Rotary Program Explains Method To Catch Forger; Counterfeiters

Master forger and ex-convict Frank Abagnale, who is a three time escapee from custody, and acted the part of many impressive 'imposters,' provided the program for the Muleshoe Rotary Club Tuesday at noon.

Tommy Gunstream, in charge of the program, presented a slide/audio program with Abagnale, who is now a highly respected member of several police academies, and on the faculties of two colleges, with tips on how to spot forgeries and

counterfeit money. According to Abagnale, white collar crimes are 410 percent higher than armed robbery. Where armed robbers get some \$1 billion per year, \$40 billion is lost to white collar crime.

He said one white collar crime are 'hot checks,' which are checks with a valid bank account, which are insufficient or written on closed accounts.

He said that by far the most serious are forgeries.

He outlined a number of things for businesses to check for -- including the check number.

If numbers are past 1,000, he said this means that the customer has banked at the same bank for over five years, while low

He also asked if the city council was aware of any telephone problems in the area.



Cara Juan Schuster explained that the renovation of Janes Ranch House was at a point that they needed professional help from carpenters, plumbers and electricians.


She said they have completed painting on the second floor of the Janes House, except for painting the floors.



Send Food To Lubbock

Food, food and more food...all 2,320 pounds of it collected by the Muleshoe Boy Scouts in their recent door to door food drive, was sent to Lubbock Sunday afternoon. Bob Futoran, Assistant Base Commander of Reese Air Force Base, and Frank Hezmall, District Executive of the George White, South Plains District, brought a truck to Muleshoe to pick up the food.

Hezmall stated that he was very proud of the accomplishment of the 31 Boy Scouts and 12 adults who worked on the local drive. "They collected more food than Plainview or Littlefield." "I am proud of the boys, they done the work, us adults were only there to assist them" said John Graves. "This was an accomplishment since this was the first year the local scouts had participated in this project."

This food was taken to the Lubbock Food Bank and Muleshoe will be issued a voucher for 2,320 pounds, which will be delivered back to Muleshoe any time the need arises.

Bailey County Community Action will be in charge of the local distribution.

"For each pound of food donated to the food bank, Furr's will donate ten cents, to help defray other costs," said Futoran.

Thanksgiving Reminiscences

Perhaps more than any other holiday, Thanksgiving celebrates food. It was, after all, created to give thanks for the bounty that sustained the American colonist.

That's why, for many of us, our fondest food memories and traditions are associated with this holiday meal. Turkey roasting with Mom's special stuffing, yeast rolls baking, spicy desserts are all reminders of the special, traditional meal to come.

For our forefathers, puddings, pies and cakes were trademark desserts. They were often made with the spices the settlers brought from Europe because they knew these exotic prized flavorings weren't available in their new home.

Cakes, with fillings and frostings spread between the layers, were especially popular. They often were prepared with fruit preserves or applesauce that had been "put up" during the harvest.

Layered Applesauce Cake is reminiscent of those cakes that were served many years ago, but it has been streamlined for today. Using pumpkin pie spice, a convenient blend of cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, allspice and cloves, is easier than measuring several different spices, and the applesauce can be "store-

bought." Still, the flavor of this moist butter cake will evoke nostalgia.

LAYERED APPLESAUCE CAKE
Yield: One 2 layer
8-inch square cake

CAKE:
¼ cup (1½ sticks) butter
1¼ cups firmly packed light brown sugar
3 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2¼ cups all-purpose flour
2¼ teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

2 teaspoons baking soda
½ teaspoon salt
1½ cups applesauce
½ cup milk
½ cup EACH: chopped pecans, golden raisins
Dash salt
¼ cup light cream OR half and half
Fresh apple slices, if desired
Pecan halves, if desired

Preheat oven to 350F. For cake, cream butter and sugar in large mixer bowl until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs and vanilla until well blended. Combine dry ingredients; combine applesauce and milk. Add dry ingredients alternately with applesauce mixture, beating well after each addition. Begin and end with dry ingredients. Gently fold in nuts and raisins. Divide batter evenly between 2 well-buttered and floured 8-inch square cake pans. Bake 30 to 35 minutes, or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans 15 minutes. Remove from pans and cool completely on wire racks.

For frosting, melt butter in 1-quart saucepan. Continue heating over medium heat until butter is light amber in color; stir frequently. Cool butter slightly. Combine melted butter, ¾ cups sugar, vanilla, salt and cream in small mixer bowl. Beat until smooth and of spreading consistency; add additional sugar if necessary.

BROWNED BUTTER FROSTING
½ cup (1 stick) butter
¾ to 4 cups confectioners sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

The unique browned butter frosting lends an old-fashioned

flavor achieved by melting REAL dairy butter over medium heat until amber in color; margarine simply will not work. For authenticity, spread the frosting between the layers and on top, but not on the sides of the cake.

To serve, place one layer of cake on serving plate. Spread half of frosting over cake. Repeat with second layer. Garnish with fresh apple slices and pecan halves just before serving.

this can be attributed to the economy and more people being out of work. "In fact," said Abagnale, "forgeries can be considered to be an epidemic."

Also, Abagnale said for every 1,474 forgers arrested in 1983, the conviction rate was only 122, an 8.3 percent conviction rate.

Peak months for forgeries are October-December, he added, when 70 percent of all forgeries are committed. The other months January-September, see only 30 percent of the forgeries being committed.

The speaker then outlined the way to check by other means for forged checks, and how to spot 'homemade' checks.

As Gunstream had cut the program short, a little was shown on how to spot counterfeit money.

The most common counterfeit bill is the \$20 bill, said Abagnale, with the \$100 bill the second most common.

On the slides, he showed how to spot a counterfeit bill, and how to positively identify it.

Preceding the meeting, Billie Downing of the Muleshoe Jennyslippers spoke briefly to Rotarians, reminding them of the ticket sales for the pickup to be given away in December by the Muleshoe Jennyslippers and the Muleshoe Activities Committee (MAC).

A table was set up at the meeting, and a number of tickets were sold prior to the luncheon.

Mrs. Downing said the groups appreciated the businesses who were displaying signs about the new fiery red pickup.

President Terry Hutto said,

"They (the Jennyslippers and MAC) use their money wisely and for the community."

go into refurbishing the Janes House.
