year will total \$64,270,000,000, and that outlays in the next bookkeeping year will top that by \$1,595,-000,000. It was the first time Eisenhower had pointed spending upward

2. Predicted that revenues next year will be \$1,800,000,000 higher than this year's resulting in a federal surplus this year of 230 mil-

3. Proposed to cut the federal debt by 74 million by June 30 to \$274,300,000,000 and by the following June 30 to \$273,800,000,000.

4. Called for new appropriations of \$66,291,000,000 -- some 426 millions higher than projected spending and 41/4 billion higher than appropriations in the current year. This indicated that federal spending may be trending upward for

### Are We Protected?

THE insurance and investment firm situation in Texas should be a good lesson to every state in the union. It should result in every state taking a look to see just what kind of conditions they have and to see whether one man or a few men could wreck a situation and take monies that investors have saved over a period of years.

We were told on one occasion that one of the biggest jobs our state insurance commissioner has to do is to keep companies doing business in our state solvent.

Those who make investments of any kind and those who buy insurance definitely want to know the firms with whom they are doing business are in a sound financial condition They depend on the state seeing those doing business in New Mexico are sou

When a firm is licensed to do business in New Mexico then the citizens of the state feel they are sound. Yet it is true that insurance firms which have a good financial statement and appear sound can become in bad condition with a series of tremendous losses.

It is not always as easy to check these companies as it may appear,

We have always felt that we need to give more attention to this business in our state. We have been told repeatedly that the office of the insurance commissioner does not have sufficient help and they are handicapped by lack of funds.

We believe that we should now take a good look at all of the insurance firms doing business in New Mexico and we should determine whether they are sound and whether it is wise for our people to invest their money with these companies.

We certainly do not want to happen in our state what has happened in Texas and what can happen in other states. We do not want our people to lose money they have invested for a return or invested in insurance as a protection.

Most of the firms and concerns, of course, are sound and in a position to meet their obligations but we want no condition to develop where one individual or several can take the funds belonging to the people and appropriate them to themselves

It is always wiser and safer to check into such matters before something occurs to cause losses than it is to ignore conditions and situations until the losses have occurred.
