Fails to Deliver Its Promises By JOHN J. DEMPSEY

Dempsey Believes Eisenhower Team

Congressman from New Mexico WASHINGTON, April 2. Congress, starting its Easter recess today, left behind it a mounting friction between its majority leadership and the Eisenhower administration. During the nearly three months of the new administration the members of Congress on both sides of the aisle have been forced to the conclusion that the change for which the people voted last November is not taking place.

The principal weak spot thus far developed is the department of state. At least that department under guidance of Secretary Dulles has engendered the bulk of the friction that is now growing to considerable proportions between the President and the legislative branch of the government, more particularly with members of the President's own party in the Congress.

The spirited and unreconcilable opposition that was spearheaded by members of the Senate majority to confirmation of Charles E. Bohlen as ambassador to Russia was the principal incident that has built up in the minds of the Congress and of the people a serious doubt whether the pledges of the new secretary of state to "clean up the department from top to bottom," are to be carried out.

The ultimate confirmation of Bohlen-with 11 Republicans and two Democrats opposing-was not an expression of confidence in Bohlen or in Secretary Dulles. Statements made by members of the Senate indicate clearly that, while they did not agree with the position taken by the President and the secretary of state in insisting that Bohlen be made amto the President's expressed de-

In view of Bohlen's close relationship with the Atcheson regime, it was difficult for the Senators to understand why the President and Secretary Dulles were so insistent that he be confirmed. In the Senate debate Bohlen's part as a top-notch aide in working out the dubious Yalta, Tehran and Potsdam agreements was stressed and particular reference was made to the campaign repudiation of those agreements by the President.

The action of Secretary Dulles in so strongly espousing Bohlen was not reassuring to the Congress and most certainly did not inspire confidence among the people of the country. This coupled with his sponsoring of Alger Hiss for head of the Carne gie Foundation, and his recent action in clearing the loyalty record of John Carter Vincent then retiring him on a more than ample pension, has cast a shadov of doubt over the State Depart ment and considerably weakens the position of the administration. That certainly cannot be construed as a victory for the President, despite the final Senate vote on Bohlen.

I had shared the hope of many others that the new state depart ment would get away from the ideas and policies of the thoroughly repudiated Atcheson re gime. The record up to now indicates that apparently is not going to happen. It is hard to understand why the President and the secretary of state took the position that Bohlen was the only man fited for this important job If Bohlen is the only one of 158 million Americans who can serve as Ambassador to Russia, this naOPEN HOUSE!



# Reports Reveal Activities Game Wardens Follow Through 'Slack' Winter Months

taken from the monthly report for February of District

upper Rio Grande, little to no fish- the season this evening at ing was encountered.

A few good catches were checked, mostly made by anglers who are familiar with the river. The best catchees were taken on wet or dry flies with a No. 14 hook or smaller. The hard luck fishermen were asking if and when the Rio Grande has been stocked; I must have answered this question 100 times. Fishing in general has been very slow, probably due to excellent natural feed conditions.

During the month, we had extremely bad weather with cold and ment over quality of cards. storms. After the weather changed, fishing slowed down and I devoted most of my time to checking big game areas. I worked the Costilla Questa, Red River, Tres Ritos, Eagle Nest, and Taos country. In these particular areas, deer are very plentiful and lots of time was spent checking for violations. The only evidence of illegal hunting l found was at the lower end of Red River Canyon near Questa.

I found the tracks of two men who were, without a doubt, illegelly hunting. The main roads are all blocked which prevents poachers from traveling and, of course makes it easier for me to keep tabs on things. In the Tres Ritos area above La Junta, I found a yearling doe that had been killed and partly eaten by two coyotes. This is the only evidence of coyote damage I have obseved in the past

Between Eagle Nest and Red River, John Mutz of Red River reported damage to deer by stray dogs. These dogs prowl deer areas between Eagle Nest and the top of Red River Pass. I have spent sometime watching for these dogs, but to date, I have been unable to locate them

During the month, I also had a couple of beaver damage reports which I investigated and reported my findings to Tom Rayburn, in charge of beaver control.

Considerable time was spent checking and patrolling bird areas in the Taos Valley. Several coveys of quail and a good many pheasants survived the last hunting seasons. During the month, we have had a heavy concentration of migrating ducks in the Valley. In one large grain field I saw an estimated seven to nine thousand ducks.

# Our Only Real Hope

EASTER SEASON arrives again and Sunday we will recall the event which we commemorate as Easter.

Easter brings us our only real hope of eternal life. It is the Easter season which gives us the final proof there is life after death.

It was on this morn' more than 1,900 years ago that Christ, who had been tried, doomed to death, and crucified, arose from the grave to ascend to heaven—proof for all times that man does live hereafter.

The events which led up to Christ's death, are not a pretty story but there is no more beautiful story in all history than the story of Christ's resurrection.

And that story is the climax of all of our religion and our belief as Christians.

There is no occasion during the church year which is so well observed and celebrated as the resurrection of Christ. This observance starts prior to Easter with the Lenten season. On Friday, the dark day and dark page in our Christian religion, the observance really gets underway . It was on this day so many years ago that Christ carried His cross to the Hill of Golgotha. It was there between two thieves He was crucified dead. He was removed from the cross and laid in Joseph's tomb. It was from this tomb on Easter morning He arose from the dead.

Down through the years we have continued to observe and to celebrate this occa-

And on this hinges our religion. Those who may doubt life after death, the skeptics and the "doubting Thomases" are given this experience of Christ to bolster their faith and to convince them of the fact that life does not end with death on this earth.

No other faith under the sun has this example of life after death. No other religion offers convincing proof that when we die we do live again and there is life after death.

But despite this proof we still have those who refuse to accept this truth or if they do accept it, it is only for a little while when the Easter season is upon us.

And they go to church on Easter if they haven't been before during the year and if they do not go any more until another Easter

They soon forget the meaning of Easter. They forget the true meaning of Christmas. They go along perhaps convinced they would not remain long in the community if the churches were not there, but do nothing to insure that the churches remain in their com-

They argue about the church members, they condemn those backing and supporting the church with some few exceptions. They talk about people belonging to church for business reasons or for some other reason. They not only refuse to attend but they refuse to contribute to the support of the church of their own choice.

For more than 1,900 years now the message of Christ's birth, His life, His death, and His resurrection has been preached and yet less than half of the people of our own nation are active members of any church.

But Sunday more people will attend church than have attended church in many months-perhaps more than since last Eas-

ter. But maybe that is better than not attending at all and perhaps the day and time will come when the Easter message will convince us of the need of faith and a religion and church of our own and we will put our talents, our ability and our money behind the church and its program in a world which needs the message of peace, brotherly love, and understanding more than anything else.

# Where Is Money Going?

WE ARE TOLD we do not have sufficient ammunition in Korea. We are told we do not have sufficient planes in Korea and that our jet fighters do not compare with those of the Reds. We are told we do not have sufficient food supplies for the South. Korean armies. We are also told we have no civil defense program.

After more than two years of war and after pouring millions into this so-called "po-. lice action" we seemingly are less prepared today than we were back in 1950.

What are we doing-merely fattening the pocketbooks of those who encourage war for personal profit? It begins to look that

It appears to us that President Dwight D. Eisenhower is correct in his proposed plan to clean out the Pentagon building. If there are those not qualified, not able and lacking the "know how" to get the job done, then it is time we get someone who can.

Regardless of what the Army Chief of Staff may say we are still inclined to believe the statements of General Van Fleet, who was actually engaged in the war in Korea. He wasn't a casual visitor as General Lawton Collins has been.

No one has denied that the group of pilots who have fought in the skies over Korea were telling the truth when they contended before Congressional committees we needed not only more planes but better

And even the Chief of Staff admitted the food situation was not good.

It is about time America have the truth. There are those urging President Eisenhower to give Americans the whole truth. We have been getting half truths ever since we started the Korean war.

We will continue to get half truthshalf truths not only about spending on the defense program but about spending of taxpayers money everywhere just as long as we do not demand the whole truth.

It is time for American taxpayers to demand an accounting-an accounting from every group from the lowest to the highest in this nation spending the taxpayers' money. They have become so accustomed to

spending our money without answering our questions they have about convinced themselves they are spending their own money. And they act and spend as though they were fully convinced there is plenty more where

When we start asking enough questions we will get the whole truth.

#### **Competition Builds**

DAVORING COMPETITION in the American tradition of free enterprise is something we have to give vocally, but as Fred Phelps, Monday night's Chamber of Commerce banquet speaker pointed out, we're afraid of it when it comes down to the local

Take any kind of store, set it in the middle of a desert, spend \$100,000 a year on advertising, and you still can't build volume, Phelps pointed out. Take the same store, put it in a thriving shopping center, and it will

When several businesses handling the same or similar lines of merchandise offer the same merchandise at similar prices but under different labels, there is no competition, no selection. Even though a community may have these several different stores, there is still no real competition.

But let a store handling a different line. in a different price range, come, and all will benefit, for the community's selection of merchandise is widened. Consumers have a wider selection.

Anyone who has ever accompanied a woman on a shopping trip knows that's important.

Phelps pointed out other truisms-an advertiser, for instance, advertises not only his own business but his community, also.

His program of unity in competition, of realizing that our competitor does help us, is something to seriously study, and to act on.

# Government Paternalism Aids Cattle Industry, Natural Optimism Remains on Top All Along

MAY PAY OFF LATER

More paternalism in government has had an immediate effect on beef cattle prices, admits an official of the New Mexico beef producers' organization.

Government has agreed to buy beef to supply its school lunch program, and with a slightly strengthened market in sight any way, that boost is believed to be of value right at the moment.

Price to be paid for the beef is to be 90 per cent of parity, and that is better than the market has been for several months. That is also good news to the producers. Other factors are also working

in favor of an improved market, and New Mexico ranchers believe that with a few good rains a better year is in prospect. Two major factors are that fewer cattle are going to market now than several months ago when it was glutted, and which brought another drop in an already sliding price structure. Smaller supplies of beef in storage also may affect the market, according to the New Mexico viewpoint.

Rains, however, are still one of the big elements to count on, for that would mean a smaller production cost to the rancher, and perhaps would allow him a small profit even though the market does not respond to the stimulants that are expected to make

The prospects, however, do not compare with the optimism that is generally expressed. In spite of the fact that they took a terrific beating the past year, cattlemen have not let it get them down, and their natural optimism has remained on top all along. That is typical of the industry, and maybe there will be a payoff for
