**Up Over 1953** Possibly marking a change in rend, state liquor tax revenue rose by almost \$9,000 the first two months of this year, over the total ollections in January and February of 1953. The two-month collections this

year amounted to \$234,000, compared to \$225,060 in the same period a year ago, as reported by the Taxpayers Association of New Mexico.


Liquor tax revenue in 1953 howed an average decline of around \$5,000 a month under figtres from the previous year. The state levies against the sale

of alcoholic beverages and tobacco comprise the principal source of state welfare funds in New Mexico. And while tobacco tax collecteions have risen somewhat, the liquor tax revenue had shown a consistent loss over a period of many months until the first of the year, according to records of the state bureau of revenue.

THERE IS considerable difference between the basic commodities and dairy products. The basics are storable and they are subject to production control. Dairy products are perishable. In fact they are the only perishable commodity n which price supports are mandatory. In addition, there is no ontrol of production.

While it would appear that the lairy supports were cut 15 points the actual reduction is 12 and 9 points. Because of wider market ing margins last year, 90 per cent supports reflected 87 per cent of parity to the farmer on butterfa and only 80 per cent on manufa ured milk

But in flat Eastern New Mexico it may be buried hundreds of feet below the level planes.

H. D. Wolf, chief of the Albuquerque procurement office of the AEC, reports AEC planes have recorded "anomalies" in Southeastern New Mexico. He terms the area "a very possible uranium producer.'

Indo-China and other Far East nations, is hanging in the balance in the Swiss capital. Preliminary sparring by the conferees has not given us any clear perspective. No one yet is able to venture a sound prediction of what will happen. We do know, however, that we are destined to learn just how effective the program for unity among the free nations - which we have spearheaded and financed for the most part --- has been up to now.

We can only hope that there is real mutuality in our mutual security program. The psychological impact the Geneva conference will be not as spectacular as the H-bomb

but it may be even more farreaching. If our allies, the free nations of the world, stand firmly together the Communist policy of "divide and conquer" will go on the rocks. Incentive will be given the Communist satellites to break through the Iron Curtain. Far East nations will know they will not be engulfed by the Kremlin's Red tide of aggression.

Out of Geneva will come, regardless of the result, a guide for the president and the congress to follow in our future international relations. We will know, with a greater degree of certainty than ever before, whether the thousands of American lives sacrificed in Korea and the billions of Ameircan dollars scattered throguhout the free world, have been in vain.




