



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

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#### **Kiwanis Civic Center**

DESPITE THEIR LACK of profit on the Air Force football game held here Nov. 1. Artesia Kiwanis have gone ahead with their plans to launch a building program which may result in a large, 26,000 squarefoot civic center.

Kiwanis found that idea too good to abandon even if their first fund-rasing project didn't go very far into the black. From other sources the organization has gathered \$1,000 to place in a special building fund at a local bank as a kick-off contribution on the fund-drive for that building.

There are many details yet to be settled, with selection of a site perhaps paramount among decisions facing the Kiwanis board of directors. Already one unofficial offer by city officials has been made to Kiwanis, with the suggestion the new field house be located just east of Driller Field.

Plans are now being drawn for the 130 by 200 foot field house-type building, which would have a seating capacity of 3,000 on roll-away bleachers. A portable basketball floor of the sectional type found satisfactory in many other municipal centers would allow REA Traveler and high school basketball games to be played in the building.

Construction cost of just the building itself will be over \$60,000, Kiwanis estimates, and final cost with installation of dressing rooms, those expensive bleachers, and other items will put the building's cost in the vicinity of \$100,000 or more.

The project is mighty big-but we think it's one to set the imagination of big people on fire. Such a building will give the city tremendous advantages, certainly in ways that even now have not been foreseen by even the most enthusiastic of those sponsoring the indea, Uses for such a building range from athletics (it's large enough for pass plays in football practice) to the Eddy County Livestock Show and Sale to large assemblies and

Kiwanis is immediately concerned with housing for the annual livestock show and sale it jointly sponsors. That show has developed so under Kiwanis sponsorship it is a two-day affair, requiring suitable over-night space for animals and domestic exhibits. There is no building at present in North Eddy county large enough to accommodate

We cannot think of a segment of North Eddy county's population which does not stand to benefit tremendously over the years from such a building program. Kiwanis, an organization with slightly over 20 consistently active members, deserves a rousing acclamation for its leadership, enthusiasm, and long-range interest in the community's development.

#### Thirteenth and Main

ONE OF THE MOST frustrating good works ever undertaken in a city is that of traffic control at Main and Thirteenth streets, where several dozen youngsters cross that speedway two or four times a day.

The city at one time erected its own four-way red blinker there, but state crews tore the thing out, and the state highway department has steadily refused to permit re-installation of either the blinker or a three-light control.

Later came an idea to put curbs on each of the four corners, but parking and traffic considerations have complicated that idea. although it is still alive.

Chief of Police Earl Westfall has even suggested building a pedestrian underpass under the street, but city officials in general, including the chief, think that would be mighty expensive.

The city is going to zone the intersection for 15 miles an hour, paint crossings, set up school zone signs, and continue to work on getting the curbs in as a starting place for youngsters, who might then have less worries about a hot rod cutting a close corner

Some parents have advocated setting up safety islands in the middle of the street there, and it's an idea to be considered. Parents also point out that resurfacing of Thirteenth street has its drawbacks as well as advantages, for cars can now merrily spee on it without having to fear for axle-busting chuckholes.

It's gotten to the point where even saying "at least do something about it" seems

Maybe the state highway department men, who have either torn out the ideas Artesia thought would work or advocated idethat won't work should come down and solve the difficulty themselves.

#### Grid Championship

ARTESIA EDUCATORS have taken a lead in "doing something" about revamping New Mexico's football set-up, which as seen this year places a premium on a weak schedule and fails to reward the accomplishments of truly outstanding teams.

Artesia called for a resolution at last Tuesday's district 5 athletic association meeting of the state's 67 football-playing schools "in the very near future." The Artesia group, headed by Travis Stovall, vicepresident for district 5, made plain it would not advocate any specific form of set-up, although it feels there must be a play-off. It is believed by the Artesia group that educators can get together, thrash over all proposals advanced to date, and decide on a system which would achieve the desired results.

Several weks ago we ran an editorial pointing out almost state-wide acceptance of the AA conference proposal, the first to come after the snafu which made Farmington the rather embarrassed state A conference champion. The uncritical segment of the public had barely had time to digest that and begin beating the drums, when along came the north-south division and play-off idea from Bill Bailey, Santa Fe New Mexican sports editor.

We pointed out these were well and good, but were after all a jumping-ff place for something better. Some sports fans were incredulous-could there truly be more ideas for a championship set-up?

There have been more advanced since then and we predict that when those schoolmen get together there'll be even more forth-

To date we have:

1.—Establishment of an AA conference with anywhere from 11 to 14 of the top football schools, playing each other like mad Alternatives of the idea provide for the undefeated team to be declared champion. for a play-off in the case of a tie or just f the fun of it between the two top teams on the basis of points.

2.—Establishment of North and South conference with the winner from each to meet not later than the first wek in December for a play-off to decide the state championship. At least one play-off and probably two would be involved.

3.—Division of the state into four geographical areas, the winners to meet at the end of the season, with three play-offs at the minumum involved.

4.—Insertion of a play-off provision into the present system.

Artesia's delegation to that state-wide conference will go into it with the main idea of securing a play-off under one of the many proposals to be considered by the group.

Artesia certainly has much at stake in formation of a better system for football. which although the biggest athletic activity in the state, is still the only sport without a championship provision.

We wish Travis Stovall no disruption in his school business, but we're sure he'd welcome and be responsive to ideas sounded by the community as long as they are short of hiring a professional team.

#### THOUGHTS IN PRINT-

#### 'Guilt By Association' Is Phrase To Be Studied, Used Carefully

WHAT IS THE MEANING OF the much-used and mis-used phrase "guilty by association," asks Sidney Hook in a discussion of the over-worked three-word phrase in the American Mercury.

Tackling the catchphrase in a thorough-going way, Hook, who is chairman of the New York university philosophy department, points out the phrase "guilty by association" is ambigious because of the ambiguity of key terms 'guilt" and "association.

There is criminal guilt which makes a man subject to penal sanctions-fines, loss of his liberty, and, in extreme cases, even of his life. There is moral guilt which is not legally punishable but which may incur, in addition to a judgement of blame and disapproval, certain social sanctions from the community," Hook declares.

"Except to those who regard the particular laws that are being violated as unjust, criminal guilt usually carries with it the stigma of moral guilt," adds the writer

'The kind of situation in which the phrase 'guilt by association' most frequently applied is one in which moral guilty is in-·volved," continues the author.

"Common sense and common practice, reflected in such expressions as 'a man is judged by the company he keeps', 'birds of a feather', etc., recognize the wisdom of appraising certain kinds of association in considering the fitness of an individual to fill positions requiring public confidence. A crony of notorious gamblers is not likely to be considered for the post of bank teller. He would be eligible to drive a dump truck but hardly an

"'Association' is a generic word for the most diverse kind of relationship among men. For example, a man joins the Communist party and by virtue of his membership actively cooperates in subverting the purposes of the institution in which the Communist party is secretly functioning. A second man joins a cooperative or a trade union which Communists subsequently join or capture. A third man, perhaps a


