Special Committees Circumvent Intent of Reorganization Act

WASHINGTON.-Although the merits of the reorganization act, designed to improve congressional efficiency, are being test-
ed for the first time in the 80 th congress, various loopholes already have been discovered to circumvent the intent of the measure. One of the most obvious of these is in regard to special committees. Intent of the act was to prohibit all special committees except by a two-thirds vote in an emergency. The act specifically
gives the standing committees appropriations and personnel with ghich to conduct special investigations.

Some "worthless fellows" de-
spised Saul and refused to recognize spised Saul and refused to recognize
him as king. The urge of the flesh to destroy them was aggravated by their own unworthiness. Some
wanted to put them to death for wanted to put them to death for
their disloyalty to the king, but Saul in true kingly spirit, and recogniz-
ing that he reigned by the good ing that he reigned by the good
grace of the Lord, decreed that
there was to be no revenge, but there wa
rejoicing
The story which we touch on so
briefly here is one that teaches the

God. Saul began well, but before long
