



#### Kangaroo Rat of Southwest **Congress Showing Greater Efforts** Really Isn't Rat at All To Cut Spending, Taxes, This Session

WASHINGTON, April 16. Congress, back at work affer the Easter recess, is evidencing great er determination than ever before this session that spending and taxes are to be reduced before the adjournment curtain ings down in mid-1953, probably

That was apparent on Capitol Hill as the nation's lawmakers returned to their duties with reports that the "people back ome" are in no mood to tolerate alibis or excuses for failure to carry out the economy pledge made in the 1952 campaign. The public attitude was found to beand quite properly-"make good

In the meantime those heads of departments who have been telling Congress that cutting their budget requests will be "terrific ally difficult" apparently are responding in some degree to pressure of public opinion and goading by the economy bloc in the Congress and are beginning to find ways of overcoming the difficulty. It is becoming less "ter-They are whittling down their budget requests and the Congress, it is virtually certain, will pare them further.

It is evident to anyone who has studied the matter even superficially that cuts must be made in the defense and foreign aid budgets if appropriations are to be held down to the point where the tax burden can be lightened this year. President Eisenhower has requested that his advisory staff be given time to complete its analysis of defense needs before final determination is made on appropriations for that department. Secretary of State Dulles has indicated he is now on the trail of waste and reckless spend-

Just before Easter recess Chairnan John Tabor (R.-N.Y.) of the House appropriations committee said he believed in excess of 12 billion could be trimmed from the original Truman budget, submitted early this year. His figure somewhat in exces of the 10 pillion I had said previously could be lopped off with injury to any proper government function.

During the recess Sen. Styles Bridges (R.-N.H.), chairman of the Senate appropriations committee, said the entire federal spending budget, including defense, "can be cut all along the line without impairing efficiency Both of or national security." those chairmen are thoroughly conversant with the spending program and, quite naturally, carry much weight in the decision on appropriations

Senator Bridges made his state

the President, but said he was speaking only for himself and not for the President. Senator Taft (R.-Ohio), Senate majority leader, agreed that "some economies can be made in military expendi-

This recent turn of events has given considerable encouragement to the supporters of the bill introduced by Chairman Reed (R.-N.Y.) of the House ways and means committee, which would cut personal income taxes by 51/2 per cent this year. Rep. Reed says he will continue to press for ac tion on the measure.

Everyone will find something of interest in the Open House. Books galore, Spanish language classes in action, brief dramatic skits, choral rehearsals—these will all be in progress. Sports fans will be interested in the display of sports equipment with accompanying price tags. Exhibits of student work showing how well students comprehend the work being given them exemplify the end result of the complex educational system which reaches its peak in the high school.

Open House is a chance for those who wonder what goes on all day behind the high brick walls to find answers to their questions. Administrators and faculty will be on hand to answer the questions.

Those who are critical of our public schools especially take this opportunity to see the schools as they work today. Open House is exactly that, with nothing hiddenhere is a chance for satisfying what a critical questioning and examination from the outside may have left unsatisfied in some ob-

Many of us out of school for many years will marvel at the change in textbooks, which are now excellent examples of modern writing, printing, and illustrations, in teaching methods, and in means by which the students' learning is demonstrated and put into

Artesia must also realize it does not have the manpower in its student organization, the size of the community being what it is, to train two different bands-one a marching outfit, the other a symphonic typeband. Whether a marching band could later in the year become a symphonic band is a question to be answered.

It should also be noted as subject matter for the current arguments that Carlsbad's band, which impressed Artesia fans so greatly last football season, did not enter the Eastern New Mexico Music Festival at Portales week-end before last, because it is a march-

School officials are caught in between in this fuss—they can't answer the question without doing wrong in someone's eyes.

DECENT MAGAZINE and newspaper ar-A ticles tell the story of a new community study system which delves into every phase of community fife, finds the good points and the bad, the assets and the liabilities, and rounds them into comprehensive written studies and analyses which serve as a jumping-off place for community growth en-

Experiments in the State of Washington have shown that after 21 weeks of intensive study of every phase in community life, a community has been able to better organize its efforts toward growth and balancing its economy. One community, essentially an agricultural center before studying itself, found it had the undeveloped assets to lure an industry into its fold, and proceeded to do

Committees under this system are set up to investigate the town. Every facet of its life is delved into. In community meetings the committee reports. Such meetings in a town of 15,000 drew between 400 and 600 people, so interested was the populace in the

After the committee reports, the meeting broke into 45-minute "buzz sessions" in which the report was discussed. From the groups came observations, analyses, and facts not hitherto disclosed. Compiled into written studies, the committee investigations and ensuing discussions conducted over a 21-week period of factfinding served as a complete analysis of the community from every angle.

The method has even been written into a book outlining methods and systems in compiling the report. For a community interested in advancement, the idea might well be developed to suit local situations.


