Llewellyn of Alamogordo were low bidders, the fate of the project remains in question, since the bids were 55 per cent above the estimates, and the approval of the construetion at costs bidden must get approval in Washington by the Bureau of Pub- lic Roads. The Thygessen and Llew- ellyn bids were $\$ 381,024.40$ for the 7.09 miles included in the tunnel at and near High Rolls and $\$ 386,016.20$ for the grading and drainage of the west end to the Forest line. Bids exceeding 50 per cent above the engineers' estimates must be approv- ed in Washington, and to enlist the support of Washington officials in obtaining approval of the bids Eber MeKinley and M. R. ## EUROPE'S LITTLE PEOPLE-1946 <br> Prices High and Goods Scarce, But Belgium Is Forging Ahead by pauline frederick
