Because influenza (flu) usually not life threatening in healthy individuals and most people recover fully, health officials emphasize the use of vaccine for the elderly and people with other health pro-

## Artificial Vision For Blind

## (Due to Reduced Staff)

The possibility of providing sightless people with a function-
ing visual sense has for decades ing visual sense has for decades
held the interest of vision scientists. Among investigators actively pursuing this goal is a team headed by Richard Alan Normann, Ph.D., a bioengineer at the University of Utah. Dr. Normann, professor of ophthalmology, is developing an electrode array that will allow electrical signals from a miniaturized television camera to
stimulate the visual centers of the brain. He reported at a Research to Prevent Blindness science meeting that the tiny camera would be mounted on an eyeglass frame. It would send video signals to a series of minuscule, needle-like elec-
trodes implanted into the rodes implanted into the brain region where images are creat-
According to Dr. Normann, a
relatively large number of electrodes, 625 to 1024, will be needed to achieve a useful
visual sense. However, at this visual sense. However, at this
early stage, the Utah team is early stage, the Utah team is

having 100 electrodes projecting out of a silicon microchip. The chip is so tiny that thirteen such
