

## **Population** Nears 10,000 In City Limits

No matter how you figure it, Artesia as of now is a city with 10,000 population-and still growing.

City reports Monday indicated 2,486 water meters connected in the city limits. Water meter connections generally are regarded as the most accurate indication of city population between federal census-takings.

An average of 4.15 persons per water meter gives a population figure of 10,316.

A more conservative figure of in even 4 gives 9,944, just 56 shy of the magic 10,000 figure.

And use of 4.3 average in effect at the time of 1950 census gives a population of 10,689. This is generally regarded as too high by most city and chamber of commerce officials.

Population of Artesia and its immediate environs is estimated at about 12,000, according to application of similar measures.

This year's 2,486 water meters

is an increase of 12 per cent over thé 2,226 final total for 1951. Other growth indicators for the city hover between 10 and 15 per

# Flu Precautions

Flu Epidemic Closes Schools;

against the mild influenza which has reached nearepidemic proportons in Artesa, according to Artesia

Here are the steps you can take to help curb the epidemic, and to stay healthy yourself:

1.-Avoid crowds, public gatherings, and even small groups just as much as you can.

2.- If you have flu symptoms, stay away from public place and other people-don't help to spread flu. 3.-Consult your family doctor at once if you have

flu symptoms-sore throat, an upset stomach, muscular aches, dizziness. 4.—If you are fairly sure you've not yet been exposed,

a flu virus vaccine may be of help to you in staying with your activities, but this takes one to two weeks to build full protection in your body.

5.-Maintain your general physical condition by eating proper foods and getting plenty of sleep, fresh air, and physical activity in proper amounts.

Only one or two cases in between 100 and 200 cases of flu have developed complications, such as pneumonia. The flu now spreading is fairly mild and complications are infrequent. But if you or members of your family, develop symptoms, consult your doctor at once.

#### Protests About UN

GOOD MANY Americans are beginning to wonder whether the United Nations can or ever will accomplish its noble pur-

From the first there has been high hope. People like to think that an effort is being made to bring about settlements of differences between countries in a peaceful

We like to feel we are making some

Failures before should have taught us some lessons but apparently they haven't. It begins to seem that the refusal of our Congress, at least the United States Senate, to make us a part of the League of Nations was

The argument has always been advanced we destroyed the League of Nations by not joining it. We were honest and sincere in not joining it just as we were honest and sincere in joining the United Nations.

Yet today the assemblies of the United Nations are not even opened with prayer. Many church and religious organizations are urging by resolution and otherwise that Divine guidance be invoked when these sessions

The only peace plan, which will ever work, is the one which God gave the world through His Son, Jesus Christ. Yet we open the sessions of an organization organized and dedicated to peace without ever thinking of the Divine Ruler.

We sometimes wonder whether there is any hope the United Nations can or ever will succeed. We know it will not succeed in its original purpose unless we do have God's help. All Christians in this world know that. All, who believe in a Supreme Being, know that to be true.

Up to now America has provided the building for the United Nations; it provided the expensive site on which to erect the building; it has paid over 50 per cent of the operating costs of the United Nations; it has provided the solders for the only police action of the organization; it has footed most of the bills; took the casualties; provided the equipment and materials.

As a nation we have done more than that—we have permitted the United Nations to be used as a propaganda sounding board not only for Russia, which we saved in the last war, but even for China, which is not a member and which we have taken care of for years and years.

Even a baby, so we are told, once burned fears the fire. But we are only afraid of Russia seemingly, and afraid of hurting someone's feeling or making them mad. And we permit them to use us and to abuse the organization which we foster and sponsor.

THIS LAND OF ENCHANTMENT-

We still have those clamoring for the

#### United Nations because of its high and noble purpose. We will never achieve its goal or its purpose with the attitude which has and is being displayed. We can never have an organization to work out peaceful means for settling differences between nations until those holding membership in the organization are honest and sincere and in reality desire to find peaceful ways to settle wars.

Up to now there has been no indication the members of the United Nations wants to do that. And unless there is a change in the attitude and a change in our attitude that will never prove to be the case. Up to now the outlaw nations have sought to dominate, control and dictate to the organization. We aren't going to make good nations out of the outlaw nations.

And we aren't going to accomplish very much unless we are honest, sincere and seek God's help and guidance and demand that the organization be used only for the noble and high purpose for which it was formed.

#### Why Would They Stay?

THERE IS NO QUESTION but what the armed services, all branches of it, are very much concerned about the small per cent of individuals drafted into services remaining for further duty after their 24

They probably also are concerned about the inability to keep volunteers in service after the enlistment period has expired.

There are a good many reasons for this as gleaned from those in service.

One of the big reasons is the promises which are made by the recruiters; the failure of the armed services to keep these promises; and the ability of all branches of the armed services to put a man to a task regardless of his training, with which he is not familiar.

It does seem that after that many years there would come a day and a time when men qualified for a definite field of service would be used in that field. Yet those trained in a field are given something in some other

For instance, we had a public information officer for a long period trained and qualified in another field. He had no experience in public relations and public information, and only knew what he learned while he was at that task. Yet we will bet there are men at White Sands qualified for newspaper work doing other things for which they are not qualified.

We know a man qualified for public information work in the Marines, but he isn't doing that type of work-he is doing something else and those not qualified for this work are attempting to do it. We know an individual qualified in photography in the Navy but he is being taught to be an engineer instead of being permitted to do the work in which he has had training.

We know one in the Army, who was a contractor before being called into service, and so he is a military policeman, although a good builder and carpenter is needed.

This is not true in just one branch of the service-it is true in all of them. And the result is that a good many boys, who perhaps would have been far happier in service, are dissatisfied because of the lack of consideration given to them and their qualifications.

Some one is to blame for this condition and this situation. You can be sure that it exists throughout the service and you also can be sure that nothing is going to be done

The military may be able to treat the draftees as they please, and they are doing just that but you can bet that it is the draftee who has the final say when the end of his draft period approaches.

There are some changes needed in the armed forces besides just halting the waste, extravagance and the inefficiency which ex-

Those men completing their enlistments will show considerable different attitudes when a different attitude is displayed toward them during their service periods.

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
