North Third Blocked From Main to Texas

North Third street from Texas to Main was blocked by a city-employed crew following instructions of the city council, which has had the intersection "hazardous" for traffic. The council voted in June to have the street temporarily closed for six months as an experimental move designed to reduce what police chief Earl D. Hall had reported as a dangerous spot.

Use will be made of the temporary concrete curb being used for the six months. The curb has not yet been ordered by the city council.

Workmen Monday laid down a concrete curb across the Main entrance to N. Third street, and will later erect parking meters and the temporary concrete to the more downtown parking area.

Barriers or signs will probably be used to close the Texas street entrance to N. Third.

It was said that motorists coming from N. Third street on to Main could not see oncoming traffic on Main, and the blind intersection therefore presented a dangerous "traffic hazard," police officials said.

Planning of the street was provided at the June meeting by W. J. Magdala, Artesia realtor, who has many Artesia streets repaved blind entries to Main, such as Main and 10th.

"Consideration"—Magdala said he had paid taxes for 46 years, and was due for consideration in his proposed street.

Subsequent conversations he had led him to believe that the city would consider his proposal.

City Atty. Neil Watkins told the city council the city would take lengthy legal proceedings in any attempt to sell the street, and the council has not yet decided in an open meeting what will be done with the street should it be permanently closed.

Hope Water Users Association to Be Formed Today

A highly important meeting of prospective water users in the Hope community has been set for today afternoon, (Tuesday), at the Elthel Altman, mayor, has announced.

The meeting will be held in the main cafe at Hope and will feature a discussion of financial arrangements.

Hope's city government, led by Mayor Altman, has led a drive to get a water well for the community. A recent survey is expected to show that more than 70 per cent of the water will be used for stock and cattle watering.

Formation of a Hope water users association will be considered at the meeting.

Financial arrangements will be the chief matter of discussion. Hope has recently purchased 263 acres of federal land for \$1,950. The land had been declared submerged in 1934 and was then purchased by the federal government.

Purchase of the land is expected to be a part in establishing water for the community.

With more than \$250 daily awaiting first place winners in the annual Lions Turtle Derby Friday and Saturday, many Artesians have already purchased plodding terrapins for a brief four-day training period.

First race in the two-day event will be run at 2:30 Friday on Morris Field—the high school football field. Five or six heats will be run each afternoon before the daily grand prize final race.

Two Years of Drought Ended At Hope By Rain

Some farmers in the Hope community are now beginning to complain about too much water—but it's really all in fun, according to W. E. Rood, editor and publisher of The Penasco Valley News of Hope.

Rood reports that "due to heavy rainfall in the mountains, water came surging down the canal early Tuesday morning and overflowed the canal in several places."

"If one takes a drive over the roads that are passable, it is simply wonderful to note the amount of crops already up and growing."

And, the editor concluded, prospects were that more rain in the mountains would bring still more water to Hope last weekend.

Mrs. E. L. Cox (Artesia Advocate correspondent at Hope, reports at least one former family is investigating a move back to Hope because of the heavy rainfall which have benefitted the area after two years of drought.

Artesian Charged With Issuing 14 Hot Checks

Pablo Padina of 726 Champ Clark avenue, Artesia, has been arrested by Roswell authorities on charges of issuing allegedly worthless checks in Roswell and Carlsbad.

Padina was charged, according to Chaves county deputy sheriff Wilson Wheeler, with issuing four worthless checks in Roswell and 10 in Carlsbad.

He was taken into custody in Artesia and returned to Chaves county for prosecution.

A tangled thread of automobile license identification lead to Padina's arrest, police revealed. An alert woman clerk in a Roswell grocery took down the license of an auto driven by Padina when he cashed a \$35 check at the store.

The number was given to Artesia police, who called the owner. The owner, however, said he had sold the car to another man, who had in turn sold it to a local auto company. The auto company revealed it had been sold to Padina.

Deputy Sheriff Wheeler said that among others, Padina had used the names of Solis, Padilla, and Robles in his alleged hot check activity in Roswell and Carlsbad.

City to Study \$125,000 Bond Proposal

Methods to issue \$125,000 in revenue bonds for improvement of the sewage treatment plant will be studied by Artesia city council when the board meets at 7:30 Wednesday night.

Representatives of bond houses have been notified of the meeting, and a number are expected to attend.

Councilmen will discuss methods of issuing new bonds. It is expected the council will decide to call in existing revenue bond issues, which total \$336,000, for refinancing.

Bond experts have proposed that by recalling the old bonds the city may issue new certificates for them so that all bonds may be on the same level, drawing the same rate of interest.

First Lien Bonds—All bonds would be first lien bonds. Each successive bond lien draws a higher rate of interest. The city council hopes to avoid this, it is understood, by the refinancing.

If the new bonds were issued without the refinancing, the new issue would be fourth lien bonds and would draw a high rate of interest.

It has also been recommended that the city council make the consolidated revenue bond issue an open end issue, which allows the council to issue more revenue bonds any time it sees fit, as long as 1 1/2 times the debt service is incoming from revenues.

The new bond issue would provide about \$90,000 for reconstruction of Artesia's old sewer plant, which has a capacity of 600 gallons per minute. The plant automatically by-passes any flow exceeding 600 gallons per minute, with the result that much sewage is not at all treated.

Out of Operation—The plant has also been out of operation for periods of several days during breakdown of essential equipment. It is believed part of the present plan can be incorporated in the reconstruction, thus lowering costs.

George Herkenhoff, member of the Santa Fe engineering firm of Herkenhoff & Turney, is expected to attend Wednesday night's meeting to consult with the council.

Under customary procedure, the council is expected to open the proposed refinancing and new bond issue to bids among interested bond houses.

Revenue bonds are repaid by revenues from the department they are issued against, and do not result in a tax levy against property owners.

Artesia Top Batting Club in Longhorn, Sixth in Fielding

Artesia climbed to the top of the Longhorn league in club batting, official league statistics revealed Sunday—but the statistics were for games through July 14, before the Drillers began a disappointing home stand.

In 78 games, Artesia has had its men at bat 2,767 games to knock out 829 hits and score 558 runs. The club touched 1,300 bases, hit 152 two-baggers and 20 three-baggers, 94 home runs, stolen 20 bases, and been walked 344 times. Drillers have batted in 500 runs, been struck out 282 times, and hit by pitchers 25 times.

All of which produces a .303 batting average for Artesia, followed by Sweetwater with .296, Odessa .292, San Angelo .287, Roswell .286, Big Spring .284, Midland .279, and Vernon .266.

Drillers are sixth in club fielding. Big Spring leads with .955, followed by Roswell .954, San Angelo .953, Odessa .951, Midland .949, Artesia .948, Vernon .944, and Sweetwater .937.

Joe Bauman again leads individual batting with a .390. League statistician Collier Parris credits Bauman with 30 home runs through last Monday, July 14.

Joe's closest opposition, Pat O'Keefe of Midland, has a .381. Bill Haley, who has played in 33 games and stood at the plate 147 times, has a .374, and Rudy Briner in 78 games has earned .366. Jim Ackers was credited with .325 this week, and Paul Halter .313.

John Alonzo in 70 games has earned a .309, and Pete Pichan has been at the plate 277 times to get a .296. Vince Sarubbi, who has played in 33 games, has chalked up .269, and Mike Rodriguez, at the plate only 58 times, has gathered .241. Bob Pressley in 11 games has gathered .226, Milton Marshall, another Artesia hurler, has played in 14 games, achieved a .133.

Irvin Armin is credited with three wins and no losses to earn 1,000 per cent in league hurling, but has pitched in only five games and completed only two.

Mike Rodriguez and Rooster Mills are tied at 750, and Milton Marshall is right behind them with 714. Rodriguez has hurled in 17 games, completed 12, pitched 131 innings, allowed 83 runs and 126 hits. He has walked 75 and struck out 89.

Marshall has appeared in 11 games, completed three, pitched 64 innings.

Mills has appeared in 15 games, pitched 54 innings, and allowed 23 runs off 53 hits. He has walked 46, struck out 40. He has won 3 and lost one.

Marshall has been in 11 games, completed three, pitched 64 innings. He has allowed 44 runs, 74 hits. He has walked 47 and fanned 44, and won 5 while losing two.

Bob Pressley has earned a .545 in 12 games, completing four of

them and pitching 75 innings. He has won six and lost five. He has given up 88 hits, allowed 44 runs. Pressley has walked 39, struck out 32. Melvin Miller has a .385 with five wins and eight losses to his credit. He has pitched in 73 innings. Frank Fernandez has garnered a .333 average for himself in 14 games, with 64 innings completed.

Four Drillers Are Chosen On All-Star

Two Artesia players—Joe Bauman and Rudy Briner—gained unanimous approval in being named to the 1952 Longhorn league West all-star team, and two other Drillers were awarded berths on the top nine.

Others named from the Driller squad to the all-stars include Mike Rodriguez, top Driller hurler, and Papul Halter, third baseman.

Also receiving unanimous votes were Leo Eastham of Odessa and Keith Nicolls of Odessa.

Bauman has consistently lead or been near the top in the league's batting this year, and Briner has been hovering about in the top five, being one of the league's top sluggers of two-base hits.

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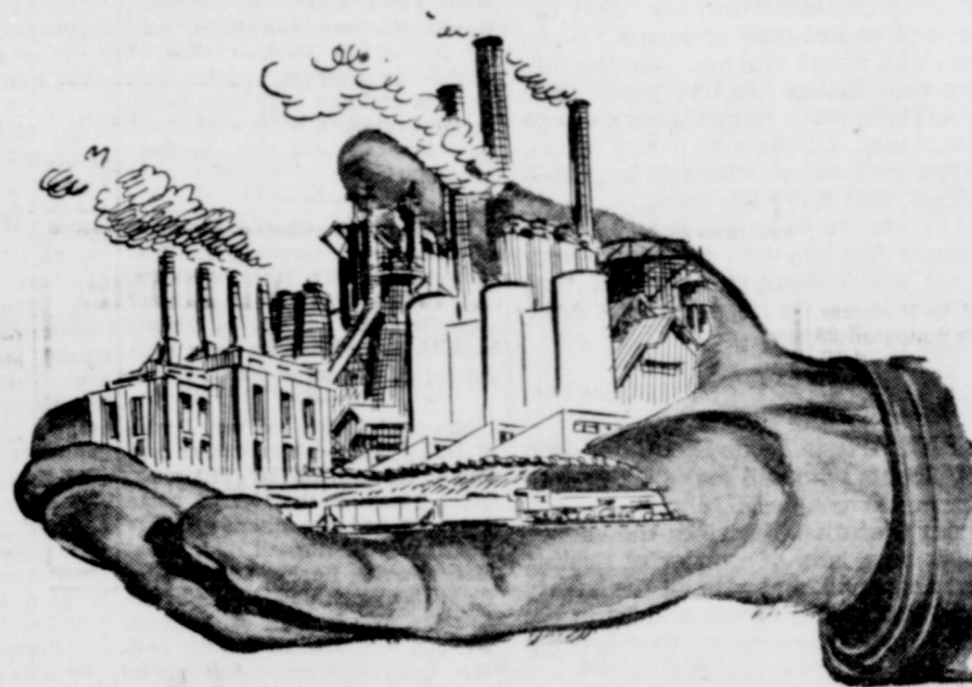

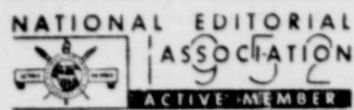

RESIDENTS AT LAKEWOOD south of Artesia are increasingly angry over engineering of the new pavement from the main highway into that community. The old New Mexico idea of allowing water to run over the road rather than creasingly angry over engineering of the new pavement and with what may turn out to be disastrous results.

North fork of Seven rivers has been running wild around the new road, what with smashed culverts, those dips in the road, and other points which residents consider as snafu.

Some residents claimed they warned engineers before construction of the road that just such a situation might occur as has cropped up in the last two weeks. Twice within 10 days rains have swollen North fork, sending it swirling across the road, digging out big chunks of asphalt.

While our friends of the Lakewood community are properly grateful for construction of the road, they're the type of people that like to see a job well done—and like to be able to use their new road even when North fork is removing tons of precious top soil in a boiling current out-of-bounds across the road.

Yorel Harris, field scout executive, describes the wilderness area the boys will visit as a land of wonderful fishing, abounding with game large and small, and with all the beauty of a wilderness area. While almost 110 Scouts will be in the area at the same time, they'll never see one another because of its vast extent.

Yet, Harris reports, he must accompany the boys again this year as a leader although he has already made the trip five times and would gladly step aside to allow another man or two to accompany the Southeastern New Mexico group.

Harris says that despite the attractions of the trip, men penses are paid for the leaders accompanying the boys. But the leaders must be in good physical shape so they can stand the rigors of those wilderness treks—and keep up with a bunch of teenagers.

"The men who can get away for two weeks to make the trip are those who usually own their businesses," Harris says, "but by the time they own their businesses they're usually too old or else not in good physical shape to make the trip. The younger men who would be ideal leaders are employed, and just can't get off for that amount of time."

"We'll bet there is a young man reading this somewhere in North Eddy county who may be able to arrange his time and business affairs so that he might make the trip next year. It's a good opportunity for some man—with no cost to himself—to get away from it all, enjoy some dandy fishing, and have the gratification of leading a group of outstanding young men.

Water for Hope

UNLIKE OUR NEIGHBORS at Lakewood, the folks out at Hope haven't been bothered for many a year with floods sweeping across their fields and roads. But the community's lively petticoat government, with some assists from mountain cloudbursts, are working hard to get at least enough water to irrigate the rich land in the Hope area.

Hope's delegation to Washington titillated some bureaucrats and Congressmen, who got a refreshing relief from the usual brand of lobbying groups when the ladies from New Mexico swept into the nation's capitol. The ladies got what they went after—the right to buy back some land which the government had declared sub-marginal back in 1933.

Now the energetic government at Hope is having a survey made of prospective water users in its area. If the survey people find that 70 per cent of the water will be used to irrigate farm land and water cattle, then the FHA will stand behind the lady government with some most important cash backing and Hope can drill some wells to make the desert bloom.

This energy in trying to get water has even left the petticoats most severe critic—a lone wolf by the name of Earl Miller—back in the dust that marked the old Hope. We think Miller has been left behind anyway—we haven't had one of those scorching letters, written in his own inimitable style attacking the petticoats, for some time. Miller is probably frowning mightily on the publicity the ladies have got—he says they're always trying to get that, you know.

We think the ladies will get their well and will lay some of that dust around Hope, besides producing some fine crops there. The petticoats have had a record of success in just about everything they've turned to—including water wells.

Inside WASHINGTON

Capital Newsmen Cagoy About Election Outcome

Free Europe and Russia, Too Eye American Politicking

Special to Central Press
WASHINGTON—The press table in the Senate and House restaurant on Capitol Hill in Washington are generally recognized as accurate barometers on political events and this year the keynote is caution on the outcome of the November elections.

The newspaper and radio reporters undoubtedly remember with pain the fact that in 1948, scarcely a voice was heard at the daily luncheon roundtable predicting that a candidate named Harry S. Truman would win.

The result was that on the Wednesday after the surprise election, a number of red-faced newsmen sat about—a few claiming they knew it all along but most of them looking merely sheepish.

This season, every prediction is accompanied with a loophole, the Fourth Estate dopesters keep their necks carefully tucked in and all the bet are "it" with no takers.

In addition, there is a genuine feeling that this year's presidential contest will be close with the outcome in doubt until the last moment.

Whatever the result, though, it's anticipated that on the morning after election, there'll be some who'll be there proclaiming like Monday morning quarterbacks that they knew it all along.

AS OTHERS SEE US—State department officials report that the man-in-the-street in Europe is just as keyed up about the United States political conventions and the November balloting as Joe Doakes, American, is in this country.

Department spokesmen emphasized recently while testifying in favor of ratifying the Western German peace contracts that not only the Free European nations but Russia and her satellites as well are keeping a close watch on the United States political maneuvering.

Of particular interest to the housewife overseas and her husband is what new viewpoints may develop on the question of foreign aid during the campaign debate on foreign policy.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's nomination as Republican presidential candidate in which he bested Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio was reported abroad with unconcealed satisfaction in the belief that the former North Atlantic Treaty commander will insist on a full quota of assistance, both economic and military, for our European Allies.

From the rulers of the Kremlin, there was no official reaction but it was expected to result in a new wave of propaganda assailing America as a nation of warmongers because Ike is a military man.

Since the treaty took effect last spring, Soviet broadcasters have been screaming that the pact "sold Japan into the bondage of United States imperialism."

Undeterred, the Japanese have begun building up a healthy trade with the Free World and the Russians have found themselves on the outside looking in.

Washington observers note that just recently, Radio Moscow suddenly has been talking sweetly about the possibility of a peace treaty between the Soviet Union and Japan.

There is just one hitch in their proposal. They demand that United States security forces in Japan must go, a proposition the Japanese aren't likely to accept.
