Closing Third Street

NORTH THIRD STREET has been temporarily closed from Main to Texas street as an experiment in traffic control, according to Artesia city council and city officials who gave advice to the council.

The city council asked that action be taken in the 200 block of W. Main street because of congestion which slowed traffic and increased accident hazards there. The matter was turned over to the council's street committee and Chief of Police Earl D. Westfall for study and recommendation.

The committee and Chief Westfall recommended a noleft-turn policy at the intersection of Main and Third streets. This would eliminate autos going counter to the heavy flow of traffic, the officials felt. Directional street markings would also prevent crossing of Main street from one part of Third street to the other.

This would relieve congestion in the block and make for a smoother flow of traffic, the city officers felt. As an added measure to give the traffic control proposal a complete test, Third street was blocked.

We believe traffic has been speeded up as a result of the action in this particular area. We further believe that, despite some charges, there is no skullduggery afoot in closing Third; the city council has not fully explored legal angles involved should they wish to permanently close N. Third at the end of the six-months test period.

Because it has never been done before is no sign that the city has not grown to such a point that it now needs some steps to control traffic. Artesia, as it grows, must meet the problems of a growing city. Traffic problems are among the most severe facing any growing community.

We believe the council acted wisely in not permanently closing North Third. The temporary closing will enable police and others to check effect of closing on flow of traffic.

But critics of the council also have a point in wondering why other streets were not also regulated for smoother traffic. South Roselawn street is one of the most congested, especially at the entrance to Main, and is also congested many times at Masonic temple and near the Baptist church, where parking is permitted on both sides of the street. Stop signs, which are now heavy triangular chunks of steel sunk in the

Educational Fund Gives University \$50,000 Program

The Fund for the advancement of education has set up a \$50,000 scholarship program to be admin-istered by the University of New Mexico for competent students who otherwise could not go to college.

UNM President Tom L. Popejoy made the announcement today after receiving a letter from Dr Alvin C. Eurich, vice-president of the fund, which was established by the Ford Foundation, confirming the pilot scholarship program for the 1952-53 year.

Under the terms of the agree ment, personnel officials at the University of New Mexico will certify for the scholarship fund state residents of high ability who come from families of low economic level. Students may attend any college but their work will, accord ing to terms of the agreement, necessarily be in the liberal arts field, Popejoy said.

The university president said that the scholarships would not all be of equal amounts but would be set up according to individual needs and could run up to \$1,000 per student for the year.

The survivors include his wife and three children. What has been provided by the county is not sufficient and the public will provide the trust fund for these children.

Over this state we have city and county officers working for a small salary considering the haardzs and the dangers of their jobs. We have never paid our enforcement officers the salaries they should receive because of the long hours involved, and the things we expect them to do.

When the matter comes up for discussion with the city councils or the county commissioners it is always the same story-we can't afford it.

We have noticed that governing bodies can always find money to do the things they want to do but seldom find money to do what certain taxpayers want done.

But the fact remains that we, the taxpayers, are employing these peace officers. We are providing the funds to pay their salaries and we should not only be providing sufficient funds but we should be providing ample funds to be sure they are insured to the extent of at least \$10,000 each. That is small enough;





The commodity credit corporation program providing loans to farmers to finance the construction or purchase of new farm storage facilities for grains and other storable crops has been extended by the U.S. department of agriculture.

The original loan program initiated in June, 1949, and scheduled to expire June 30, 1951, was extended through June 30, 1952, and is now further extended through June 30, 1953. As of May 3, 1952, a total of 29,898 loans of approximately \$34,357,000 had been approved for farm storage structures having an aggregate capacity of over 122 million bushels.

The department also announced that beginning July 1, 1952, the loans will be available up to 80 per cent (previously 85 per cent) of the cost of the structure, to any owner-operator, tenant, landlord or partnership of producers wishing to erect a facility which will meet requirements for eligible storage under the price support program. Loans will be payable in four annual installments (previously five installments), or earlier at the option of the borrower. The first installment will be payable twelve months after the loan is disbursed by CCC. (Previously, the first installment for all loans was scheduled to become payable at the end of January in each calendar year.) Interest on loans will be at the rate of 4 per cent a year, as here-tofore. Loans will be available through local lending agencies or from production and marketing administration county committees. The farm storage facility loan program is available to producers of wheat, corn ,oats, rye, barley, grain sorghums, soybeans, dry edible beans and peas, rice, peanuts, cottonseed, flax seed, say seeds, pasture seeds, and winter cover crop


