

Building Permits Fall to \$24,550, **Lowest This Year**

Artesia's building permits fell to \$24,550 during May, according to City Hall records.

Chief activity during the month, permits indicated, was house moving, for which 14 permits were issued. Most house moving occurred on E. Main street, where Numex is being expanded.

Only two permits for new residential construction and three permits for new business building construction were filed during May. All were in the low-price class, with one residence and two buildings at \$4,000 each, the other two at \$1,800 and \$1,000.



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

A digesttype magazine is published for the busy practitioner and a technical journal is issued for the specialist. Monographs, lectures, refresher ships go to 70 young doctors each year. All this is financed by contributions to the Cancer Crusade.
