History of Pecos Valley Presented To Woman's Club By Chaves Society

Wednesday afternoon's Artesia Woman's club meeting centered around the early history of south-eastern New Mexico.

Speaker for the afternoon was Col. John Kelly, dean of the college of the New Mexico Military Institute, Roswell. He was introduced by Rollo Hinkle, president of the Chaves County Historical Society.

Col. Kelly gave an interesting talk on the early history of this

section of New Mexico known as the Pecos Valley, including Roswell, Carlsbad, and Artesia. The speaker told of John Chisum who came from Texas in 1867 and began the establishment of what developed into a tremendous cattle empire of some 80,000 head of cattle and 150 miles of grazing land.

The speaker mentioned that in 1868 on the site of the present city of Roswell was only one house, a cowboy outfitting station on the Chisum Trail. Col. J. C. Lee, a fabulous figure of those pioneer days, helped found the New Mexico Military Institute back in 1891, when Roswell had a population of only 343 and was then 175 miles from the nearest railroad station.

Col. Kelly spoke of the early history of Carlsbad, formerly known as the town of Eddy. The coming of the railroads, about 1896, gave a big impetus to the growth of the towns in the Pecos Valley.

Commenting on the early days of Artesia, Col. Kelly said that a Union soldier made the first settlement on what is now the site of Artesia. The town was laid out in 1903 and incorporated in 1905.

Concluding his remarks, Colonel Kelly urged local residents to take an interest in collecting old letters, diaries, newspapers, and materials that could help develop and preserve the history of the Pecos Valley.

Club members were then entertained by musical numbers offered by the high school girls' double sextet, under the direction of H. O. Miller. The girls sang "Let There

Heathington Retains Lead As Top Individual Scorer

Don Heathington is still leading the REA Travelers in total points, percentages, and free throws, according to Paul Frost, manager, and G. C. "Red" Goodwin, coach, in the latest individual report on the team.

Heathington has made an average of 17.6 points per game in 27 Traveler games through Monday's contest with New Mexico Military Institute. Next man on average points is Bill Lea with 12.5 per game.

In 27 games REA has scored 2,072 points for an average of 76.7 per game. The team has made 751 of 1,960 field goal attempts for a 38.3 average, and 562 or 781 free throws for 71.9 per cent. The Travelers have sunk 5.

Rea's 2,072 total points compares to 1,878 scored on it by opponents, who have an average of 69.5 against the Travelers' 76.7.

To date the Travelers have won 16, lost 3 in non-league competition, but lost 7, won 1 in National Industrial Basketball League.

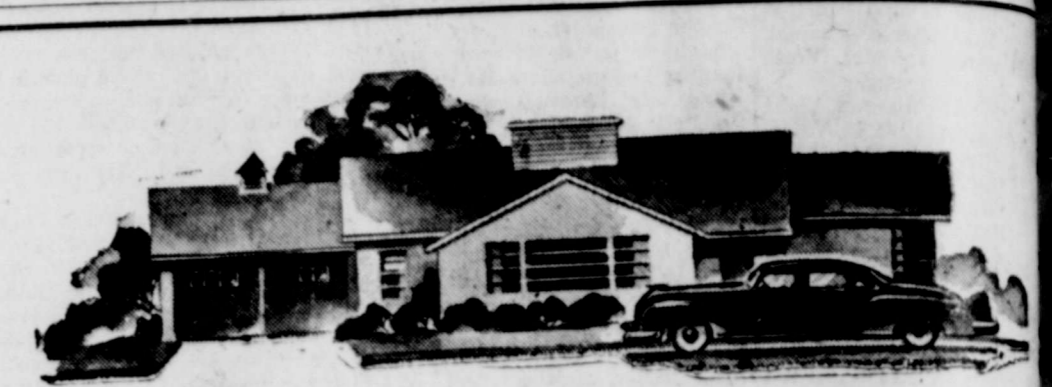

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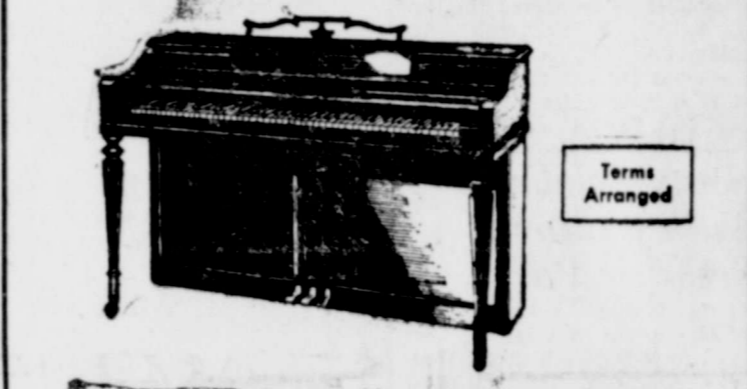

throughout the Artesia area that should keep oil production level at its present or even higher level.

The following table compares all of Eddy County under the 1949-1950 budget with Eddy County minus Artesia County after the division:

Surely Eddy County when divided could operate with the same or less tax rate than it now has. In 1953 Eddy County minus Artesia County would have more valuation than used in the 1949-1950 budget for all of Eddy County and substantially less population and land area.

RECENT ELECTION SHOWS HOW NORTH EDDY DENIED VOICE

The following table shows the division of votes in North and South Eddy County for candidates for members of the State House of Representatives in the Democratic primary election of May 6, 1952:

The above figures clearly demonstrate that it will be almost impossible for North Eddy County to have any representation in the Legislature. Keys, a North Eddy County candidate, carried his own section by a margin of 5 to 1, but the much larger South Eddy County vote defeated him.

The above figures also demonstrate the attitude the voters of North Eddy County have toward the division of the county. This was a case where the voter was supposed to vote for two candidates. Most of the voters of North Eddy County refused to vote for either McCollum or Alford because they had both strongly opposed the creation of a new county.

McCollum, during this campaign, claimed that less than half of the people of North Eddy County wanted the county divided. The vote proved his claim to be untrue.

FARMERS' VIEWPOINT ON NEED FOR FORMING NEW COUNTY

There are 384 farm units in what is now North Eddy County. The area average of all farms is approximately 115 acres per farm.

The total tillable land in all Eddy County is 79,930 acres, of which 44,526.8 acres are located in North Eddy County. Artesia is located nearly in the center of the farming district.

The principal crops grown in the Artesia area are cotton, alfalfa hay, and sorghum grains. Over two-thirds of all crops produced in the county are grown in the Artesia area.

It would reduce expense, save time and eliminate delays for the farmer if Artesia were a county seat. Savings of over \$31,000 annually could be made in travel expense and time.

FINANCING NEW COUNTY: COST OF DUPLICATING RECORDS

The bill creating Artesia County provides a \$350,000 bond issue to build and equip a courthouse and jail. A careful study by qualified persons has determined that this sum is fully adequate to build a durable, practical courthouse and jail, and furnish and equip it with the best, modern equipment.

It is planned that the film method of recording would be used to record all records in the county clerk's office of the proposed new county. This is the modern method used by some of the largest counties of the United States and is legal in New Mexico. Estimates by reliable firms show that the cost of duplicating all of the records of Eddy County plus the cost of all equipment necessary for operating a film recording system adequate for the proposed new county will not exceed \$35,000.

The bill creating Artesia County provides \$150,000 in certificates of indebtedness to be used for transcribing records and providing a bank account. It is anticipated that at the end of one year of operation all but \$50,000 of these certificates of indebtedness could be retired, leaving a total indebtedness on the new county of not more than \$400,000.

FANCY FACE CHERRY PIE

Pasty for a 9" two-crust pie! Measure 3/4 c. shortening into bowl. Add 1/2 tsp. salt and 1 c. sifted Kitchen Craft Flour. Cream with a spoon or rubber scraper till smooth and outside, a minute or two. Add 1/4 c. water and one more cup Kitchen Craft Flour. Continue to mix till mixture clings together. Press into ball. Roll out half of dough to 1/8" thickness on a lightly floured surface. Line piepan. For the top crust, roll out remaining dough. With a round cutter, cut a small opening in center. Cut nickel-sized openings around the larger opening. Fill pie and cover. Seal edges. Bake in a hot oven (425°F.) about 30 min.

Cherry Filling: Drain two 72 cans red tart pitted cherries through a sieve into a bowl. Combine 1 c. sugar and 3/4 c. cornstarch in a saucepan. Gradually add cherry juice, stirring to make smooth. Add 2 tsp. lemon. Stir and boil 5 min. Stir thick and clear. Blend in a few drops red food color. Add handful cherries. Cool. Reserve a few cherries for garnish.

Garnish: Slightly soften a few shelled Brazil nuts in hot water. Wipe dry and shave into thin slices. Tuck them "petals" into the small openings in the baked pie. (Or use almond or peach halves.) Place a cherry in the center, arch, adding a green gumpaste stem.

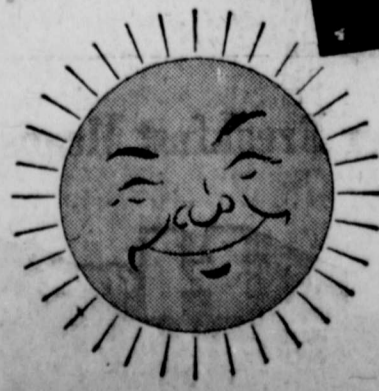
