### Travellers to End Home Stand Wednesday Against Kirtland

Artesia's REA Travelers will complete a lengthy home stand on Wednesday night against Kirtland Air Force base of Albuquerque before traveling to the West Coast.

Coach G. C. "Red" Goodwin plainly states Wednesday night's competition will be no walk-away for the NIBL Travelers, who have found armed forces competition as tough as many league opponents.

Goodwin also points to Sandia Air base as an indication of how tough a service team can be. Last Thursday night the REA quintet won a 93-92 decision over the Bombers only in the last five seconds of the contest.

REA had shoved to 26-23 first period lead in that game, but dropped behind eight points by halftime, with Sandia holding a 34-46 lead. Not until the fourth period did Artesia regain the lead.

REA's win came in the last five seconds when Fred Stephens turned a pivot shot to give Artesia the

one-point win after one of the fastest ball games to date in the REA season.

Bill Lea topped Artesia scoring with 22 points.

# Paso Expects Crowds for Southwestern Rodeo, Show

El Paso isn't ordinarily an exhibition city. Citizens here show a but decorous enthusiasm for such events and attractions as the renowned mid-winter Sun Car show, their college and high school teams, their symphony concert programs, and myriad activities—but comes rodeo each year, and decorum gets out of control.

The sixteenth running of El Paso Southwestern Livestock and Championship Rodeo is scheduled for Feb. 8-15.

Rodeo fever is beginning to mount, and by opening performance El Pasoans, almost to a man, will have sipped at the cup of rodeo tradition, and another generation of citizens will be decked in loud shirts, bright scarfs,

for each of the six scheduled performances.

And fans will not be disappointed. The El Paso show has traditionally drawn the top cowboys in the game. Such names as Casey Tibbs, Don McLaughlin, Bill Linderman, Dub Phillips, Jim Shoulders, Toots Mansfield and Troy Fort, are always in evidence.

Top cowboys demand top stock. And supplying this demand will be Beutler Brothers of Elk City, Okla., unquestionably the top rodeo producers operating today. Beutler Brothers strengthened their claim recently by buying out Verne Elliott, another top producer.

The El Paso show always sticks to the time-honored five main rodeo events—saddle and bareback bronc riding, bull riding, steer wrestling, and calf roping.

Once in a while a wildcat event—such as last year's wild horse race—will enter the line-up, but generally only the traditional events are open.

# DDT Is Lasting Method to Keep Moths from Cloths

Here is a safe, easy low-cost way to protect stored woollens from clothes moths. Entomologists of the U. S. department of agriculture, after completing five years of tests on uniform cloth treated

with DDT, report that the insecticide does a long-lasting job.

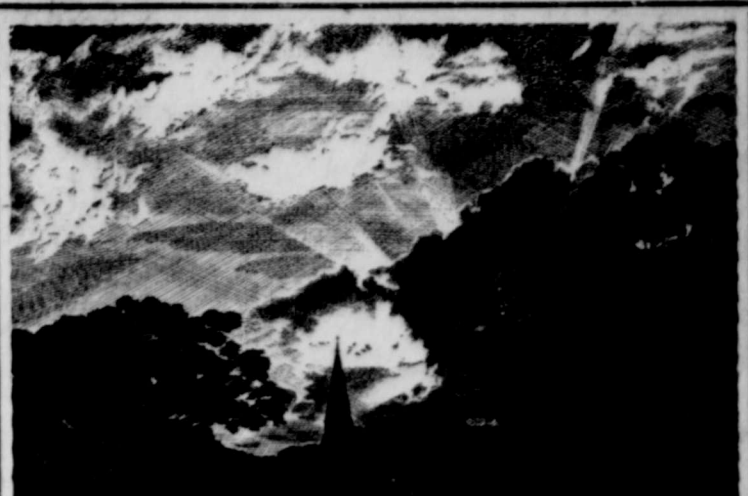
Scientists recommend that homemakers spray woollens with five per cent DDT oil solution, hang the woollens on a line, and spray them lightly but thoroughly. Let the woollens dry before putting them in closets, boxes or chests. Extra protection may be provided by spraying DDT on the walls, floors and shelves, and both inside and outside of storage containers.

Woolen carpets, rugs and draperies can be protected from year-round threat of moth and carpet beetles by spraying with DDT. Wool clothes that are being used require seasonal treatment, as well as retreatment following dry cleaning or washing.

A five per cent DDT spray should be applied until the wool has become thoroughly moistened, but do not soak the fabrics with spray. Too much DDT may leave a

white deposit, especially on dark colored woollens.

hands and face should be washed with soap and water after spraying. Be careful not to get the spray on foods or utensils.

  - 4.—Keep extra riders of tractors and small children away from all farm machines.
  - 5.—Keep protective shields on power shafts and other dangerous parts of machines.
  - 6.—Stop machines before servicing, adjusting or unloading.
  - 7.—Use caution with livestock. Use protective devices in handling them and keep small children away from livestock yards.
  - 8.—Finally, take time to work, play and live safely.

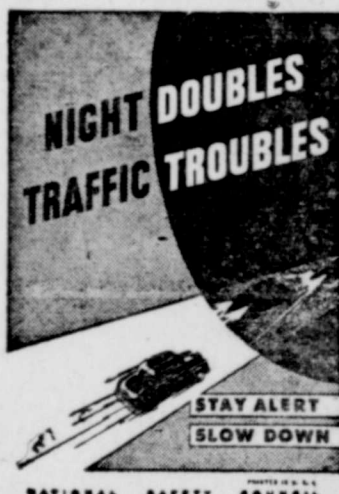

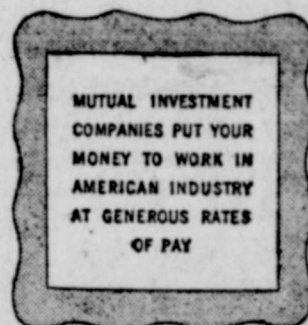
