Texas juries to be informed of the consequences of parole if state voters approve a constitutional amendment in November.

"We can no longer afford to handcuff our juries with a lack of information on sentencing criminal defendants," Clements said after signing the measure.

"If the jury can be trusted to make complex and difficult decisions concerning the defendant's guilt, then they should also be trusted to exercise the same care when setting a defendant's punishment. Texas juries have a right to know about Texas "parole laws."

Senate Bill 54, the enabling legislation for the constitutional amendment, requires that a jury in a criminal case be given instructions regarding the award of good conduct time and eligibility for parole in certain circumstances.

The enabling legislation was

sponsored by Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, and Rep. Dan Morales, D-San Antonio.

The governor also has signed three other anti-crime measures.

One of the measures, Senate Bill 85 by Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston and Rep. Ashley Smith, R-Houston, effectively requires criminals to help pay for their own capture by making a contribution to a certified Crime Stoppers program as a condition of felony probation.

"Crime doesn't pay, but under this measure, criminals will," Clements said.

Other bills signed by the governor include Senate Bill 439 by Sen. Ken Armbrister, D-Victoria and Morales which enhances victim restitution, and Senate Bill 916 by Sen. Frank Tejeda, D-San Antonio and Morales which enhances the criminal penalties for suspects apprehended after attempting to flee from law enforcement questioning.

Rural Health Seminar Slated By Representative

A major legislative package to help rebuild rural America was introduced Thursday in the U. S. House of Representatives. U. S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas), who is cosponsoring the bill, said a key provision of the legislation is designed to aid rural hospitals and facilities.

"This legislation will help create an economic environment in rural America in which jobs will be created and rural areas will be revived," Combest said. "The Rural Development Initiative which we introduced on Thursday will pull together various programs which deal with rural development funds under one agency. This will ensure better management and administration of these activities."

One key provision of the bill would affect rural health care facilities, which Combest considers one of the most pressing needs of rural communities today. The bill would reduce the interest rates charged by the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA), basing the rates on local income figures.

"This provision could significantly reduce the cost of health care services in rural areas," Combest said. "Rural hospitals, many of which are facing

possible closure or cutbacks, are in critical need of financial help. This provision, along with other reforms which I am cosponsoring, will help these vital facilities remain open."

Other key provisions of the Rural Development Initiative include:

- * Reorganization of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in order to streamline rural assistance and development of programs now scattered throughout the federal government;

- * Establishment of a guaranteed loan program to aid rural communities in rebuilding infrastructure and to encourage economic development activities in cooperation with private enterprises, as well as state and local governments;

- * Establishment of special Rural Technology and Training Centers to enable development of new high technology products, processes and marketing techniques;

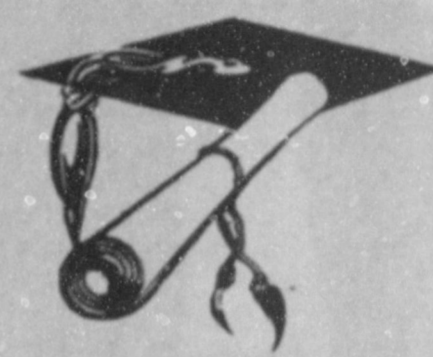
- * Amendment of the Office of Federal Procurement Act to target small businesses in rural areas for federal procurement programs; and

- * Increase FmHA water facility grants by \$50 million over a three-year period. This would enable rural areas to battle

lingering drought conditions and allow communities to establish a sufficient water supply for its residents and businesses.

Combest was a cosponsor of similar legislation during the 100th Congress. Many of the provisions in the Rural Development Initiative of 1987 are now in use.

"The odds against rural areas are so high at this time that we are seeing many businesses and hospitals stagnate or close their doors because of financial problems," Combest said. "The important provisions in this legislation would reduce the odds against rural areas and give our communities a fighting chance."

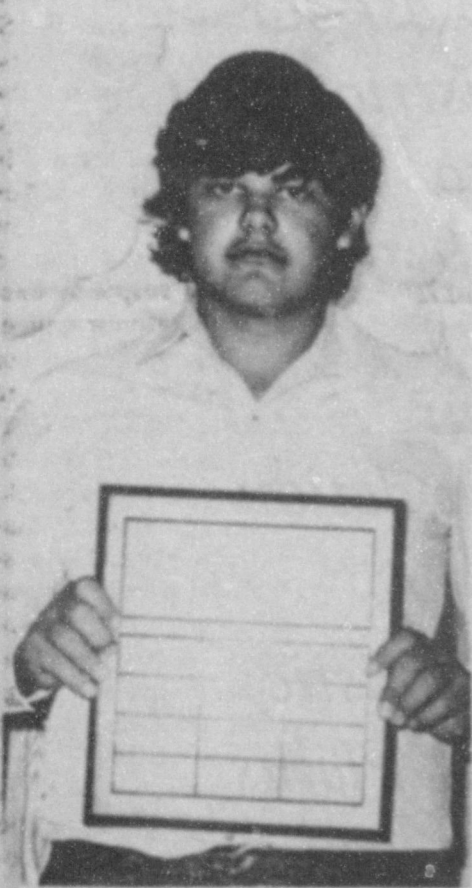

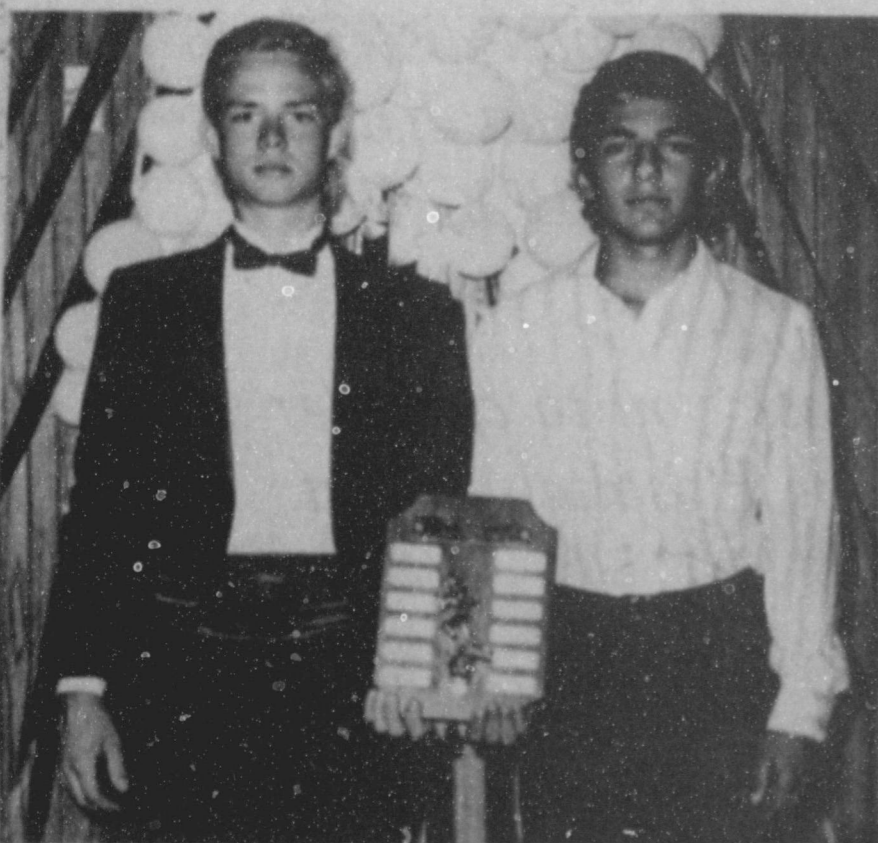

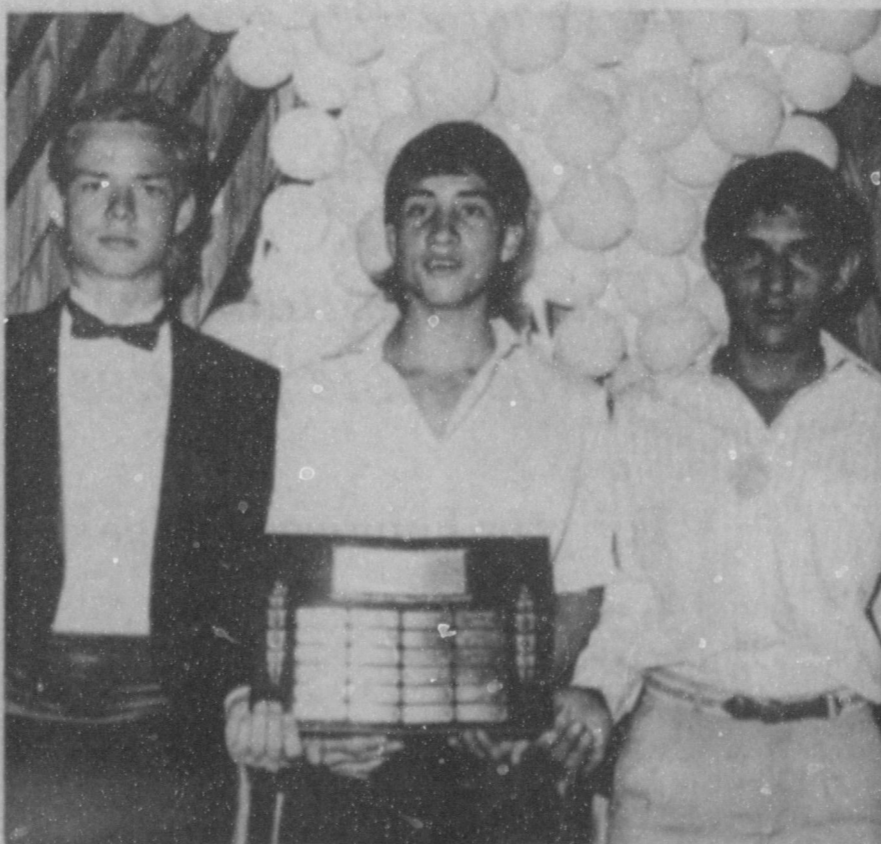
