## Threaten Cotton Crops

ig flightless rascals that mak highways slick and farmers sick are starting to emerge and hea or West Texas cotton fields.
Tom Fuchs San Angelo Tom Fuchs San Angelo mologist, said there are many theories concerning the intermittent onslaughts of grasshoppers, but none have been tied to just one reason.
"Moisture "Moisture probably ha something to do with it," he said. "Many old timers say that
a wet February means jumbos in the spring. Last year, we had a real wet February but no grasshoppers, so who can say? The jumbo grasshopper, native of the Southwest, is a large, brown, clumsy species
with wings reduced with wings reduced to mere buffalo grasshopper because of its slightly humped appearance. It is strong and has greatly
enlarged hind legs, but it can not fly.
Fuchs said problems occur because the jumbos, or "lub emerge about the same time as cotton.
" A jumbo on an emerging cotton plant spells death. One bite and the seedling is gone. A few hoppers can do a heck of a lot of damage. In a two-day
period, a single hopper will take period, a single hopper will take
out three or four plants. High populations of the pests can reduce a stand very quickly.
The entomologist said the counties normally affected are from Tom Green north of Scurry Glasscock and Reag west grasshopper can overtake larger grasshopper can overtake large

Fuchs said the grasshopper' voracious appetite is not limited oo cotton. Grain sorghum, corn fruit trees and even gardens also may be hit. Cotton suffers the worst because unlike the meaning the growing point the plant is above the ground. A grasshopper kills the cotton plant with a single bite to the center of this growing point, he explained. The critical time occurs when the young plant is less than two weeks old. Afte and can take some grasshopper pressure.
Sorghum plants also can be heavily damaged by the pests, but because their growing points are below the ground,

Rally Round
The American Flag The American flag has been
our rallying point: when soldiers our rallying point: when soldiers
on the battlefield find courage on the battlefield find courage,
by its sight, when Americans by its sight, when Americans
remember its significance and remember its significance and
symbolism of sacrifice symbolism of sacrifice, and
when it is draped in honor over the casket of our war dead. This week we rally around the flag after the U.S. Supreme Court's narrow 5 to 4 decision that it is unconstitutional to make a law against burning the American
flag. It is now time that we seek flag. It is now time that we seek
the collective opinion of Americans about preventing desecration of our flag through a constitutional amendment. The authors of the U.S. Constitution knew there would be times when succeeding gene-
rations would have to clarify the will of the American people through constitutional amendments: voted by two-thirds of the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate and ratified by the legislatures of 38 states. rupported the law against flag burning.
Blood has been shed to protect all of our dearly held speech. Few things anger me as much as the cowardly action of those who choose to burn the flag rather than to express freedom of speech through reasoned argument. It seems to
me that they may only be me that they may only be
capable of the crudest exprescapable of the crudest expres-
sion of their opinions. They have nothing to say, nor the ability to say it. Just try to recall WHY a demonstrator burned the flag and I believe you will only be able to
remember the flag in flames remember the flag in flames and your own feelings of anger
and hurt. Flag-burners do not seek to convince or persuade through free speech expression; they seek only to assault your
deepest-held feelings. deepest-held feelings.
