Travis Stovall, principal of Artesia high school, announces that Patricia Johnson is this year's winner of the Bausch & Lomb honorary science award medal for achieving the highest scholastic record in science subjects during her high school course.

Only winners of this award are eligible to compete for three scholarships sponsored by Bausch & Lomb Optical Co. at the University of Rochester.

State Game Letter—Special Legislation for Game Bureau Is Sought

State Game Warden Elliott S. Barker today revealed details of the legislation the state game commission will submit to the legislature within the next few days. In so doing, the warden asked the cooperation of sportsmen's groups throughout the state in urging passage of what he termed "vitality needed laws and amendments to laws."

The four proposals, all of which will be introduced in the House, consist of:

- 1.—A measure which would permit the state game commission to "lease or assign any interest" in lands owned by the commission, including the sale or lease of oil, gas, timber or mineral resources on these lands whenever, in the judgment of the commission, such resources may be advantageously disposed of without interference with the purposes for which such lands were originally acquired.
- 2.—An amendment to the game and fish code which would recognize as a beneficial use the appropriation of water and the use of water for fish and wildlife purposes.
- 3.—Legislation clarifying the method of appointment of deputy game wardens, defining the powers and duties of deputy game wardens and cooperating officers and clarifying the procedure for searches and seizures in game and fish law violations.
- 4.—A bill which, if passed, would classify the cottontail rabbit as a game animal and authorize the state game commission to regulate the taking of cottontails and provide a special license to hunt them. Unless the hunter has a resident or non-resident general hunting, big game, bird or non-resident non-game license, the bill would require a special license, costing \$125, to hunt them.

The cottontail rabbit bill is a legislative veteran, having failed to pass several previous sessions. In submitting it again, Barker called attention to the fact that New Mexico is one of very few remaining states that does not classify the cottontail as a game animal and require a license to hunt them. Cottontails, he pointed out, provide more wild meat for sportsmen throughout the United States than any other game animal.

If you should happen to see a game warden shoot an antelope or a deer within the next few days, don't bother to call another game warden—it's all legal.

Armed with a special permit which allows him to kill one antelope and one deer "for scientific purposes," Ray Bell, chief field warden for the state game department, is literally "out for blood." The blood Ray is after—the antelope and deer—has been requested by the FBI laboratory in Washington, D. C. The scientists need it to develop a serum that will aid them in identifying types of blood samples which are submitted for classification.

Oftentimes, the success or failure of officers to prove guilt in game law violation cases depends upon their determining that the bloodstains on a suspect's clothing, gun or car came from a game animal.

This can often be proven by laboratory analysis, providing that the laboratory has samples of blood from the individual animals to compare with the submitted stains.

This comparison is made by means of the serum developed from fresh blood. The FBI does not have an antelope serum, but hopes to develop one from the sample blood Bell will send in.

After locating a healthy antelope

(and a deer), Bell will shoot it, then bleed the animal. A portion of the fresh blood will be transferred into two sealed, vacuum bottles containing a chemical which will retard coagulation. The samples will then be airmailed to the FBI and developed into a serum. By request, the state game department has already furnished the laboratory with elk blood and that serum is now on file.

At the same time, Bell will collect hair samples from the antelope which also will go into the FBI files. However, the scientists say that the hair of the antelope resembles several other species and is not always definite identity.
