

But to the Slumbering Lodge of Groundhogs of Quarryville, in Lancaster County, the western seers are "the upstart gang of Gobbler's Knob. The Slumbering Lodge has been

This society says its membership takes in eminent men in most of the professions; that it has been cited for distinguished service by the International Order of Groundhog Greeters; and that nobody can outdo it in fancy costumes. 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
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
