Sheriff Issues Plea For Help From Residents

Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks has issued a reminder to area residents that all kinds of tank trucks and utility trailers are being stolen in both Bailey and Parmer Counties during the past two to three months.

He suggests that if you see someone towing a tank trailer, or utility trailer, and you do not know the driver, get a vehicle description and license plate number, if possible, and notify the Bailey County Sheriff's

Sheriff Hicks said in no instance, try to stop or detain such a vehicle, but please note color of vehicle, and direction of travel at the time you see them.

The sheriff also said he suggests engraving the trailer with the owner's driver's license number and the letters TX.

"We will never use an informant's name in any manner," said Sheriff Hicks, "but, your information may help recover a trailer for your neighbor, or even for yourself."

In the past two-three months, six tank trailers and two utility trailers have been stolen in Bailey County. During the same period of time, seven tank trailers and 11 utility trailers have been stolen in Parmer County.

Sheriff Hicks and other officers believe the stolen trailers of all types have possibly left the country, as none have been recovered.

In order to accommodate the growing crowd of people, the new president, Cindy Purdy, asked that the group move to the MHS cafeteria for the meeting to resume.

First item was an update and review on school facility expansion needs.

Dr. Lawrence Ward, superintendent, reported that it is unknown how the school will fare financially by the time the Legislature reaches a court acceptable decision to divide school funds more fairly with poor school districts, although he said he believed the school would be in a little better financial shape than under the

old (funding) plan. He said Dillman Elementary School needed additional classrooms, citing that for a period of time two classes were held in the cafeteria and in a hallway.

He said the school book library had been moved to the upper portion of the gymnasium at the school, and the former book library was converted to a classroom.

He suggested the possibility of a portable building to immedately solve the classroom problem at Dillman.

At DeShazo, the superintendent said it was the only school campus without a real facility need at this time, having undergone a modification program in recent years.

Dr. Ward said Watson Junior High has the greatest classroom need, citing that the science department is in critical need of additional space. He also talked about the crowded, cramped computer lab.

High School has crowded classrooms, although it is not the number of students that has increased so much, but the addition of programs offered.

This was followed by a request by Muleshoe Gymnastics to hold a Sunday afternoon function in the auditorium. The Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

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



Nominations Sought For Outstanding Minister

Nominations are being sought for the most outstanding rural minister of Texas for 1990.

"The rural minister might be considered an unsung hero, and where that's the case, his associates can bring some special recognition to him." said Dr. David Ruesink, a sociologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Ruesink said the award is given annually by the Progressive Farmer magazine during the annual Town and Country Church Conference, scheduled for Oct. 1-2, at Texas A&M University.

The conference is Extension Service educational program for rural and small town ministers and lay leaders.

To be eligible for the award, Ruesink said, a minister must have served for at least two years a congregation in a rural community or town of less than 10,000 population.

Ruesink said nominations should focus on how the minister has made a difference to his church and community.

"Show how the minister's leadership has helped bring the people together to fulfill their community and religious needs," he said.

Ruesink said 53 rural ministers were nominated last year. The winner was the Rev. Larry Castillo-Wilson, who helped organize relief efforts for victims of a tornado that devastated the west Texas community of Saragosa. Ruesink said all nominees are recognized, and the top minister is named at the conference.

Nominations should be sent by Aug. 1 to Texas Rural Minister of the Year Committee, Department of Rural Sociology, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.





training needed to begin a career and start to work sooner."





Georgia Pena spoke on the Chapter II program and the \$14,000 in funds available.

Also briefly discussed were the Fifth Disease, and a report, which was not completed on the TEAMS testing. It was determined that since so many people were waiting to address the board, that the TEAMS report would be reported in depth at a later meeting.

The first parent to address the board was Delton Wilhite, who said he was speaking only for himself.

He said he had eight items of concern, and listed a number of

He said math is not adequately taught in the school system, and also objected to little to no discipline in the classrooms.

He also said it was 'unfair' of teachers to only give two or three tests in a six weeks period, then base the six weeks grade on that. He also objected to "homework, which is never taken up and graded."

Wilhite also objected to the method of 'grading' a student's work and said he does not believe a teacher should have the sole authority to determine a student's six weeks grade without the student (or parents) having the right to appeal the grade to a higher authority.

He said he wanted one grade per week for each student, and that the student's homework count as a minimum of 25 percent toward his six weeks

grade. He also advocated a notice of progress sent weekly if a student is making below the grade 75, and wanted 'borderline' grades defined, as well as 'tutorial.'

Next to speak was Johnny Estep who said he believed the math and science departments were not teaching the students what they need. He said they are not preparing the student

for college. Speaking next was Sharon Grant, who said there is no place for the 'in-between' student, who is not among the gifted and talented, or the special education youngsters. "That student is left out," she said.

Mrs. Grant also talked about other problems she perceived in the school system, saying, "It is not a new problem, but I would like for it to be worked out."

Dr. Jerry Gleason spoke out in defense of a science teacher who he said, "this lady has done a remarkable job. And that's of all the teachers who have taught my kids."

Mrs. Tommy Green, a substitute teacher, said she believed kids had problems reading now, because they have not been taught phonics in school.

Speaking on discipline, Don McElroy said he truly believes one of the bigger problems is discipline. "You can't do any-

your minds to do it," he said. He also advocated strong people for the science and math departments, and expressed support for the schools.

Richard Edwards said he had a deep concern, and talking about weak and strong, he said he expected his son to be strong, and if his teacher is weak, "I expect him to study harder," said the speaker. "I hope we are very conscious that this school board is ready to take responsibility and realize that sometimes it is the student, the parents, and at times, it is the school board that is not prepared, and have not done their work."

A father, Borden Mullins, spoke out strongly in support of the schools and teachers. He said he was a Muleshoe native who had moved away and back again. Mullins said his son had been receiving marginal grades until he returned to Muleshoe, but is now an honor roll student.

As the meeting continued, others, such as Norene Pearson spoke about phonics, and how much the lack of it had affected her husband, and now, her daughter. She also spoke in support of the school, saying, "We have the basis for a good school system, we just need to iron out some wrinkles."

Dr. Ward said phonics are taught at Dillman and DeShazo as part of a multi-level program.

Also speaking were board members Max King and Lyndon Huckaby. Huckaby showed that through the recent TEAMS test results, Muleshoe is almost equal, or above, the rest of the state in TEAMS test results.

Johannah Wrinkle talked of the grading system, and how the students accept it. Herb Parks spoke briefly on the 'mid-range' student and how he is beginning to work on that problem.

Also speaking were parents Marsha Watkins and Hilbert Wisian, as well as Brian Noble.

Leon Hagerman spoke on discipline, and cited the need for more classroom discipline, but said most parents would not allow their child to be disciplined.

ASCS Director Issues Deadlines

Danny Noble, county executive director of the ASCS, gives several important reminders to farmers and ranchers for this

1990 SMALL GRAIN ACREAGE REPORTS

The final date to certify or request an aerial measurement service for wheat, rye, barley, oats, and triticale, regardless of use, program or non-program, ACR or CU, is May 15, 1990.

This is also the final date to certify to zero acreage planted if the farm has a base for that commodity. Remember, if you miss your acreage report by the larger of five percent or 1.0 acre, up or down, it can cause the farm to be ineligible for program benefits.

SMALL GRAINS

LEFT STANDING If you have wheat or other small grains on ACR or CU that will be left standing and not substantially destroyed by May 15, 1990, you MUST file a request to leave the small grains standing and pay a \$10 fee by May 15 to stay in compliance.

MEASURING SERVICE

REMEMBER!! As soon as the ASCS gets your farm measured, you will be notified of the measured acreage and you have only five workdays in which to adjust (if any) and certify your acres in the ASCS office. Please notify the ASCS office if you have to adjust prior to plowing anything up.

> LIMITED CROSS COMPLIANCE

The limited cross compliance rule applies for 1990. This means that any participating farm may not exceed the base of any program crop except oats. Exceeding the farms base will result in total loss of program benefits for that farm. HAYING AND GRAZING

ACR AND CU

Haying and grazing ACR and CU for payment acres is permitted during the 7-month non-growing season only. This is October 15 through May 14. The non-haying and non-grazing period is May 15 through October 14. REMEMBER!!! No haying and/or grazing CRP land anytime.

FINAL PLANTING DATES

The final planting dates for crops grown in Bailey County are: Wheat, Barley, Oats November 15; Corn-May 15; Cotton-May 31; Grain Sorghum-

These dates are for crop insurance purposes primarily, but in the case of prevented planting, the dates are recognized as the final date for planting the crop. Crops planted after the final planting dates are also subject for a yield reduction for payment purposes.

All required ACR must be maintained for the failed acres.

These requirements must be met for program crops to be eligible for program benefits.

PRODUCERS EXCEEDING \$50,000 LIMITATION

Producers exceeding the \$50,000 limitation may request to receive part of their required ACR released for other uses. Applications should be made before May 15, 1990, to allow you to designate the farms for reduction of ACR.

1989 COMMODITY LOANS

The final date for obtaining price support loans for 1989 crops of corn, grain sorghum, soybeans, and cotton is May 31, 1990

INTEREST RATE The loan interest rate for May is 8.375 percent.

FARM CHANGES

Any changes in operator, owners, acreage, or mailing addresses should be reported to the ASCS office so they may keep their records current. OFFICE CLOSED

Texas Senate Week In Review

Operating under a final June court deadline, The Texas Senate is expected to act swiftly this week on the same \$555 million school funding plan killed last week by Governor's veto.

A record-tying fifth special session, the third this year on education reform alone, began last Wednesday, one day after District Judge Sott McCown extended the court's May 1 deadline to June 1.

The deadline extension came after Governor Bill Clements and the Legislature failed to reach accord on a plan to fund schools equally. The State rejected. Supreme Court ruled last fall that the state's current distribution system heavily favors property-rich school districts and shortchanges poorer ones.

Clements' veto last week of the tax bill accompanying the \$555 million Senate Bill 1 had the effect of killing the entire education reform package and throwing the matter to the courts for a solution.

In his ruling last week, Judge McCown said the court would impose its own plan if the Legislature and Clements fail to present an acceptable one.

A master to oversee education funding reform will also be appointed by the court this week. This individual will be charged with devising an alternate plan that may be chosen if the Legislature's plan is

judge McCown ruled that the court could consider the Legislature's plan with or without the Governor's signature. The tax bill to fund the Legislature's plan is a separate issue which must be signed by Clements to become law.

A bill that was backed by Clements this session calling for \$250 million in first - year funding was passed over in the Senate Educaiton Committee last week in favor or Senate Bill 1. An attempt to revive the Governor's bill may be made this week when Senate Bill 1 reaches the Senate floor for

Clements' bill would be funded by increases in certain fees and the transfer of money in the state budget to education reform. One controversial transfer the Governor favors would take \$123 million from the Teacher Retirement System fund.

Senate Bill 1, which passed both legislative houses last wants to be praised again. week at the close of the second

special session on education, would be funded by a one-half cent hike in the state sales tax and by about \$100 million in budget transfers. The Teacher Retirement System fund would not be affected by Senate Bill 1 transfers.

Senator John Leedom (R-Dallas) is sponsor of the Governor's bill. Senators Carl A. Parker (D-Port Arthur) and Kent Caperton (D-Bryan), and Lt. Governor Bill Hobby are sponsors of Senate Bill 1.

Over a five-year period, the plan favored by the Governor would cost some \$4.5 billion, which he maintains will be available due to overall improvements in the economy.

Senate Bill 1 has a five-year price tag of \$5.4 billion to funded largely by the half-cent sales tax increase.

Driving Awareness Helps Save Lives

Last year, 243 motorcyclists were killed and 6,812 were injured in traffic accidents in Texas. More than half of these accidents involved another vehicle. And according to national statistics, two-thirds are caused, not by the motorcyclist, but by the driver.

"The biggest cause of motorcycle accidents is motorists who don't see the motorcycle," said Henry Palma, Manager of the Department of Public Safety Motorcycle Safety Bureau.

National statistics show that more than half of the accidents are caused by a driver who did not see the motorcyclist.

"We want drivers to become more aware of motorcycles on the road," Palma said. "By driving aware, motorists are helping make the streets and highways safer for everyone."

Why doesn't the average driver see an approaching motorcyclist? Motorists tend to look for other cars, not for motorcycles, Palma said. And because of its small profile, a motorcycle is harder to see.

A motorcyclist's riding pattern also differs from that of a car and is harder to predict. Traffic, weather, and road conditions often require motorcyclists to respond differently than drivers do.

Drivers can drive aware if they know what to expect from motorcyclists and the situations where accidents are likely to

occur. These high-risk situations are when motorists make a left turn in front of motorcycles; when a motorcycle is in a car's blind spot; during hazardous road conditions; in strong winds; and when large vehicles block a motorcycle from a driver's view.

Palma offered some tips on driving aware. First, anticipate a motorcyclist's maneuvers; they may change lanes according to traffic conditions. Signal your intentions, and look carefully in all directions. Respect a motorcycle as a full-sized vehicle with equal rights to the road and to a full lane. Allow plenty of space when following a motorcycle. And most importantly, look out for motorcyclists, especially at intersections.

To reduce the number of motorcycle accidents and fatalities caused by the drivers of other vehicles, the DPS Motorcycle Safety Bureau has undertaken a state-wide public information and education campaign on Driver Awareness. The theme of the program is "Drive Aware--Motorcyclists are Out There."

The Motorcycle Safety Bureau of the Department of Public Safety was created in 1983 by the legislature to improve rider skills and reduce the number and severity of motorcycle accidents in the state. 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
