towels, wash cloths or soiled drinking glasses, dishes, and table silverware, unless they are thoroughly cleaned, because the virus could be carried from one person to another through these means.

Mothers should be particularly cautious in not permitting their children to become fatigued or chilled because an over-tired body or a body chilled by frequenting a swimming pool for too long a period becomes more susceptible to the ravages of poliomyelitis.

Parents should avoid taking their children on trips away from home, except in an emergency, because of the possibility of exposing them to one of the three types

of virus for which they have no immunity.

Kept At Home
During a polio outbreak children should preferably be kept at home rather than taken on long automobile trips. Likewise the children should not be taken to community celebrations where they may mingle with a different group of children than those whom they have been accustomed to playing with from day to day.

Another question that is often asked is whether children should have tonsil operations, inoculations against various diseases, such as diphtheria, or whether dental extractions should be done by the dentists while polio is known to exist in the community. The parents should follow the doctor's or

the dentist's advice in these debatable matters. There is no definite scientific proof either for or against suspending such operations during a polio epidemic.

Parents should particularly watch their children for the early signs of poliomyelitis. These signs include headaches, fever, sore throat, an upset stomach, stiffness in the neck and back. If any member of the family has any of these signs, it is the part of wisdom to call the regular physician immediately, and until his arrival the child showing these signs should be put to bed and kept away from the other members of the family.

Help Available
Finally, the public should realize that the local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile

Paralysis is ready and willing to extend any possible assistance to the family which is visited by poliomyelitis. They can be found usually by consulting the telephone directory for the locality.

"Final," said Doctor Scott, "there is a small increase in the number of cases of poliomyelitis at this time when compared with the number reported on a comparable date in 1951. However, it must be remembered that the population of New Mexico is increasing month by month, and with an increased number of children in the state in the years of age which are usually attacked by poliomyelitis it is inevitable that we may have an increased number of cases reported.

"This is no reason for the citizens of any community to become unduly alarmed. There are a few things which can be done to prevent a polio outbreak. The responsibility lies upon the parents to be suspicious with these signs about mentioned occurring in their children and immediately call their physician and follow his advice."

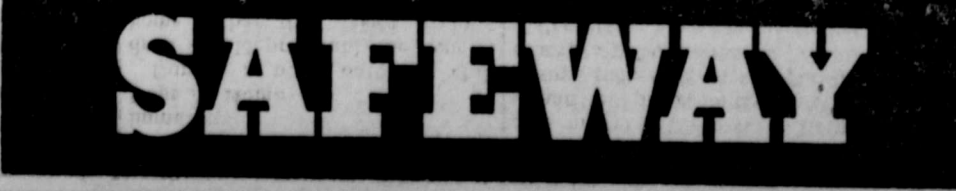
