Construction Slated on U.S. 285, Potash Cutoff Road

Surveys Planned for Near Future on Two Projects

Construction of a dual-purpose cutoff road in southeast Eddy county and five miles of new highway from Hermosa south on U. S. 285 appeared closer Friday following a meeting yesterday in Santa Fe between chief engineer in Lawrence Wilson and Paul L. Scott, manager of the Artesia Chamber of Commerce.

Wilson told the chamber manager that he would "send a survey crew out on the cutoff project as soon as a letter of request is received from the Lea county commission.

The proposed road would leave the present potash loop road at Southwest Potash Co. and angle southeast 10 1/2 miles to Halfway House. Actually the road would be about 15 miles long, with nearly five miles of it being in Lea County. This latter phase of the project has been completed.

Navajos Slated to Get Salk Polio Vaccine

The number of Navajo children on the reservation to receive the Salk polio vaccine today still remained a mystery, but apparently New Mexico will be taken up to offer assistance in the project.

When the shots will be given to Navajo children living on the vast stretches of the 15 million acre reservation was not known.

"We had best remain silent on that now," said T. E. Hall, area director for community services to the Navajos at Gallup. "Those details which still remain to be worked out."

In Washington, the Indian bureau said it wants the Salk vaccine administered to Indian children wherever possible and added all area directors have been advised that the vaccine should be included in the list of those used for protection of the health of Indian children. The bureau spokesman declared:

"We want all state health officers to know that we want to include Indian children in mass immunization programs wherever possible."

Public opinion had been aroused after it was reported that only Navajo children would be excluded from statewide Salk vaccinations underway in New Mexico this week. Navajos attending public schools in New Mexico will not be affected, but there are thousands of Navajo children not attending public schools.

Hall said U. S. public health service personnel, "limited somewhat by lack of personnel and funds," would have a program of immunizations for the reservation. After conferring with the Indian service in Washington, he said vaccine for the program would be obtained by the Indian service through normal channels.

Health Director Gerald Clark had proposed that New Mexico give medical assistance in administering the vaccine to first and second grade children on the reservation. Clark said he had received no response from the Indian Service.

Experimental Farm Water Well Okayed

The Pecos Valley Experimental Farm Planning Association has received permission from the state engineer to begin drilling a water well on its 160-acre experimental farm six miles southeast of Artesia.

Howard Stroup, member of the association's board of directors, made the announcement this morning and said approval of the well came after his organization procured and transferred "the necessary water rights."

Work on the project will begin "just as soon as a contractor can move equipment onto the farm. Procurement of the water rights and permission from the engineer to drill the well removed the two main obstacles stopping development of the farm.

Stroup declined to state the specific number of acres covered in the water rights, but said there would be enough to commence work on the farm immediately. Stroup said this was ascertained in a talk yesterday with the dean of agriculture of New Mexico A&M College.

The executive committee of the association will meet "soon" with officials of the college to make detailed plans on the development. New Mexico A&M will operate the farm under a lease agreement as its Southeast New Mexico sub-station.

FALLOUT MARS TIMING
ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — It's getting harder and harder to tell the age of a rock. Scientists once used Geiger counters to measure the age of some rocks and fossils — by testing their radioactivity. But the readings were thrown off by as much as 10,000 years because of fall-out from atomic bomb tests.

Now the scientists burn samples in a closed container. Then they draw off the carbon dioxide gas, purify it and measure the radioactivity of the residue. "We had to make the change," said Prof. H. R. Crane, supervisor of the Phoenix Radiocarbon Laboratory at the University of Michigan. "We've had a light fall-out in our area, throwing off our calculations."

BANDUNG, Indonesia (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru assailed the North Atlantic Treaty Organization today as a protector of colonialism. He urged his own neutralist policy upon other delegates to the 29-nation Asian-African conference.

"We should not take any sides in the cold war," declared the Indian leader, who has been trying to keep the first international conference of the Asian-African countries from bogging down in an ideological argument.

Nehru's blast came in response to a statement from Turkish delegate Fatin Rustu Zolli that "Turkey would not have survived Russian expansion and we would not be at this conference today" if she had not joined the NATO.

"We have heard what Turkey has to say," Nehru responded. "That is one side of the case. The other case would be presented here. But India does not stand for either side. We do not approve the Communist or the anti-Communist powers. We think that they are both wrong and that their policies are leading us to the brink of war."

Simms to Talk With Motel Men

SANTA FE (AP) — Gov. John Simms will meet next week with representatives of the New Mexico Motor Hotel Assn., to talk over charges made recently by the association's president that the state tourist bureau was "in politics all the way."

Simms said he had given an appointment to J. D. Jackson, Albuquerque court owner. Jackson said he wanted to bring along some association representatives.

Dan W. Eitzen of Albuquerque, president of the association, criticized the transfer of the tourist bureau from the highway department and awarding of an advertising contract to the Ward Hicks agency of Albuquerque.

Over 2,000 Claims Filed for Uranium in Idaho Valley

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — The great scramble for uranium—the raw material of atomic energy—is surging north from Utah and Colorado into Idaho, where miners for almost a century have been finding pay dirt in deposits of gold and silver, copper, lead and zinc.

More than 2,000 claims have been staked in recent weeks in one small area alone—in the valley of the Salmon River, which winds through the trackless mountains of Idaho's "primitive area."

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Final Decision Seen Following Monday Meet

Location of the Kerr-McGee-NFU field office in Artesia was deemed probable Friday by an official of the National Farmers Union Service Corporation of Denver, Colo. C. E. Huff, general manager of the corporation, said directors of the organization would make their final decision on location of the central and field offices Monday and Tuesday at meetings in Oklahoma City.

The official made his beliefs known in a letter to Paul Scott, manager of the Artesia Chamber of Commerce. Huff made no mention of where the central office would be located.

Long-awaited development of the 14,000-acre potash holdings in southern Eddy and Lea counties was started about the middle of March.

A contract between the Kerr-McGee Oil Industries of Oklahoma City and the National Farmers Union provided for formation of a new corporation to mine, process, and distribute the potash.

Huff said in his letter that "coring on the properties is continuing." Headquarters for coring operations are in Artesia and are being conducted by Roland McLean of Artesia.

The Colorado school of mines has made a survey indicating that the potash holdings may be worth \$100 million.

ALBUQUERQUE (AP)—The U. S. forest service is calling for bids in a \$50,000 insect spraying project in northern and south central New Mexico. Bids will be taken next Tuesday in Albuquerque. The airplane spraying will be used on about 100,000 acres in the Carson National Forest, 100,000 acres of the Santa Fe National Forest, 170,000 acres of the Jemez division, and 70,000 acres in the Lincoln National Forest.

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Politics and Our Welfare

Our politicians are firmly convinced we should never let the welfare of our nation get in the way of political races, political campaigns, or the re-election of any of the office holders.

It has been this way for a good many years but apparently it is going to be worse in the days and the weeks ahead. Government help in providing classrooms and school buildings to help educate the American boys and girls is a definite need of our nation.

But one prediction is now being made that nothing will be done about this because of the political campaign of two Democratic senators—both members of the Senate Labor committee considering the bill.

These senators are Herbert Lehman of New York and Lister Hill of Alabama, both key Democrats up for re-election.

Senator Hill can't run with an anti-segregation rider on the bill; Lehman can't run without one. The situation is described as tense and the committee, all of it, hasn't met for a full month.

But here is a situation in this nation of ours where the campaigns of two members of the senate are more important to the welfare of this country than the providing of funds to furnish needed classrooms for our boys and girls.

It doesn't matter when these funds are provided; it doesn't matter whether these children are educated or not but it does matter whether these two Democrats are elected.

Personally, we don't see it in that light. We think that meeting the needs of the nation is a little more important than whether these two senators are re-elected or not.

But this is a splendid example of just how important we make politics and how unimportant the welfare of our nation is. We have become a little confused. Political parties are merely something to designate candidates for office—a group to have nominees. Their importance is certainly not as great as the job the men elected are supposed to do after they are named.

It is certainly time that the American people demand that politics be given second place in our affairs and that the need and welfare of our country be placed first.

More Success Predicted for Modest Gobel

NEW YORK (AP)—What lies ahead for comedian George Gobel, now that he has risen with phenomenal speed to one of the top runs in show business? Will his popularity last?

The answer is a definite yes, according to Sylvester L. "Pat" Weaver, president of the National Broadcasting Co. Weaver's appraisal was given in Gobel's suite in the Roosevelt Hotel a few minutes after the comedian had received the 1955 George Foster Peabody award for television entertainment.

"George really has an individual characterization and style that's different," explained Weaver as Gobel, attired in slacks and open neck sports shirt, listened appreciatively.

"He doesn't depend on doing with variations what other comedians have been doing."

Gobel, although very successful in hotels and night clubs for several years, still appears awed and modest about his sudden emergence as a national celebrity. He gives a large share of the credit to Al Kantor, director and head writer, and writers Jack Douglas, Harry Winkler and Jimmy Allerdice.

"These fellows not only come up with wonderful material but they write things just the way I'd say them—they think the way I think," he declares. "Our problem hasn't been a shortage of material, but too much. We have to cut out six to seven minutes every week to make the show fit into a half hour," he adds.

The droll comedian, short of stature and hair, can't quite get used to the attention and notice brought by his TV success.

On his flight here from Hollywood to accept the award, he was greeted by actress Mariene Dietrich and was as flustered as a schoolboy.

"I said 'are you going to New York too?' which was a silly question since we were on a nonstop flight," he recalls sheepishly.

Only Few Clouds Mar Scene Of Good U.S. Business Boom

NEW YORK (AP)—Booming business breeds optimism. So today industrial chieftains are sticking their necks out a little farther and predicting that good times will carry over into the fall and maybe into next year.

At the same time the warning voices of the cautious are growing louder. Bankers, for instance, admit that the building boom shows every sign of making this the biggest construction year. But they warn that if the nation over-builds, and gets too far into debt while doing it, the whole economy might be shaken.

Spreading labor strife also worries many industrial executives. Bitter strikes plague some companies in the chemical, textile, telephone, railroad and electronics fields. The threat of a work stoppage still hangs over the booming auto and steel industries.

An the more glowing the reports of increased profits and prospects of still higher earnings, the more likely labor leaders may be to raise their demands.

Students of the Detroit story point to the big backlog of orders for new cars which the auto makers have from their dealers. Production schedules are for full steam ahead for weeks to come.

But for almost every new model that takes to the highway, an older, turned-in model has gone onto a used car lot. If the approach of the top driving season brings the customers into the used car lots in volume, all will be well.

Gasoline stocks are also sizably larger than a year ago. This has sparked gas price wars in a number of places across the land. Here, too, the approach of warm weather is awaited—and with confidence by oil producers who look for about a five per cent gain in consumption this year.

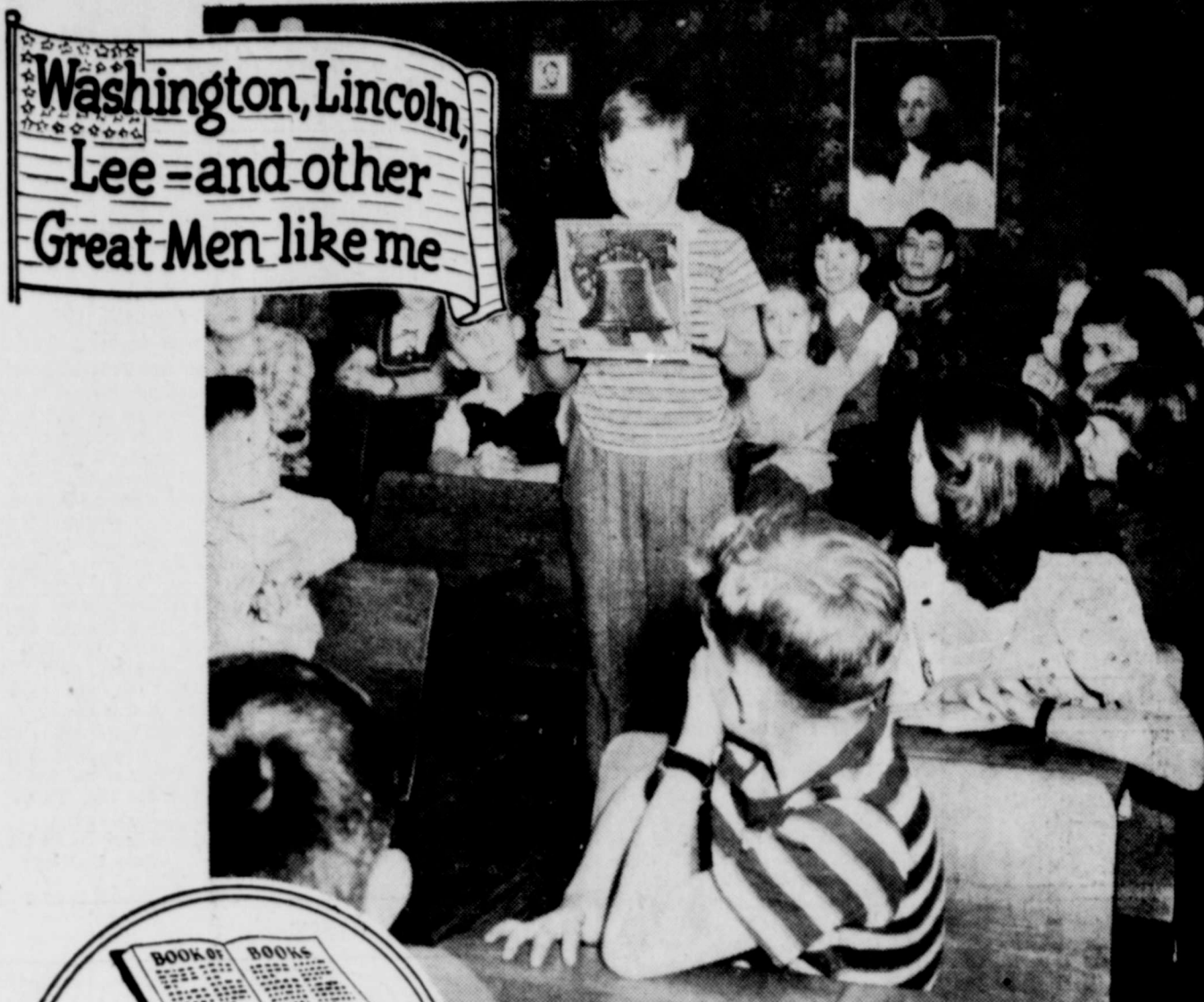
