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



cover operations of nearly 300,000 manufacturing establishments and will report on production of commodities, employment, payrolls and many other important items for more than 450 industries. This census was first taken in 1809 and most recently for 1947. The mineral industries survey

wil cover the operations of about 35,000 establishments engaged in mining, petroleum production and quarrying. Information on output, employment, payrolls, fuel, power consumption, and other items will be published for states and all counties with important mineral industries.
