## 1111 Motorists July 4th Was Big Die In Holiday Affair For Artesia By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Fatal accidents cut short the Half Century Ago

The Glorious Fourth.... 1904 Style!!!

From the Advocate Files of Long Ago. Artesians celebrated July 4 in a big way more than 50 years ago

The Artesia Advocate started publications on August 29, 1903, and thus did not report a July 4 celebration until the following year. Typical of the way Independence Day was abserved was the etailed description in the Advocate of a big picnic at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Mart Fanning on Seven Rivers, about seven miles

Friends and neighbors gathered with well-filled baskets and linner was served to about 300 people. A 40-foot table was abundently arranged with pies, cakes, chicken, ham, beef, salads, pickles and

"There was plently for everyone and baskets full left over, drownings and 35 deaths from the enthusiastic Advocate reporter of the day wrote in his account of the celebration. "The cakes need special mention, from the fact the over-all fatality toll to 175 by there were so many and they were so good. By actual count there were 55, all nice, large delicious ones, and more than 100 pies.

Gayle Talbot of Artesia headed the new Central Committee. Resolutions adopted filled nearly two columns of the Advocate.

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
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

Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Safety Council, said the traffic toll was running about 20 per cent ahead of that for last year's Fourth of July holiday

"If this rate continues," Dearborn said, "The toll will be the highest for a three-day Fourth of July holiday in history. We urge every driver to double his alertness and caution."

The Safety Council's predicted toll was higher than the 1954 Fourth highway toll. Because of shifting factors experts do not at tempt to fix a norm for traffic deaths over a given period.

However, an Associated Press survey for a nonholiday weekend period of 78 hours June 17-20 this year showed an nationwide traffic toll of 342. The over-all accident toll for the test period was 515, including 111 drownings.



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
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


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## Hazel Flying Service Handles Everything In Aviation Business

"When we fly higher than 100 feet off the ground," pilot Franke Dupre said jokingly, "we feel like we need oxygen for all that high altitude."

That "on the deck" philisophy seems to crystalize the idea of crop spraying methods used by the highly-skilled air crew of Artesia's own Hazel Flying Service.

Located at the municipal airport two miles west of the city, Sug and Burle Hazel first established their air operations here in Artesia 11 years ago. That was in 1944, and the following year the Hazel Flying Service moved out to its present location at municipal airport.

While crop spray and dusting is one of the biggest operations of the organization, there are many other activities centered around the airport which are controlled and handled by Hazel Flying Service.

Today Sug and Burle own and operate more than a dozen planes supplying the crop dusting and spraying service, an air ambulance service, are busy with a charter plane operation to all points in the West and Southwest, and find time to keep a flying school going which is accredited under the GI training program as well as for civilian non-vet-

All of these manifest operations are competently carried out by the crew of six persons which make up Hazel Flying Service.

Heading the list, of course, is Sug, owner and chief pilot for the service, and his pretty wife, Burle, who is office manager and chief dispatcher.

Three other pilots, M. H. Peters, Dupre, and J. M. Lee, keep Hazel planes in the air from "kin to kain't" flying the souped-up and stripped-down spraying and dusting Cubs inches above the greenery on almost every farm and ranch in this part of the state.

In addition, all three are qualified pilot instructors and take turns in the student training program of which Peters is pilot in charge.

In addition to their flying duties Lee and Dupre double up the former as shop foreman in charge of airplane maintenance and overhaul, and the latter as charter pilot.

Completing the list of Hazel personnel is Mario Vasquez, field airplane service man, and Russell Fogerson, entomologist for OK Tex Chemicals.

Included in the many operations at the airport are also pipe line flying patrols, dealer sales—Hazel is authorized agent for Piper Aircraft—and, believe it or not, eagle and coyote hunting by plane.

Two fast Cub Tri-Pacers stand ready for instant use at all times for either charter or ambulance service and carry four passengers.

The Hazels lease the entire airport from the city and operate it in their own name. For visiting pilots, there is free tie-down service, and complete service and mechanical facilities.

The airport was originally constructed by the government and used during World War II as an auxiliary B-17, B-24, and later, B-29 field. Its 7000-foot runways of heavy construction still are capable of handling the largest military or commercial aircraft.


And the runways are in perfect shape today since the city repairs minor cracks and the type of traffic using them is light in weight.

The center of flying activities for northern Eddy County, Hazel Flying Service offices are the headquarters each weekend for Artesia air-minded people and visiting pilots. And Sug cordially invites everyone to drop around and talk flyng with the boys.



A possible fifth U. S. Air Force installation in the state of New Mexico has a good number of communities in an economic tizzywith every justification.

An Air Force survey team last week completed a searching look at facilities in various cities ranging from Las Vegas in the north to several spots in the south.

There is no assurance that an air base will be established. The team was merely, as Sen. Dennis Chavez put it in letters to city officials, "looking over your city with an eye to future needs and your resources and availabilities in the light of those requirements."

But even the possibility has stirred the excitement of those who for a multi-purpose installation. would like an economic hypo for

Chambers of commerce, bankers, civic and social organizations and local promoters have eyed with envy the cities in the state which have military installations -and the resultant population hike and payroll expenditures. Albuquerque, Clovis, Roswell,-Alamogordo, Las Cruces and others have been greatly benefitted by having military installations parked in their backyards.

The survey team met with civic officials in Las Vegas, Truth or coming.
