## Jury Frees Hughes On Two Counts

NEW YORK (P) — A federal court today acquitted Paul H. Hughes on two counts of a sixcount perjury indictment. The peace. government apparently abandoned further action and he went free immediately.

The jury of 10 men and two women told Judge Archie O. Dawson it was "hopelessly deadlocked" on the remaining four counts. The jury deliberated 11 hours. The trial started Jan. 16.

Use the edgestitcher attachment for your sew-ing machine to stitch the bias and rickrack together as they are being applied to the curtain.

To make the tabs on which the buttons will be sewn, cut long strips of fabric 1 1/8 inches wide. allowing six inches of material for each tab. Using a double thickness of material. bind edges together with bias binding, employing the multi-slotted binder for the sewing machine. For applying the rickrack to the tab strips, use the edgestitcher or the zigzagger attachment for the sewing machine. Cut the long trimmed strips in

to six-inch-long tabs. Fold each tab in half, to form a loop: sew on button, one inch from cut edges Overcast raw edges together. Slip loops over curtain rod, and button curtains to loops. A variation of this idea,
