

However, Beria got his start in the Georgian security organization and kept tight control over it even after he went to Moscow. After his purge, the ax started falling right and left among Georgian officials.

The Tiflis broadcast identified those executed only by their last names. Radio monitors here said a sixth official might have been included in the group executed. This was not certain, due to the indistinctness of the broadcast.



Ground Swell Developing Asks Reduction In Size Of Farms

Associated Press Farm Reporter WASHINGTON, (P) - A ground swell is developing in farming areas for a federal program that would reduce the size of the nation's farm plant until markets are better able to use what agriculture is capable of producing.

Farmers now recognize that agriculture over-expanded to meet war and postwar needs and that big surpluses accumulated as a con-

Few farmers see hope of any substantial improvement in the farm economy until production can be brought closer into balance with markets.

At recent hearings held by the Senate Agriculture Committee in major farming areas and in interviews elsewhere, farmers disagreed on price support levels and methods of carrying out price guarantees. But there was an almost unanimous endorsement of a land retirement program.



The farther along we go now the more apparent it becomes that the clamor for more funds for the westere department is going to be continued with the hope and expectation first wedding anniversary. of securing these funds—securing the funds so they can take care of the increase in the number of employes, automatic raises, shorter hours and maybe some funds for those on the rolls although at times perhaps their need has not been delinite or fully established.

We should begin to realize by now that the program of the 'do gooders' in this nation of ours is never ending aithough the ability of the taxpayers to pay does have a limit.

We believe that New Mexico has done a pretty good job up to now and that while we are providing shorter hours and automatic payrolls for some of the state employes there are plenty of departments in the state where this condition does not prevail. For instance state penitentiary employes have has been announced here. long hours and short pay.

Just how we can justify providing automatic increases and shorter hours for one group of state employes and not the others we can't see.

Likewise we can't see how we can continue to provide more and more for the welfare program in the state while many other state agencies, departments and bureaus also need more funds, merely because they shout the loudest remains to be seen.

It will be interesting to determine just what the committee comes up with after they give the matter some further
