1987 Census Shows Farms Decreasing The. 1987 Census of Agricul- ture shows that the United States hure shows that the United States had $2,087,759$ farms in 1987, a decline of seven percent from 982. The number with sales of $\$ 10,000$ or more totaled 1,059 , 573 or 51 percent of the farms. Between the 1982 and 1987 censuses, the number of farms with sales of $\$ 10,000$ with sales of $\$ 10,000$ or more also declined seven percent. The declined seven percent. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place which sold or normally any place which sold or normally would have sold $\$ 1,000$ or more of agricultural products during the census year. The 1987 census shows that the U.S. agricultural sales totaled $\$ 136$ billion. Farms with sales of $\$ 10,000$ or more accounted for about $\$ 132.6$ billion of the sales. Livestock, poultry, and their products accounted for $\$ 77$ billion or 57 percent of 1987 sales. Crops, including nursery and green- house products, accounted for house products, accounted for $\$ 59$ billion or 43 percent. Some 295,721 farms ( 14 percent) had sales of $\$ 100,000$ or more, accounting for 76 percent of total agricultural sales.
