## Maintenance Of Lawns

Needs Careful Attention

Everyone wants to have a healthy, green lawn and home andrcape. Maintenance of an tractive lawn is relatively easy if proper management practices year. WATERING Watering is probably the single most important factor in maintaining a healthy lawn. The easiest way to determine how much water one is applying is to set a straight-sided can, such as a coffee can, on the lawn and turn the sprirkker on. Record how
long the sprinkler is on and, after long the sprinkier is on and, after
urning off the sprinkler, mea sure the depth of water in the can. A lawn needs .3 to .4 inches of water per day in the spring and fall.
During hot, dry conditions, aise mowing heights to reduce atering needs. Grass mowe deeper root system than gras mowed at one to one and onehalf inches. Watering needs are reduced with more effective us of water in the soil. Mow Blue grass and Fescue lawns at three DO NOT mow Bermuda grass higher than two inches. 'When' water is applied clso influences the effectiveness of watering. Early morning is considered the best time to water. The wind is calm and the emperature is lower, thus w
loss from evaporation is low. Early morning watering hel Early morning walering hew off leaves which reduces the incidence of diseases. Late evening is considered the worst time to water as grass

 Nitrogen is the nutrient re quired in the largest amounts to maintain a good healthy lawn. Grases respond to nitrogen in anumber of ways including dennumber of ways including den-
sity, dark green color, greater sity, dark green color, greater
dmught resictance, faster recovery rate and greater traffic tolerance. The surest way to determine feruizer needs of a lawn is to take a soil sample and have it analyzed to determine nutrient status and obtain a fertilizer recommendation. However, in the absence of this, some general guidelines cas be used.

MOWING
Mowing greatly affects the
density, texture, color and root growth of lawns. Improper mowing can rapidly cause a lawn to die out. Mowing grasses lower than recommended will weaken
the grasses causing them to die the grasses causing them to die
in periods of either heat. in periods of eithe
drought, or cold stress.
The lawn should be mowed frequently enough so that no more than 40 percent of the leaf tissue is removed at any one
mowing. This means that it must be mowed regularly. Removing
more plant material at one time is more plant material at one time
a severe shock to the plant. A sharp lawn mower blade is important in maintaining a wellgroomed lawn. A dull blade
shreds rather than. euts leaf shreds rather, than, cats leaf

## Notice To Taxpayers

Taxpayers in the Bailey County Appraisal District have an opportunity to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. The property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) before June 23, 1989. The district's Appraisal Review Board hearing will be on July 10, 1989 at 104 E. Ave. C.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the Bailey County Appraisal District office, 104 E. Ave. C., Muleshoe. A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable as long as it identifies the property owner, the property which is the subject of protest, and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office.
Each protesting taxpayer may offer evidence or argument either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB.
Taxpayers should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing units or taxing unit spending and will not hear protests of those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date, and place of their individual hearings.

The State Property Tax Board has isnned a pamphlet cailed "Taxpayer's Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities" available at the Bailey County Appraisal District office. 104 E. Avenue C., Muleshoe, which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB.

If inside an unprotected doors, stay away from windows, ances metal objects and appli. -If you are outside and feel your hair standing on end, ightning may be about to strike.
Drop to your knees and bend forward, placing your hands o your knees. Don't lie flat on the ground. Almost every farm or ranch is served by central station elec trical power, usually carried via
overhead powerlines. Then that power often is disturbed around the farmstead by overhead lines that could be fatally contacted by those involved in operation below. Therefore
