Perry to Build Attendance, Test Support

After 1 1/2 years as manager of the Artesia Drillers, when he built the team from last place in the Longhorn league to first division, Earl Perry this week-end became general manager for Artesia Baseball club.

The change from manager, which had included field as well as business management, came at Perry's request. Perry's request that Joe Bauman, first baseman, be named field manager for the club, was also followed.

Perry will now be in charge of the club's fiscal affairs, which have been running somewhere far in the rear of the club's success on the playing field.

Directs Promotions— He will assume direction of attendance promotions, public relations, and other phases of business management, as well as player transactions.

Perry joined the ball club Jan. 15, 1952, a few months after the Artesia Drillers wound up their first season in the Longhorn league at the bottom of the pile.

Under his management, the Drillers broke into first division last year with a fourth place, and are currently in a big race in the first division, with first or second place honors a distinct possibility.

Perry pointed out Monday that "smaller clubs in the league have been folding, no matter how strong they have been on the field, because of financial difficulties.

"Even some of the bigger clubs," he continued, "are having money troubles.

Strongest Possible— "I feel that we have built the strongest team possible. We're up in the first division and still climbing all the time."

Now the club must turn to developing attendance through promotions and good will, Perry said. "There is more potential attendance in Artesia than has been drawn out," Perry said. "Through promotions and public relations we have got to bring out our attendance."

"Joe Bauman was my choice as field manager; he is highly capable of carrying out a good job in that department," Perry continued.

Perry also indicated that "by the end of the season, after concentrated work on promotion, we will find out whether or not Artesia is financially capable of perpetuating baseball in the community.

"I believe it is possible," he said, "to increase attendance so that baseball can be self-sustaining."

State Approves \$75,000 Fund To Put Hope Dam Back In Use

Passage of a \$75,000 fund for cleaning of Hope Water Users association retard dam on the Penasco river west of Hope was authorized Saturday by the state finance board.

Approval of the fund came after an Artesia and Hope delegation appeared before state officials for the third time in asking for the measure.

According to a delegation which attended Friday's hearing by the board, next step toward putting the dam back in use in the state engineer's office, where specifications and request for bids will be drawn up.

Action of the state board, reported in wire service stories this week-end from Santa Fe, came sooner than most members of the delegation were led to anticipate.

Attending Friday's meeting were T. E. Brown, Sr., of Artesia, state Sen. T. E. "Gene" Lusk of Carlsbad, and Messrs. Hunter, Clements, Barley, Cauhape, and Williams, representing the Hope Water Users association.

Retard Floods— The Hope dam is designed to retard flood waters following heavy rainfalls. It has been useless for 12 years since 1941 floods filled the dam with silt.

A bill providing \$60,000 for the dam cleaning was passed by the last legislature but vetoed by Gov. Edwin L. Mechem on advice to State Engineer John Bliss, who said there was not enough money in a special fund to maintain such reservoirs.

Bliss also argued that the \$60,000 estimate was too low, and that any expenditure would be useless, since the dam, Bliss said, would soon refill with silt. Bliss said a survey by his office estimated \$120,000 would be needed for the project.

Acting on this information, Gov. Mechem vetoed the bill.

The matter was brought up before the New Mexico committee of the interstate streams commission, which urged the Hope Water Users association request to \$75,000 in passing the measure.

Special Fund— Funds for such projects as the Hope reservoir maintenance comes from a special fund, reported to contain nearly \$1 million.

Brown and Lusk have aided Hope water users in obtaining approval for the fund.

When completed, the dam will store water for irrigation. It is one phase of a program to provide water for Hope, which plans soon to begin drilling on a domestic water supply well.

Mrs. John D. Josey, Jr., of Artesia died Monday afternoon following an automobile accident between Stockton and Rankin, Texas, which miraculously spared the lives of her two children.

Mrs. Josey was fatally injured in an accident at 9 a. m. MST Monday, enroute to Lampasas, Texas, where she planned to visit her parents.

She died at 4:30 p. m. Monday in a hospital at Rankin.

No details were available on the accident late Monday evening.

Her husband, former city engineer, left Artesia at once for Rankin on learning of the accident.

Her children, Kathy, 8, and Johnny, 6, were thrown clear of the car and were not seriously injured.

The former Helen Beel, she was married to Mr. Josey in 1936.

Funeral services will probably be held at 2:30 p. m. Thursday in the First Baptist church with Rev. S. M. Morgan officiating, it was learned from J. D. Josey, Sr., Monday evening.

Mrs. Josey was active in church and community life, serving as a Girl Scout troop leader and in other capacities.

County Fair Association Sets \$25,000 Goal

Eddy County Fair association is moving into high gear with plans for its first event this fall to be held in a permanent building, according to a discussion in a meeting Thursday.

A planning committee was named to start work on finances. It includes Fred Cole, Clyde Guy, Kenneth Aldridge, Ralph O'Dell, and Truman Short.

Named to a location and building committee were Artie McAnally, A. F. "Pat" Patterson, and Paul R. Dillard.

Set by the fair association board of directors as a goal for the building project and operating funds was a total of \$25,000.

Named to the publicity committee were Vernon Bryan, Norris Jackson, and Paul W. Scott.

Appointments were made by Paul R. Frost, temporary chairman of the association. Frost said no word has been received from the state corporation commission on papers of incorporation filed Thursday, June 4.

Next scheduled meeting of the association was set for Thursday, July 9.

In its meeting the association board adopted a constitution and by-laws.

The constitution sets up a nine-member board of directors and instructs it to meet once a month, with additional meetings as necessary.

Members of the board are to serve three years, with the original board serving one, two and three-year terms to provide staggered terms of office.

The constitution provides an annual meeting of the fair association to elect directors, and provides that a quorum shall consist of 20 paid-up members of the association.

Qualified for membership or any persons or group who pay the minimum membership fee of \$5 per year.

Meanwhile, in a roundtable discussion held at Kiwanis club Thursday noon, it was pointed out there is no organizational connection between the fair and the annual Future Farmers of America and 4-H Livestock Show and Sale.

The fairgrounds and buildings proposed for the county fair will be the home for the show every other year. The show is alternated between Carlsbad and Artesia, and is scheduled for Artesia this year.

of the project will total \$60,000 and will increase total trout production by an estimated 20 per cent annually.

Affecting Glenwood, Red River, Park View, and Seven Spring hatcheries, the expansion will, for the most part, be devoted to enlarging pond facilities and improving water supplies. Thompson said most of the construction will be completed by next summer.

Glenwood hatchery is expected to increase its annual production — now 3,000 pounds — by three hundred per cent after two wells are improved to insure a year round water supply to the ponds. In past years, Glenwood has frequently had to shut down its operations due to lack of sufficient water supplies.

The slated improvements also call for 2,000 feet of infiltration pipe, 24 feet underground, to collect subsurface water, and the installation of four hundred feet of

new raceway ponds at a total cost of \$10,000.

Seven Springs hatchery in the Jemez mountains, which has increased its output from 10 to 15 thousand pounds of trout annually in the past few years, is scheduled for 500 feet of new raceway ponds and some new water development under the program. Also, the increased production will require an additional dwelling at the hatchery for the necessary increase in personnel. Improvements here will cost \$18,000 and are expected to increase the annual poundage by an additional 15 per cent.

Park View hatchery will spend \$10,000 during the fiscal year on the construction of 10 new round ponds and bachelor's quarters for resident personnel. The new ponds will increase the hatchery's output by 8,000 pounds of trout each year, or 20 per cent.

Red River hatchery plans 900 feet of new raceway ponds on the flat across the river from the present plant. To supply them, 1,600 feet of 12-inch pipe will be installed.

Red River also will build a diversion dam in the river which will supply river water to the hatcheries main water system. The present water supply, now furnished by warm water springs, will be gradually diluted with river water to acclimate the fish in the ponds before they are released.

Red River's present production of 70,000 pounds of trout will be increased by another 10,000 pounds with the new raceway ponds. Construction here will total \$16,000 during the next 12 months.

Thompson added that Red River because of its bountiful water supply, has a potential production of 120-130,000 pounds of trout annually. As funds become available, he said, the state game department will continue to enlarge the hatchery until the maximum output is reached.

The fifth trout hatchery, Lisboa Springs on the Pecos, though not in line for new development, has been allotted \$6,000 for the reconstruction of five 25-year old round ponds and three raceway ponds.

Total trout production in New Mexico during the 1952-1953 fiscal year is estimated at 130,000 pounds. With these new improvements, the game department's fisheries division expects to boost that figure to 156,000 pounds.

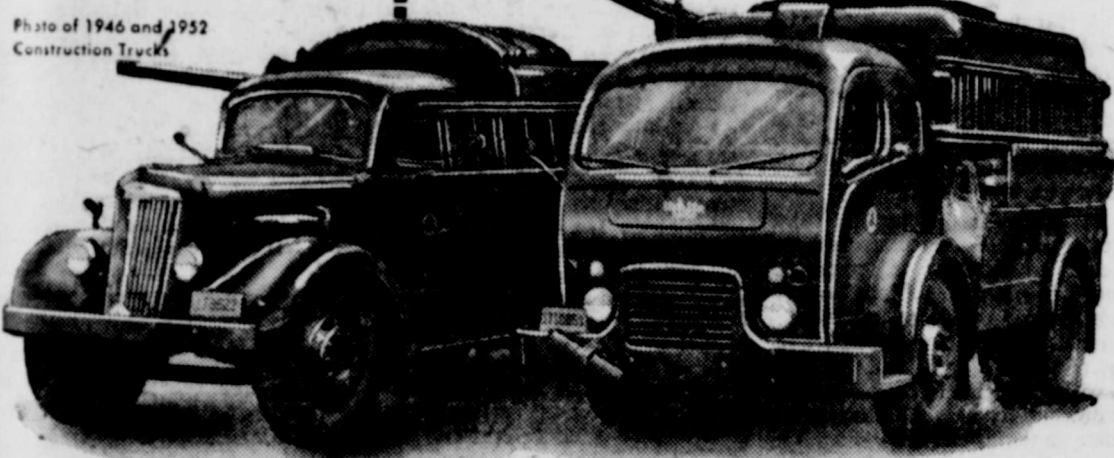


Photo of 1946 and 1952 Construction Trucks

This foundation is made up of truth, integrity, love, and faith in the Supreme Being, Paxton said. This type of people have endured, down through the ages, he said.

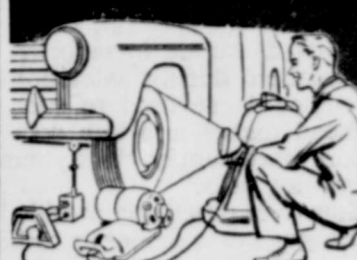
Each generation can lay claim to having the most trying times. Yet those with faith and vision emerge greater than the previous generation, he declared.

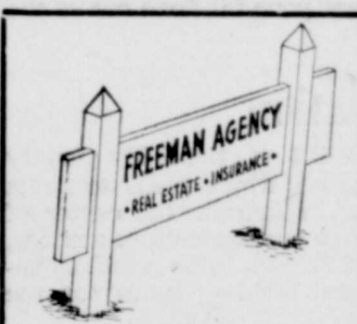
