compromise bill established 195 compromise bill established 195
county education districts to levy taxes to operate the state's Foundation School Program.
It also establishes capped tax
rates at $\$ 1.50$ per $\$ 100$ valua-
rates at $\$ 1.50$ per $\$ 100$ valuation, and a multi-tiered program that includes the foundation program, equalized enrichment facilities and debt service funds.

Congress enacting a new farm in the Crown of Texas tend to focus on Washington to learn what might happen next in our agri-business ventures. But remember, "when the Texas
Legislature is in session, no Legislature is in session, no

are a number of issues and bills are a number of issues and bills
pending before the Texas Legispending before the Texas Legis-
lature that can and will impact agriculture on the High Plains.
With Texas facing a serious financial crunch, talk of tax reform is in the air. Producers
rest need to be particularly alert to
what types of tax reform that what types of tax reform that
may be engaged in. While many may be engaged in. While many
people fear the dreaded " I "
word, a state income tax,
application of a gross receipts tax or removal of sales and ad
valorem tax exemptions could valorem tax exemptions could
be just as disruptive for be just as disruptive for agri-
culture. Implication of a value added tax also could have serious implications for produc-
ers. potential indirect impact on agriculture and direct impact on rural Texas is funding public education. To the extent any
solution places heavier emphasolution places heavier empha
sis on a property tax sis on a property tax, ag
producers could be seriously
hurt. Also, if I and my other colleagues from rural areas are unable to convince the rest of the Texas Legislature that children in sparsely populated rural school districts are entitled to the same quality education as those in urban areas, our small dealt another devastating blow.
