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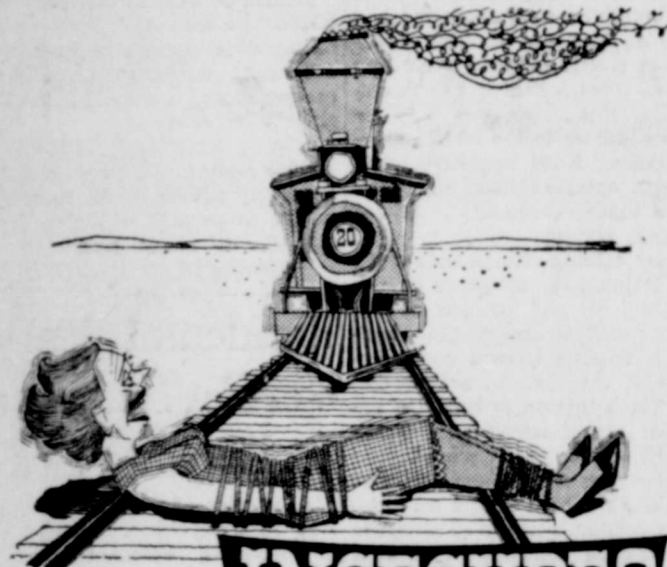

In addition to signing Halter, Perry announced this week he has arranged for spring training at McAllen, Texas, site of last year's spring training camp.

Perry and several players will leave Artesia for spring camp on March 16.

Perry was accompanied to McAllen by Joe Bauman, last year's outstanding Driller and the Longhorn league home run king.

Perry reported "we're now buying and selling" mailing out contracts, and "dickering with a couple of important players that could add a lot to Artesia's growing reputation as a power club."

"I'm kidded about it, but I believe in power baseball, the kind Joe Bauman and Joe Fortin show the fans. Fortin is another Bauman, and I think the fans are going to be mighty proud of him before the 1953 season's over."

Perry grew earnest for a moment in discussing his general plans this week-end when he touched on the question of finances.

"We need all the money we can possibly muster," he declared. "This is time of year when we're buying players, and that means paying out money. We've got to buy equipment, and must be ready to pay a big piece of cash for spring training expenses, which are considerable."

"We need money now to build with, and the people who have received invoices from our office will be doing a great favor by sending their checks just as soon as convenient."

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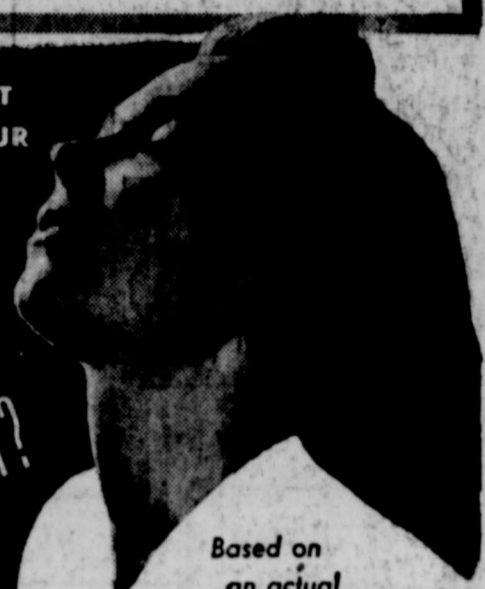

Protests About UN

A GOOD MANY Americans are beginning to wonder whether the United Nations can or ever will accomplish its noble purposes.

From the first there has been high hope. People like to think that an effort is being made to bring about settlements of differences between countries in a peaceful manner.

We like to feel we are making some progress.

Failures before should have taught us some lessons but apparently they haven't. It begins to seem that the refusal of our Congress, at least the United States Senate, to make us a part of the League of Nations was right.

The argument has always been advanced we destroyed the League of Nations by not joining it. We were honest and sincere in not joining it just as we were honest and sincere in joining the United Nations.

Yet today the assemblies of the United Nations are not even opened with prayer. Many church and religious organizations are urging by resolution and otherwise that Divine guidance be invoked when these sessions are held.

The only peace plan, which will ever work, is the one which God gave the world through His Son, Jesus Christ. Yet we open the sessions of an organization organized and dedicated to peace without ever thinking of the Divine Ruler.

We sometimes wonder whether there is any hope the United Nations can or ever will succeed. We know it will not succeed in its original purpose unless we do have God's help. All Christians in this world know that. All, who believe in a Supreme Being, know that to be true.

Up to now America has provided the building for the United Nations; it provided the expensive site on which to erect the building; it has paid over 50 per cent of the operating costs of the United Nations; it has provided the soldiers for the only police action of the organization; it has footed most of the bills; took the casualties; provided the equipment and materials.

As a nation we have done more than that—we have permitted the United Nations to be used as a propaganda sounding board not only for Russia, which we saved in the last war, but even for China, which is not a member and which we have taken care of for years and years.

Even a baby, so we are told, once burned fears the fire. But we are only afraid of Russia seemingly, and afraid of hurting someone's feeling or making them mad. And we permit them to use us and to abuse the organization which we foster and sponsor.

We still have those clamoring for the

United Nations because of its high and noble purpose. We will never achieve its goal or its purpose with the attitude which has and is being displayed. We can never have an organization to work out peaceful means for settling differences between nations until those holding membership in the organization are honest and sincere and in reality desire to find peaceful ways to settle wars.

Up to now there has been no indication the members of the United Nations wants to do that. And unless there is a change in the attitude and a change in our attitude that will never prove to be the case. Up to now the outlaw nations have sought to dominate, control and dictate to the organization. We aren't going to make good nations out of the outlaw nations.

And we aren't going to accomplish very much unless we are honest, sincere and seek God's help and guidance and demand that the organization be used only for the noble and high purpose for which it was formed.

Why Would They Stay?

THERE IS NO QUESTION but what the armed services, all branches of it, are very much concerned about the small per cent of individuals drafted into services remaining for further duty after their 24 months.

They probably also are concerned about the inability to keep volunteers in service after the enlistment period has expired.

There are a good many reasons for this as gleaned from those in service.

One of the big reasons is the promises which are made by the recruiters; the failure of the armed services to keep these promises; and the ability of all branches of the armed services to put a man to a task regardless of his training, with which he is not familiar.

It does seem that after that many years there would come a day and a time when men qualified for a definite field of service would be used in that field. Yet those trained in a field are given something in some other field.

For instance, we had a public information officer for a long period trained and qualified in another field. He had no experience in public relations and public information, and only knew what he learned while he was at that task. Yet we will bet there are men at White Sands qualified for newspaper work doing other things for which they are not qualified.

We know a man qualified for public information work in the Marines, but he isn't doing that type of work—he is doing something else and those not qualified for this work are attempting to do it. We know an individual qualified in photography in the Navy but he is being taught to be an engineer instead of being permitted to do the work in which he has had training.

We know one in the Army, who was a contractor before being called into service, and so he is a military policeman, although a good builder and carpenter is needed.

This is not true in just one branch of the service—it is true in all of them. And the result is that a good many boys, who perhaps would have been far happier in service, are dissatisfied because of the lack of consideration given to them and their qualifications.

Some one is to blame for this condition and this situation. You can be sure that it exists throughout the service and you also can be sure that nothing is going to be done about it.

The military may be able to treat the draftees as they please, and they are doing just that but you can bet that it is the draftee who has the final say when the end of his draft period approaches.

There are some changes needed in the armed forces besides just halting the waste, extravagance and the inefficiency which exists today.

Those men completing their enlistments will show considerable different attitudes when a different attitude is displayed toward them during their service periods.

NEW MEXICO EDITORS ARE SAYING—

Legislature Should Make Reform of One-Man Czarship Over New Mexico's Liquor Control

LIQUOR CONTROL

Liquor industry spokesmen and state officials conferred with Gov. Mechem last week on possible changes in the liquor control law, and while it is reported no definite decisions were reached, it is surprising that Gov. Mechem was quoted as saying it appeared doubtful that efforts would be made at the coming legislative session to supplant the present one-man liquor director set-up with a liquor board.

There has been wide-spread public demand for many years to change the system whereby one appointive official has sole power in the issuance of liquor licenses and the enforcement of the liquor regulations. He has the power to overrule the recommendations of municipalities and counties on issuances of licenses. In fact he is a one-man czar. It is too much power to put in the hands of one man. The system leads to abuses, instances of which in former state administrations are fresh in the minds of legislators and people.

New Mexico originally had a board which had general supervision over the liquor director. This or some other system should be established. — Albuquerque Journal.

HELP THE LITTLE MAN FIRST

Yesterday it was predicted in Washington that the excess profits tax may be allowed to die on June 30, when the law expires that authorizes the levy.

Argument against the excess profits tax is that it throttles business and industrial expansion, and that it is an unfair and discriminatory tax.

Those who have paid any attention to the matter will agree that it is not improperly labeled. But there are other income taxes that also throttle initiative, and hold up plans maybe to the point where they have to be abandoned.

Take the case of a young chap under 21, holding down a job and trying to accumulate enough to go to college. His income tax payment will run around \$10 per week on an average, perhaps. He won't be a citizen with a voice in making decisions until he is 21, except for income tax purposes and military duty.

Chances are that tax take each week will be sufficient to wreck his plans to train himself for something better. Isn't that throttling initiative?

Admitting that the excess profits tax is unfair and discriminatory, it looks like government should take care of its little people first, allowing them to keep more of the money they earn by the sweat of their faces, so that they can live better, educate their young better, and lay away something for the future. — Roswell Record.

Athletics Are Educational Necessity, UNM Prexy Says

Athletics are "part and parcel" of well-rounded educational programs in secondary schools and colleges, and as such should be kept under educational controls, Tom L. Popejoy, University of New Mexico president, told Artesia Bulldog banquet-goers Friday night.

In pumping for athletics as a part of educational programs, Popejoy also suggested to Artesia's athletes that they consider New Mexico schools when making their choice of institutions for higher education.

The UNM president prefaced his talk by noting it was his first before a football banquet.

Athletics are primarily for participation by the student, he said in opening his address. As such athletics fill a need in the student, and provide an activity he enjoys.

"All activities have some relationship to the development of the individual to his fullest stature," the UNM president declared.

"There are some glib terms used today in describing athletics, such as the one 'organized athletics should be an educational program or else not attached to the schools.'"

"I favor a sentiment which says that athletics should be able to fill the individual's capacity and the group's capacity for achievement," he added.

A deep-seated desire to excel

in competitive situations is a part of human nature operating in schools as well as in business and other fields, Popejoy stated. Athletics offer an avenue of development along positive lines for this drive.

Setting a standard for athletics, he stated: "If the school adopts a program according to the community's wishes, as well as in conformance with educational standards, the school is promoting a good athletic program."

"On the athletic fields of the nation are being done some of the 'finest teaching jobs' in American education today, the college president said. "Minds and bodies are being developed on an individual and group basis to achieve results according to ability."

Athletics as well as other activities drawing the highest interests of the student are direct motivation for interest in school, he declared. Athletics and other activities also act as a cohesive force, coordinating the school in the community, both between each other and within themselves.

Citing lessons taught in athletics, the UNM president declared sportsmanship, the will to win, and the ability to turn defeat to a positive lesson are learned on the athletic field.

"No educational institution can face up to needs of its students unless activities are included on its program," Popejoy declared.

THIS LAND OF ENCHANTMENT—

Sheriff Deplores Mixing Juvenile With Adult Prisoners in Crowded Eddy County Hoosgow

MIXING JUVENILES IN with adult prisoners at the Eddy county jail in Carlsbad is a practice roundly deplored by Sheriff Bill High, who in reporting the arrangement said there is no other alternative under the present jail set-up.

Sheriff High this week had 43 prisoners in the jail—15 of them juveniles.

"It's a deplorable situation," the sheriff said. Capacity of the juvenile ward at the jail is five. As a result, the sheriff is forced to mix his youngsters with the prisoners.

Juvenile cases are now in the hands of the district judge entirely, and some Carlsbad officials, including the police chief and police judge, are backing legislation which would take juvenile cases out of the hands of the district judge and thus avoiding waits in jail for the court-appointed juvenile officer to study the cases.

THE MAN WHO CALLED representative of Pat Hurley before the November election to offer Hurley a substantial number of votes for \$500 has been ordered to serve a three-year suspended prison sentence.

Manuel Ruiz, 32, had offered Pablo Garcia, Hurley's co-campaign manager, and later Hurley himself, a number of votes for

\$500. He pleaded no contest to a five-count complaint filed by the Bernalillo county assistant DA.

BUILDING OVER AT LOVINGTON set an all-time record in 1952, more than doubling 1951's total. Permits for 1952 totalled \$2,896,900, almost exactly double the 1951 permit total of \$1,438,000.

Larger portion of the building was residential, but the Lovington Press believes business construction will boom in the near future as it grows to serve the residential increase. Largest single permit of the year was for a \$285,000 elementary school in south Lovington.

JACK SITTON, EDITOR OF the Carlsbad Current-Argus for 10, these six years, opened his very own public relations office in Carlsbad yesterday after resigning his C-A post.

He'll be replaced by a top newsman—Jim Barber, editor of the Raton Range for many years and one of the best-known, best respected editors in New Mexico.

Sitton will have the public relations accounts of four of the potash companies in the Carlsbad area, and will "represent the expanding potash industry in New Mexico."

THERE ARE MORE LIQUOR

dispensaries than food stores in New Mexico, according to Marcus Griffin in the Eddy County News. Also, all liquor sold, wholesale or retail, is for cash, with no charge accounts.

To boot, prices are fixed to block price cutting and competition.

A SUIT HAS BEEN ENTERED in district court over in Sierra county charge that Truth or Consequences officials have illegally diverted and transferred funds from receipts and earnings of the utility and sewer system to the city's general fund.

The suit, entered by a citizen, asks that a receiver be appointed to operate the utility and sewer department under the court's direction to accomplish the "objects and purposes of the laws of the state of New Mexico."

Transfers from the special funds were \$24,000 a year for three years straight, the claim says.

THE STATE'S BOARD OF educational finance is going back over its budget recommendations for New Mexico's seven colleges and three other state schools.

When it meets Dec. 29, the state board will attempt to bring budgets within the present year's income, as instructed by State Comptroller Ed Hartman.

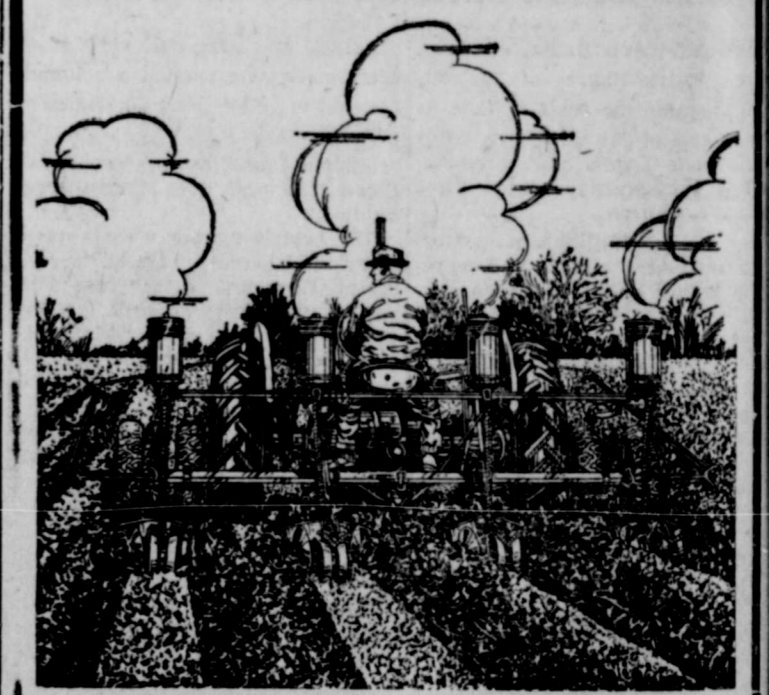

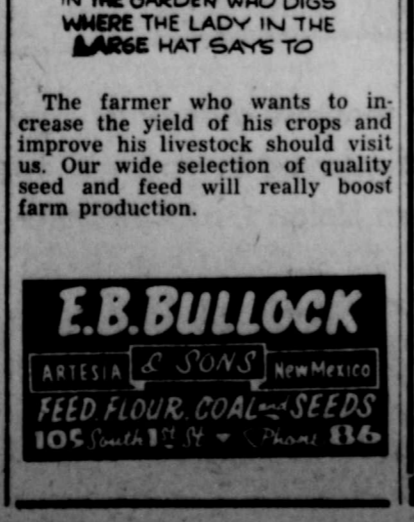

Death of Ernest Franklin Is Second In Two Wars for Hagerman Family

Very little additional information has been received in regard to the loss of a Navy bomber which crashed into the Sea of Japan Dec. 26, taking the life of Ernest Franklin of Hagerman and nine other crewmen.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Franklin of Hagerman.

This is the second son of the Franklin's to lose his life in the service of his country. An older brother, David Franklin, passed away on the Bataan Death March and lies in the United States Military cemetery at Manila, where Ernest visited his grave some months ago.

The PBM naval patrol bomber is reported to have had engine trouble on a routine flight and in trying to get the engine started it broke loose and fell, but not clear

of the plane. The pilot was forced to crash-land his plane in a heavy sea with high winds blowing.

A destroyer hastened to the spot and four of the crew members were saved. Both the plane commander, Lt. Anderson, and first pilot, Lt. J.G. Bancroft, were considered excellent pilots; both lost their lives.

Mr. and Mrs. Franklin have received several communications since the accident explaining why the plane was crash-landed but it is not known why the engine should have failed.

Mrs. Anderson, widow of the commander, wrote to the bereaved parents, stating that her husband felt that his crew was a particularly fine one.

Ernest Franklin was born and reared in Hagerman where he attended school. He volunteered for

service in the Navy the day he was 17. After boot camp he did office work as he had been a good typist in high school, then later he transferred to naval patrol duty. He was just a few months over 19 years of age when he lost his life.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. N. Franklin; three brothers, Clayton, a World War II veteran; Paul and John D., both serving in the Navy; two sisters, Mrs. Jody Troublefield of Hagerman and Mrs. A. C. Yielding of Roswell; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Daugherty of Alice, Texas.

Meanwhile, Artesia drug stores reported record numbers of prescriptions being filled, easily breaking single day records for any time in the city's history.

Doctors pointed out new, modern drugs were lessening severity of flu effects, and complications are developing in about one case in 100.

Nevertheless, doctors urged extreme caution in caring for flu cases, especially in requesting that persons feeling the slightest symptoms remain at home.

Symptoms include sore throat, upset stomach, body aches, or nausea and dizziness.

Persons not yet exposed to flu may develop a resistance by being treated with a flu virus injection, which takes one to two weeks to develop to maximum effectiveness.

Hospital Crowded—
Artesia General hospital this week-end was reported filled to capacity with some patients placed in corridors to accommodate overflow.

The epidemic is regarded as the worst in the city's history, but of much less severity in individual cases than in the past because of use of modern drugs.

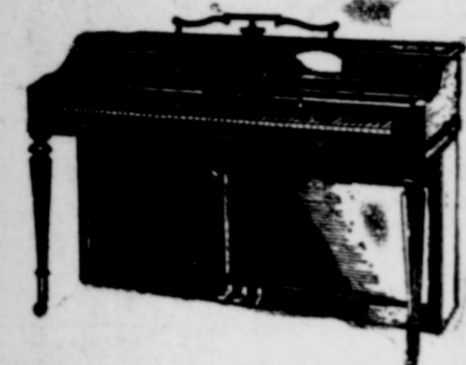

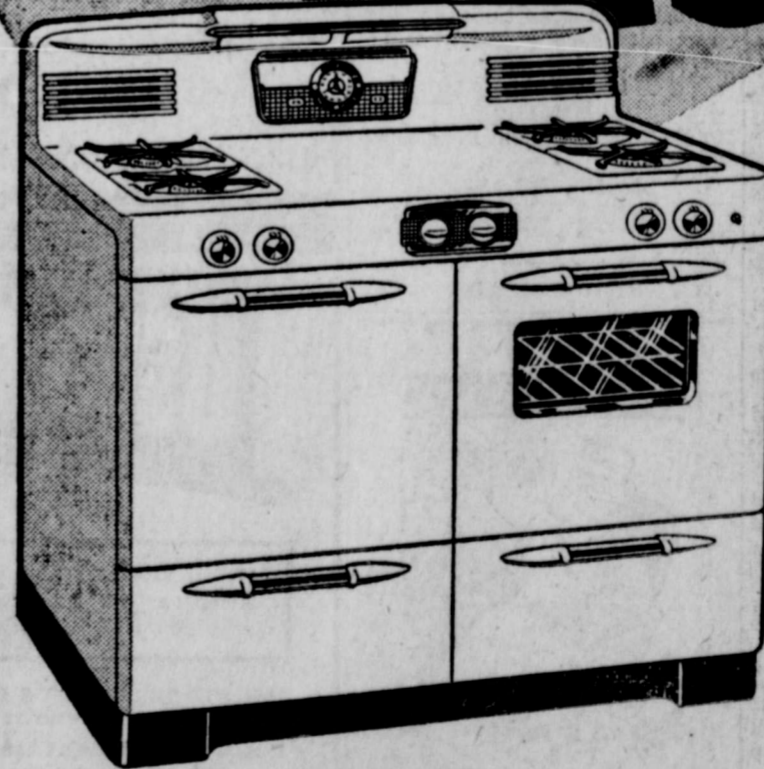
