CHIHUAHUA, Mexico - (A) -Umberto Maglioli, Italy's ace road runner, in a Ferrari shattered his previous record in winning today's second lap of the Pan-American Road Race.

Maglioli had an unofficial time of 1:24:18 for the 186 miles from Parral to Chihuahua. The old record, which he set last year, was 1:27:45 with an average speed of 131 miles an hour.

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



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
