MRS. GOODWIN issued an appeal for mothers to help as often as possible for the Cub Scout pack the PTA sponsors. There is need also for a scoutmaster.

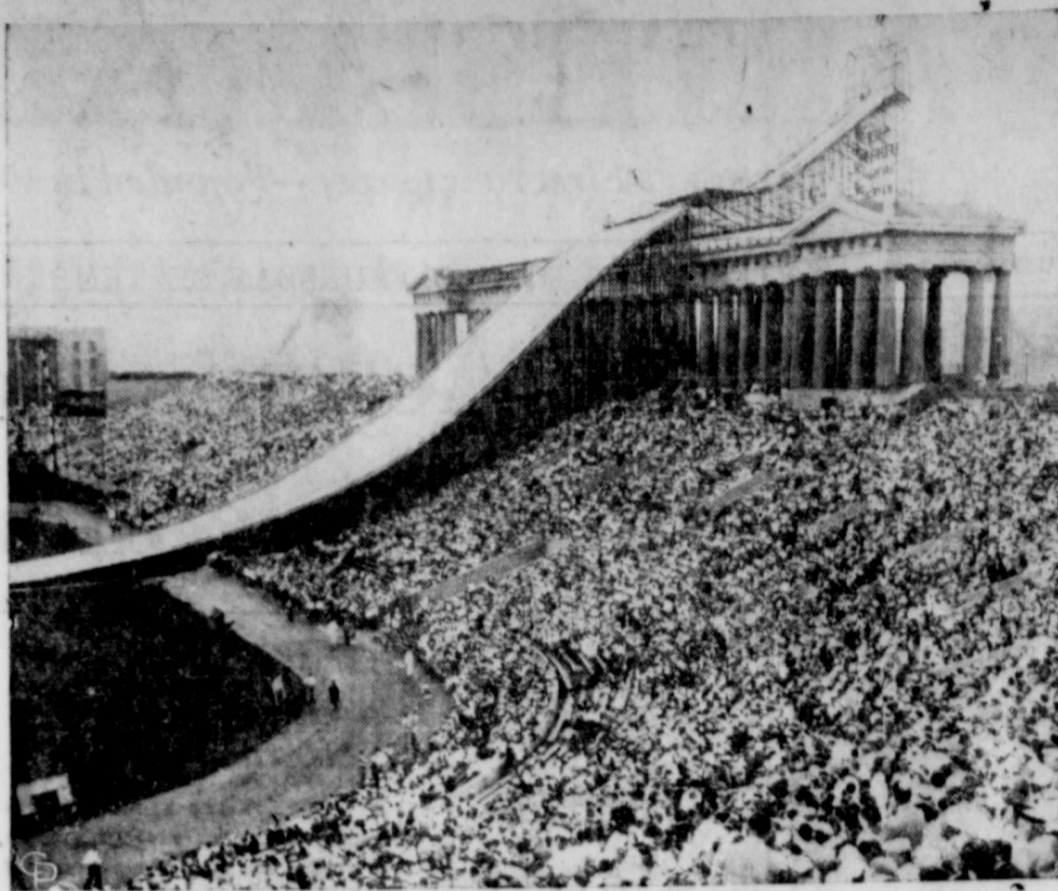
It was voted to give \$15 to buy music for a noon chorus of fifth and sixth grade students.

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### EDEN ON PULSE-TAKING TRIP

ANTHONY EDEN (inset), British foreign secretary, is on a trip taking the pulse of opinion on West German rearmament, and on the proposed 9-nation conference in London. Starting Sept. 11 he was to confer in Brussels with Belgian Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak and Foreign Ministers Willem Beyen of the Netherlands and Joseph Bech of Luxembourg; Sept. 12 in Bonn with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer; Sept. 13 in Rome; and Sept. 15 in Paris with French Premier and Foreign Minister Pierre Mendes France. Meanwhile the U. S. has proposed an emergency meeting of the council of foreign ministers to pass on admission of West Germany to NATO no later than Oct. 15.

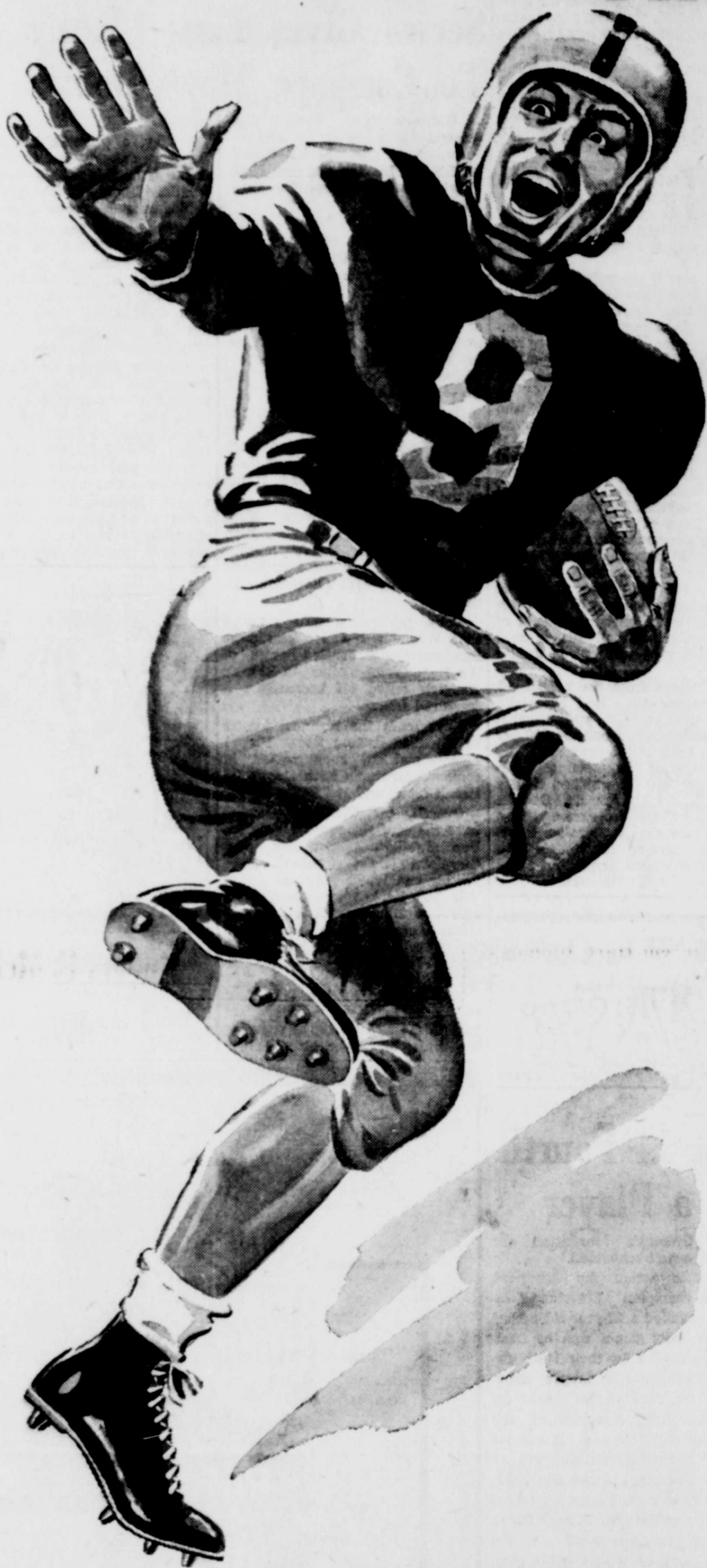

Houston Moving To Stamp Out Rabies Epidemic

HOUSTON, Tex. — Harris county's gigantic campaign to end a two-year rabies epidemic focused today on the western part of the populous county. Huge crowds of dog owners and their pets blocked traffic in some sections of Texas' most populous county yesterday as they flocked to 84 free clinics in strategic sections of the area.

the county yesterday, veterinarians and health department employees sent for new supplies after the first hour of vaccinating. The drive will center tomorrow in the south part of the county and in the east portion Saturday. The clinics, sponsored by city and county health departments, are prepared to give free anti-rabies vaccinations to 50,000 dogs. Meanwhile, in Dallas where two children have died after being bitten by rabid dogs, a city ordinance requiring that all dogs be leashed or penned was proposed. Its proponents said such a regulation would be better than compulsory vaccination.

The father is a driver-salesman.

Jap Fisherman Dies of H-Bomb Radioactive Dust

TOKYO — A Japanese fisherman dusted by radioactive ash from an U. S. H-bomb blast at Bikini March 1 died tonight in a Tokyo hospital.

Aikichi Kuboyama, 40, radioman on the fishing boat Lucky Dragon, was believed to be the world's first death resulting from a hydrogen bomb explosion.

The fisherman had been suffering from jaundice complications brought on by radiation from the

Bikini bomb, Japanese doctor said. His illness and death is a matter of great international significance for Japan. This country has been highly critical of the United States and is reported to have presented Washington with a bill for several million dollars. Kuboyama was one of 23 fishermen aboard the Lucky Dragon which was approximately 80 miles from Bikini when the test bomb was exploded. The other fishermen also hospitalized but appear to be recovering. The United States has offered Japan one million dollars in damages for the 23.

Athletic Conference Meet Set, Open House Scheduled

The Pecos Valley Junior high school athletic conference will hold its first meeting of the year Oct. 8 at Artesia Junior high school when members of the conference will elect a president to serve for this coming year.

dents during the school day. One hundred sixty-two students purchased the policy.

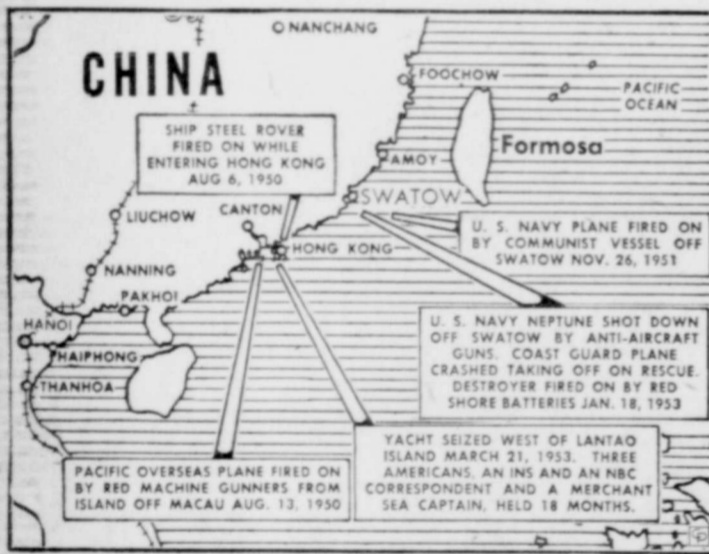
DON RIDDLE, PRINCIPAL OF Junior high, announced that he will soon select a committee, composed of teachers and lay people, to study the Junior high curriculum. A new program must be set up for next year when the ninth grade will become a part of the Junior high. The committee will study the possibility of increasing the numbers of periods in the school day from six to seven, thereby allowing the student to carry six subjects.

Other items the committee will consider are the revision of the music and general science schedules so that each student would take one semester of each, the establishment of a unit system with a certain unit requirement necessary for graduating from ninth to tenth grade. Such a study would prevent overlapping of subjects in the Junior and Senior high schools.
