Dallas Rierson, county farm agent, and Miss Doris Mardis, of home extension, have already begun the campaign against farm accidents, and will make special effort to bring before the farm people the many things they may do toward prevention of accidents, with designation of July 22 to 28 as "Farm Safety Week."

Miss Mardis said she was now preparing and sending out to the nine 4-H clubs of the county, material for the programs they incorporate "Safety" in her radio talks given each Monday over KAVE at 1:30 p. m. Mr. Rierson said he was in-

corporating articles on prevention of accidents in the press releases each week. He will also tell of how accidents can be prevented on his 7:30 hour on the radio each Tuesday morning.

The need for a National Farm Safety Week is emphasized by the findings that between 40 and 50 farm dwellers are killed by accidents each day, making an annual death toll of 15,000 to 17,000, Mr. Rierson said.



A Meal for a Small Family

ONLY the smallest amounts of | % c. uncooked meat are available to the small family with today's high ration | 2 tbsp. marpoints on all meat and fats. I'm a little worried about the person who lives alone. I know some "ho don't eat meat at all any more, concentrating on cheese, vegetables, eggs, and fish. For the small family one pound or half a pound of low point meat is allowable once or twice a week, and I'm giving you a recipe which will serve six to eight. Use one fourth of the recipe if you live alone.

Spanish Casserole ¼ tsp. paprika 1 c. chopped

celery garine or 1/4 c. chopped drippings green pepper 1 medium onion, 1 can (101/2 oz.) minced 1 lb. beef, tomato soup chuck or neck, cut in cubes

Cook rice in boiling, salted water, rinse and drain. Melt fat in frying pan, add onion and meat cubes, cook until brown; add seasonings. Arrange rice, meat and vegetables in alternate layers in oiled baking dish, having a layer or rice on bottom and on top. Pour tomato soup over all. Cover dish and bake in slow oven (300 degrees F.) for 11/2 hours. Serves 6

Marmalade Tarts

Put a thin layer of pastry on an inverted baking pan; spread with a thick marmalade or any filling that does not run. Cover with another thin layer. Cut into strips four inches by one and a half. Bake in quick oven (400-450 degrees F.). When cool, spread with a thin icing made of confectioners' sugar and water, and sprinkle with finely chopped nuts.

Women Make No Progress As Congressional Members

Rep. Douglas Says Few Of Sex Enter Politics

Special to Central Press • WASHINGTON-Rep. Emily Taft Douglas (D) of Illinois, predicts it will be a long time before a woman would be wise to run

The number of women voted into office in the last election decreased, Mrs. Douglas pointed out-although women did 60 per cent of the voting.

There is one more woman in Congress this year. But Mrs. Douglas said that "only puts the number back to what it was 15 years ago.

Few women, she declares, are entering national politics. "One reason is that this career is hard to combine with being a wife and mother," she explains. "If a man is elected to Congress, his wife moves to Washington. But the husband's business makes it impossible for him to trail along if his wife is elected."

Further, she says, women are not willing gamblers. A political career does not offer the security the average woman wants.

Under the new WFA order, veterans who can show both the reed for and the inability to obtain farm machinery to estabiish or reestablish themselves in farming may obtain preference certificate that require dealers to give priority to their needs. County agricultural conservation committees will issue the veterans' certificates, which are given preference over all prior commitments or contracts for sale other than those carrying War Production Board ratings.

Farmers Are Asked for Alfalfa Seed

New Mexico farmers can help lick the alfalfa seed shortage by harvesting more seed this year, according to John T. Stovall, extension agronomist.

"There'll be even greater demand for quality seed in 1946,' he says. "More and more farmers are learning that New Mexico seed gives better results. Moreover, because of the new seed law. New Mexico will no longer be the ideal dumping ground for inferior seed.'

Alfalfa seed prices are attractive. In addition, the War Food Administration has announced incentive payments of 21/2 cents a pound for alfalfa seed harvested and sold into commercial channels before December 31 or this

More Clothing **Next Winter**

Though the clothing shortage is still serious, housewives can expect increased supplies by next winter. In fact, according to Miss Pearle Chapman, extension clothing specialist of New Mexico A & M College, women's dresses, children's clothes, and men's rayon shirts are likely to be more plentiful by autumn.

In the meantime, unless military requirements are reduced shortages of certain items may become even more acute by fall.

"It now looks as if men's woolen and worsted suits and over coats will be scarce for at least six months," Miss Chapman said. "Cotton shirts, shoes, nylon hosiery, men's underwear, and socks are also trouble spots.

"Military demands are the key to the shortage. Once they're met or reduced, homemakers can look for a change for the better."
