#### Some Sober Thinking

TIME AFTER TIME the fact has been emphasized that we are spending ourselves as a nation into bankruptcy.

But there has always been plenty of money because we have increased taxes and seemingly we are convinced there is no end to all of this.

If our prosperity has increased so much; if business is so much better; if all of the arguments advanced are true, then the levies we have had should have brought in more or sufficient money to carry the load.

That has not proven to be the case despite the increase in collections.

We have spent all of this and found it necessary to continue to increase the tax levies until it has reached to point where the amount being taken out of every dollar earned is far too great for the good of our nation.

We need the tax money but we need national wealth, we need national income and we need to encourage more investments in business and business ventures to provide other things besides taxes such as employment and firms to pay taxes.

The fact has been stressed before that as a nation we have collected and spent more in the past six and one-half years than we have spent in the entire history of our nation before this time.

During the past six and one-half years, during the administration of President Harry S. Truman, we have collected and spent according to the Treasurer of the United States, some 260 billion dollars.

Prior to this time for all of the wars in which we have engaged, including the Civil War, the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, and all of the relief programs, only some 248 billion dollars.

It sounds impossible that we have spent more money in six and a half years by 12 billion dollars than we have spent in the entire history of our nation and yet the records dis- I gave. close that.

That in itself should result in some sober thinking; it should make us realize we have gone the limit and there is no limit to which we can go. It should result in us fully realizing it is time to slow down and get within reason and to learn to live within our income.

Individuals and firms have to adopt a budget, live within the budget and stay within their incomes. The federal government is going to have to do the same thing.

We apparently have taken on too much of a job. We attend for yourself as well as for the others. ve forgotten the good advice giving us many years ago about staying away from entangling alliances. We have not to learn that there really isn't any reason for not only become involved in them, but we have set ourselves up | getting "hep" to them. Naturally, there isn't space to not only arm the world but to feed and cloth it.

And as long as we will do that-we will continue to do it. We know we have to get ready for an emergency. We know we must be prepared but we talk about our defense program and about dropping the non-defense projects and then continue to demand that the government appropriate money

President Truman is blamed for the spending of the 260 billions of dollars. He perhaps is responsible for the recommendations that this sum be spent. He was never very successful in handling his own finances and he perhaps is no better qualified to discuss billions than some of the rest of us.

But the fact remains that only the congress of the United States can appropriate money, and it was this same congress which has made it possible for us to spend some 260 billions of dollars in six and a half years when before in the entire history of our nation we have only spent 248 billions of dollars.

Congress is the one who will have to cut off and cut down on some of the expenditures if they expect our nation to remain solvent and the people of the nation to be able to pay reasonable taxes they better start reducing what we are spending.

#### Check Unemployment Payments

DATA AND INFORMATION concerning unemployment tax payments from the state office have been mailed recently to the various employers over the state.

In connection with this data the announcement is made that employers, by making a cash contribution or donation to their own balance, might be able to earn a lower tax rate.

In some cases this is possible. In other instances, it is not possible. Cash contribution must be made prior to December

Those who have a small balance and who have had many withdrawals against it probably can not secure the lower rate. Those, who have the lower rate, probably can not secure another reduction. And those who do not have an experienced rating of four years or more also probably can not obtain a reduction.

Others, however, who had had few withdrawals against their account; who have had four years experience; and who have a good balance, may by a cash contribution secure a good reduction.

Those who have a good rating of four years, few withdrawals and a good balance and who have been paying 2.7 probably will be given a .09 but it is possible this might be reduced to .03 by the cash donation.

The complete formula and information for checking the account and the payroll is sent out with the other data.




