Second in importance is the High Plains in Lea County, where wells irrigated 100,000 acres last

Other major irrigation areas are the Portales Valley and the House area on the High Plains, the Mimbres and Animas Valleys in the southwest corner of the state, the Estancia Valley, the Grants-Bluewater area, and the Carlsbad area.

In most of these areas pumping has not lowered the water level to an alarming extent; however, the figures on the water level supplied by the chamber of commerce. · makes conservation measures imperative.



August 1. parity price is 33.85 cents a pound. Last year the average loan rate for middling 7/8 cotton, gross weight, was 27.90 cents a pound.

The average rate for middling 15/16 inch cotton will be 125 points (1.25 cents per 100 pounds) above the average rate for middling 7/8 inch cotton or 31.71 cents per pound, gross weight.

Premiums and discounts for the various grade and staple length combinations under the 1951 loan program will be calculated in relation to the loan rate on middling 15/16 inch cotton. (The schedule of premiums and discounts was issued on May 16, 1951).

Depends on Location Loan rates will vary according to location. The rate for middling 15/16 inch cotton, gross weight, will vary from a high of 32.55 cents per pound in the concentrated mill area of the Carolinas to a low of 30.97 cents per pound

> "Ever since the 1950 amendments to the Social Security Act were passed we've been telling farmer that they would have to make social security reports on Mexican National Contract Workers the same as their other farm employees of the workers met the 'regularity test' of working a full calendar quarter and at least 60 days (for which they received \$50 or more in cash wages) in the next calendar quarter." J. Hassler Strickland, Manager of the Roswell Social Security Administration office stated today.

"That was true until the law vas changed on July 12.. Agricultural services performed on and after July 12, 1951 by Mexican agricultural workers imported to the United States from Mexico (under contract entered into in accordance with Title V of the Agricultural Act of 1949, as amended) are excluded from coverage regardless of how long they work or how much they are

paid. "Services performed by Mexican agricultural workers from Jan. 1 1951, through July 11, 1951, would be covered if the workers set the regularity of employment and cash pay tests. It is not likely that many such workers have met these tests, however," Strickland continued.

"The only change in the social security law as far as farm laborers is concerned is with respect to Mexican national. other farm workers who meet the 'regularity' and cash pay tests must be reported.

Any farmer who has regular farm workers and has taken no action to report their wages should mailing list." Always Breaking Routine

JE DO A GREAT DEAL of talking in these days and times about the 'good old days'.

We talk about the good old days because there are many things about those days we still recall with a great deal of

Perhaps we are not so happy when we recall some of the salaries we received but we do appreciate the prices we paid for food stuff and some of the relations we had with the old time grocer were very pleasant. There wasn't the hustle and the bustle of today-we had time to stop, to visit and to talk.

But times have changed and they continue to change. We perhaps would not want to give up our radios; our cars; the modern transportation; the sanitation which prevails today; the modern conveniences we have. We wouldn't want to go back to some of the old ways of doing things and of the old fashioned medical care; the lack of hospitals and of modern

But back in these days we could do a little planning. It wasn't just a mad scramble to make money. We had some concern for our neighbor and our friends. We had time to go and see them and to visit with them. We could plan our work ahead of time and the unexpected was not all happening. It was back in those good old days, of course, that the operating of a business was much easier and simplier.

We weren't troubled in those days with the sales tax; or the withholding tax; the unemployment tax; the social security (old age) pension levies. We didn't know the meaning of the word income tax.

It also was the time before the strikes were a common practice and a common occurrence. Today we never know from one day to the next what is going to happen and to oc-

Today we never know when we report for work whether we are going to work or whether we are going to strike. Business people never know whether the trains are going to operate to meke delivery or whether the employes are going to

No one is sure the telephones are going to operate or whether they are going to be silent because of a dispute over wages or hours or something

Life was a little more normal in those good old days and seemingly we got along a little better or at least just as good. But now from day to take we always have strikes confronting us about something or other. And although sometimes we may not feel these concern us-they still do.

It is amazing just how a walkout of the coal miners or the steel workers or the automobile makers affects us in Artesia. But they do because merchandise we offer for sale is not available. Not only the business here is denied the item it sells but its salesmen and workers cannot work.

We are still of the opinion there must be a way to halt these strikes and the stopping of American industry without calling a strike and disrupting our business over the entire nation. There must be a way to reach an greement without tieing up industry and halting our way of life. And surely there is a way these things could be settled for a longer period than

Most of us wish that at least we could have at least one full year of peace-peace when business and industry were not halted by walkouts nd strikes.

Surely there is a better way to work out our disputes between management and labor than to employ strikes.

Merely Summer Slow-Down

THE FACT THAT the promoters and racket workers have not been much in evidence for the past few weeks is merely due to the summer slow down. They will be back with new schemes of various kinds to try and work the public. And they will be successful.

For years we have seen these outsiders come into our community to business which belongs to the local merchants -belongs to them because they are in business here; pay licenses and taxes to be in business; provide jobs for local people; provide payrolls for our community and make their gifts and contributions to our community.

It is the business firms, the professional people and the citizens of Artesia who make Artesia. The outside saleman who comes in to take the local business takes the money out with him. It doesn't come back and it doesn't continue to circulate here.

But, we say, this has been done for years. And every year the hope is voiced that we will 'wise up' to just what these people seek and want and that we will refuse to patronize them. When we stop giving them business they will stop working our community.

But we can expect some outside photographer to come along sooner or later with some promotion scheme. He will seek to get some local concern to work with him and to help him-some local concern which urges and advocates trade at home but which forgets that he must also practice buying at home. These photographers are here seeking the business which belongs to our local photographers.


We will have salesmen in selling everything from hose and raincoats to magazines. They are smooth and slick and they will make a good sales talk. They will secure some busi-

But perhaps the greatest field for sales is that of various kinds and types of advertising. Everything in the way of advertising is sold and unfortunately there are always those ready to put out their money. They will buy something of no value from the stranger when they refuse to purchase legitimate advertising from the local salesman.

We can and will halt these various schemes and rackets when we desire to do so. All we have to do is to refuse to buy and they soon will not be working our city.

The time to get ready for them and to start halting their les-sales which belong to our local business firms-is now efore the campaigns are started again.

It is not enough, therefore, to point with pride American accomplishments-any more than one would lead a threadbare workman shopping for bargains to a Fifth Avenue show window. If democracy is not to look like a luxury article-fine for those who can afford it-then it must be presented on terms adapted to the resources and earning power of the Asian masses.—Christian Science Monitor.
