That Fight Is On Way

THERE apparently is shaping up in this nation of ours a rather interesting and what can prove to be a real battle on the question of whether we have "pay as you go" television shows or whether we continue to have advertising sponsors pay for the entertainments.

A good many large corporations interested in making and producing the televison sets are interested in the matter and are very much concerned about the cost of television shows; about the amount of money that has and is being invested in television advertising; about the losses being suffered by other advertising mediums; and about the efforts of two large compainies dominating the television airways as they have dominated the radio waves,

They emphasize the fact that the airways belong to the public but they are being employed by private companies for private profit and they are seeking to control television just as they have controlled radio.

This, they point out, is not good for the public, the country or for our way of life

One large company favors a definite plan calling for individuals to buy and pay for the television programs they want. It favors a system which calls for antennas to be erected to pick up and re-televise the programs in the various communities not served by television.

They argue this would be better for the country; would provide better programs; would prevent the dictation and control that rules in radio and will rule in television if the present situation continues; and it would halt the tremendous sums that now are being invested in television advertsingsums which they feel are unreasonable and unfair to the other advertising mediums.

But the two large commpanies, they point out, and other interests are definitely opposed to the public buying and paying for thir television shows. But these, they amphasize, are selfish interests.

But anyway from all apparances the fight seems on the horizion and there are indications that perhaps the people countryside. may have a voice in their own affairs and they may determine just how they want television handled in the future.

There is little question but what if the public is buying and paying for their TV programs there definitely would have to be some improvement in some of the shows they are getting now and they definitely would not be willing to pay for some of the repeat shows, three or four times, they get now



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
