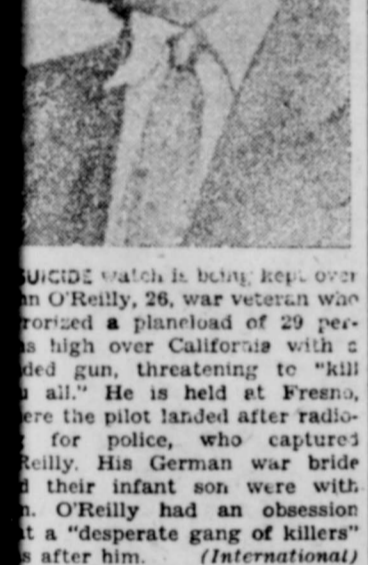
Nancy Goes To Rio' Is Coming To Landsun

"Nancy Goes to Rio," starring Jane Powell and Ann Southern on the Landsun screen Sunday through Tuesday, is the latest in M-G-M's string of tenuous romance produced by Joe Pasternak and stands out as the first bang-up musical hit of 1950.

With the engaging, thrush-roated Jane Powell cast as a young girl who falls in love with a situation complicated by the fact that the man she chooses happens to prefer her youthful attractiveness to her dramatic, romantic, and undisciplined dance sequences amid a variety of colorful backgrounds, among them a cruise ship, South American night clubs and backstage Broadway.

In a brief summary of the plot, Nancy (Jane Powell), 17-year-old daughter of actress Frances Elliott (Ann Southern), gets the leading role in South American play which is the newest drama, unwittingly catching the plum from her mother. When she follows her mother to Rio to get the benefit of her coaching, she memorizes the passionate lines of the play and in her desk chair, leading to an attractive but older fellow passenger, Paul Berton (Barry Sullivan) to believe that she is going to have an illegitimate child. In trying to be sympathetic to Nancy, he gives her with the inference that she is in love with her. In Rio Nancy's mother and grandfather (Louis L. Lomax) attempt to force Paul into a shotgun marriage with Nancy, with the help of his secretary (Armen Miranda) the amusing attempt is straightened out, with Paul finding romance with Nancy, and with Nancy returning to her own sweetheart (Scotty Beckett).

"Nancy Goes to Rio" has a rich musical score, with songs to fit the principal in the cast. Miss Powell gets the lion's share, her songs including the famed Gershwin "Embraceable You," Musetta's "Terrorizer Held"

First Flood Head In Eight Months Comes Tuesday

The first natural head of flood waters in the Pecos River at Artesia in eight months peaked out at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning with a stage reading of 10.12 feet, according to E. P. Bach, who has been gauging the river here for the Weather Bureau and the Carlsbad Irrigation District the last 12 years.

He has been gauging the river in one capacity or another about 25 years.

Bach said the stage at 10:30 o'clock Monday night was 10.12 feet, shortly after which the rise started.

He said previous times during the last eight months when the river was on the rise here water was being let down from Lake Alamogordo to Lake McMillan. This has been done twice this year, he said.

For many years of gauging the Pecos River here, Bach said he is usually able to determine the watershed from where the flood waters come. The head Tuesday, he pointed out, was not black enough to have come from the Rio Felix or the Rio Honda. He said it was his belief the water came from the east slope of the river a number of miles upstream.

Camp Wehinahpay For Boy Scouts Opens This Week

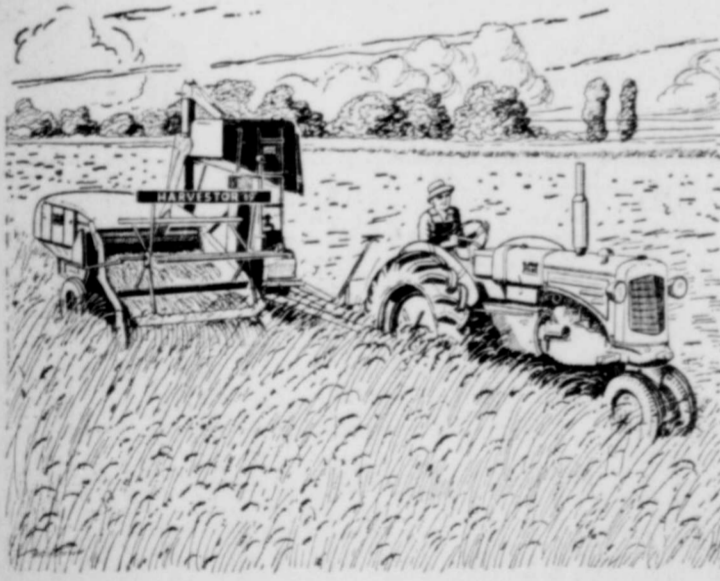

McGinty said it is expected several other troops in the district will sign up for the camp during one of the remaining periods.



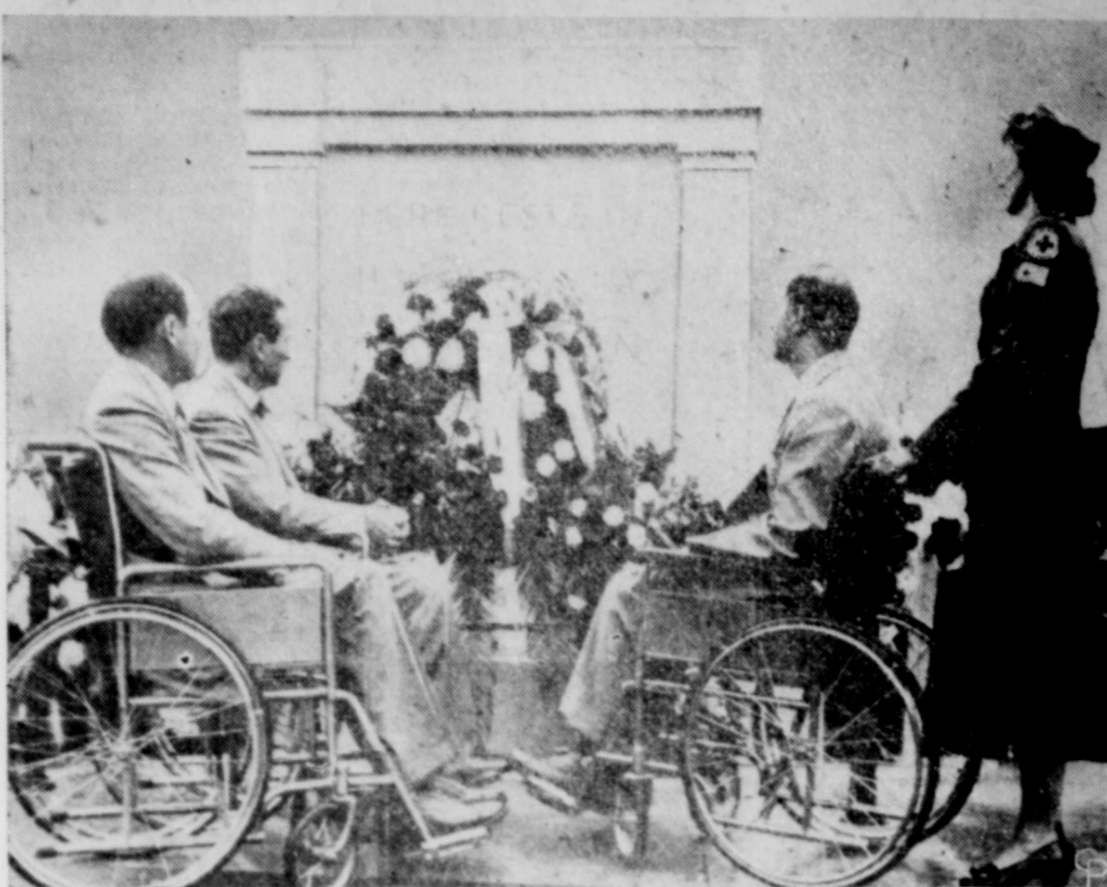

Consumption of Bread Can Be Increased

Recent research experiments at the University of California indicate that bread consumption increases if more milk is used in the bread recipe. Specialists conducted an experiment in which a group of boys, between 8 and 16 were fed breads containing different amounts of non-fat dry milk solids. Each type of bread was fed during an eight-week period and then the experiment was repeated with a different order of feeding. In both trials, the bread consumption increased as the amount of milk in the bread was increased. Here are the average percentages of consumption for the two trials: With 6 per cent non-fat dry milk solids, consumption increased 13 per cent; with 10 per cent non-fat dry milk solids, 7.1 per cent more bread was eaten and with 14 per cent non-fat dry milk solids, the boys ate 12.6 per cent more bread.

Accidents In Home Cost Thousands Of Lives Every Year

Home is where the heart is—and where the heart of the accident problem is too. Falls were the greatest cause of home deaths in the United States last year, resulting in 18,200 fatalities. Burns, scalds and explosions came next, with a total of 6,000 deaths. Mechanical suffocation caused 1800 deaths, to run third in 1948. Special studies show that more than 25 per cent of fatal home accidents occur in the bedroom. The yard and kitchen are the next most hazardous locations at home, causing about 12 and 10 per cent of deaths respectively.

Opening of a new junior high school at Carlsbad has made it possible to end utilization of the barracks building at the rear of Eisenhower School. The building will be put up for sale.

The story brings into focus the building material shortage of the war years when schools and other institutions scrambled for war surplus property to serve as temporary alleviation of packed rooms.

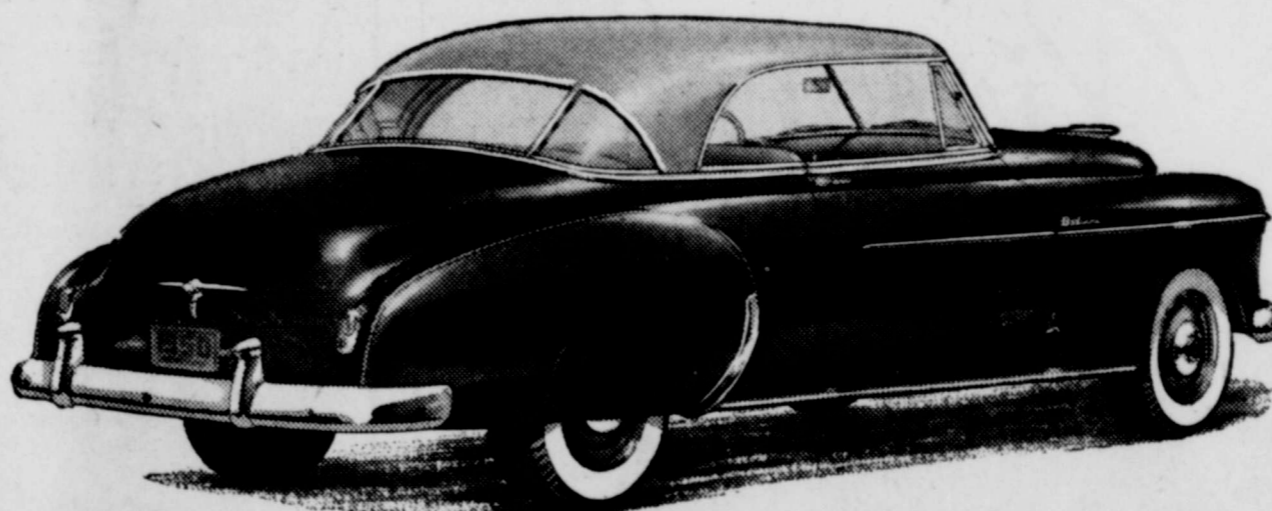

Gridiron Plowed and Irrigated As Schools Prepare for New Term

Morris Field received its pigskin permanent this week. The high school football oblong was plowed Tuesday by V. F. Lowery, watered and made ready for putting in sod where needed and rolling, in preparation of use in the 1950 season.

Portable aluminum pipes, 20 feet long, were laid down, hooked up to outlets and the field watered through nine sprays. Similar plowing of campus and parking was a part of the job. **Main Office Rearranged** Meanwhile renovation is in progress at the high school building where a switch in the arrangement of Principal T. Stovall's office has resulted in moving the principal's office to a new corner location placing the secretary's office in the reception room and allotting the principal's former office to Linna McCaw, in charge of attendance.

Under this arrangement, the counter in the reception room has been moved to north-south position replacing the old east-west, so that traffic will be aligned in and out the same door. This means less confusion and consequently gain in efficiency. Principal Stovall pointed to the location of the school's new trophy cabinets. Two sections of wall lockers will be removed, one on each side of the wall fronting on the principal's office.

In their place will go the three-tiered, fluorescent lighted sliding glass door cabinets where the school trophy collection, now scattered in cabinets in the corridor and at sundry places over the building. Provision has been made for the addition of other trophies so that the cabinets will not need to be enlarged for a long time. One of the cabinets will measure 15 feet long by 7 1/2 feet high; the other will be of smaller size. James Allen, shop instructor, is to do the work.

This will include mopping floors, putting down floor seal and waxing. The work entails removal of all portable equipment, such as desks, chairs and fixtures.

Houston Teel is in charge of maintenance. At all schools, janitors will repair broken seats, make other repairs and improve lawns. At the high school, the old shop classroom will be remodeled for the visual education department.

With a procession of 4,000 or 5,000 young women passing the old desk every year, with their diplomas clutched tightly, many of them force itself that the valuable thing that all of them could learn was the value of discipline.

For the past four years, for the first time in their lives, they have been up against a proposition that Dad couldn't fix for them, and where the kitchen cabinet was

powerless. Every mark and grade they got came from their own labor and intelligence, if any. Some of them never fully learned the lesson, and finished the scholastic years with only a part of the credits they ought to have made and would have gotten if they had dug in and really worked.

They most of them began to save the burro as freshmen, and such credits as they got was attributable to their first grasp of the necessity for discipline, in this instance of the mental sort, the most important of all. The average boys and girls wangle their way through the grade and high schools by moving in the direction of least resistance.

They seldom go any further than the high school, and are facing a lot of bumps in the school of life. All of these jolts could have been avoided if there had been an earlier application of the principle of discipline. To be really fair about it, it is the way with most of us to prefer to learn the hard way, under which we think that we need no attention to discipline at all.

Cheaper Beef Gains Produced By Hormones

Livestock authorities at Purdue University are reporting the results of steer trials using the hormone stilbestrol (stil-best-trol).

Their experiments show that when stilbestrol was included in their feed, steers gained 40 to 63 pounds more per head than those not given the hormone.

The tests were started with four groups, each consisting of 10 steers. The four groups were started on a fattening ration of corn and cob meal, cottonseed meal, molasses feed, clover and timothy hay, bone-meal and salt.

Two of these groups were given stilbestrol in the form of pellets under the skin in the neck region. The injections were made at the beginning of the fattening period. The pellets increased daily gains, stimulated appetite and improved feed efficiency.

Steers which received a total of 60 milligrams of stilbestrol gained 40 pounds more than the steers not getting it during the 140-day experiment. Steers in the test receiving 120 milligrams in their feed gained even more. Their rate of gain was 63 pounds more than steers not receiving the pellets. These results were similar to those

obtained earlier in Purdue trials with beef heifers. Feed consumed by the groups given hormones was 760 and 714 pounds per 100 pounds of gain. The other group needed 820 pounds of feed to make 100 pounds of gain. The average daily gains were over two and a half pounds for the stilbestrol lots and around two and a fourth pounds daily gain for the others.

But the investigators emphasized that the hormone cannot be used by farmers until it is approved by the Pure Food and Drug Administration. Its use for fattening cattle is still in the experimental stage.

Mass production methods of incubation, brooding, housing and feeding poultry have increased the opportunity for disease development and transmission at an alarming rate.

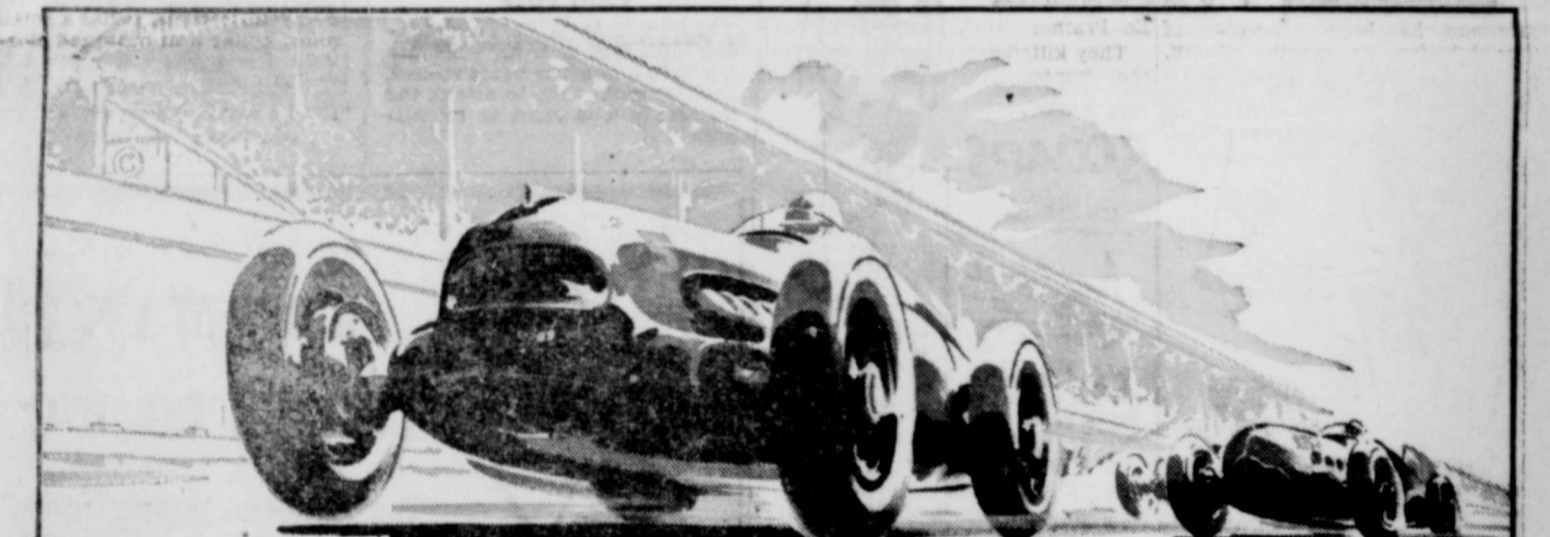
