**Faster Growth** 



Science may have uncovered another secret leading to faster plant growth with profound implications for farmers. Corn (left) sprinkled with water containing a tiny amount of the antibiotic, terramycin, grew taller faster than same seeds in untreated soil (right). Experiments conducted by Dr. Louis G. Nickell in the Brooklyn laboratories of Chas. Pfizer & Co. showed that as little as one part terramycin to one million parts of water make more seeds sprout into plants. Here, after three and one-half weeks, terramycin-treated corn averages 17.45 inches in height, while untreated corn is 14 inches high. Corn sprinkled with terramycin-spiked water also was found to be heavier both wet and after removal of all water.

#### November Is Deadline Month for Mulching

Most farm gardeners know that November is the deadline month in most areas for mulching the garden plot. In many farm-home gardens, a soft blanket of granular mineral will be used to give this protection.

When the gardener is cozy in his house this winter, this protective material will keep plants in good condition and ready for cultivation in the spring.

The material is vermiculite, containing countless tiny air cells that insulate and protect plants in severe weather.

It protects against rapid or severe temperature changes, which often threaten bushes, plants, and shrubs in cold areas. It also guards them against over-soaking by melting snow or rain on mild days in winter and early spring.

Terra-Lite, as vermiculite is called by the Zonolite company, Chicago, is poured from its bag to the ground. For good mulching, it is advisable to clear away the soil about 12 inches in each direction from the root and about an inch deep.

#### DDT Residual Effect In Soil Is Proved

Recent research by the U.S. Department of Agriculture shows that a single application of DDT to the soil will kill some species of bugs and grubs for at least a five-year period.

Tests conducted in several locations in the northeastern states show an average DDT carryover in turf of 92 per cent after two years, of 43 per cent after four years, 36 per cent after six years, and 29 per cent after seven years' time.

Bug experts also found that the rate of application had little influence on the percent of toxic residue in the soil. Soil samples treated at the rate of 25 to 50 pounds of DDT per acre, show the percentage carryover after eight years of testing was about the same in either case. The difference was minimum.

Tests with different soil types prove that DDT lasts longer in poor soils; a shorter time in soils high in organic matter. Results of experiments with samples of 85 different soil types from seven states showed that persistence of DDT was about the same in sandy, silt, or clay loams, but much greater in soils heavy in sand content.

After analyzing 223,000 Japanese beetle grubs it was found that DDT began losing its killing power

#### only in the fifth year after application. A single DDT treatment at 25 pounds per acre produced a 98 per cent grub kill within four weeks after the grubs were put in the soil, during the first four years. It required slightly more than five weeks for the same kill the fifth year.




