## Banquet Scheduled Friday Night

Congressmen, State Representatives and Legislators expected to attend include: Congressmen, Bill Sarpalius, Senator John Montford, Senator Teel Bivins, Representative Pete Laney, Representative Warren Chisum, Representative "Buzz" Robnett, and Representative Delwin Jones.

A number of other dignitaries both out of town and locally are expected to be in attendance also.

A number of awards will be given including: Business Of The Year, Farm Family Of The Year, Employee Of The Year, Woman Of The Year, and Man Of The Year.

The Blackwater Valley Soil and Conservation District will also present their annual Conservationist Of The Year Award. State Senators and Representatives in attendance will announce the award winners and present the awards to them.

Winners for Business and Employee Of The Year will come from the Chamber's monthly selection for the previous year.

The Employee Of The Year will also be taken from the Employee of the Month recipients of the previous year.

## Muleshoe City Council Has Lengthy Agenda

Muleshoe City Council met Tuesday morning in the Council Chambers of the City Hall.

The first item of business was the approval of the minutes of the February 17 meeting.

Cara Juan Schuster met with the council to give a report on the Heritage Foundation. She stated that they now have security lights at the Heritage Foundation. "We now have the original light fixtures, all 32 of them, for the Old Janes Ranch House," Mrs. Schuster said. "Some of them are in need of repairs, but ours slogan is Patience, and Persistence. We appreciate the County for the use of trustees at the foundation." Mayor Darrell Turner stated that money has been set aside from the Motel Tax for the Foundation this year.

Frank Goodman, General Telephone Company, met with the council to inform the council of on-going projects and discuss the Franchise Agreement.

## GPCPN Helps Farmers, Ranchers Protect Soil

The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) was passed by Congress in 1956. It is a voluntary program that has helped many farmers and ranchers protect their

soil from erosion. A GPCP contract allows producers to apply a complete conservation system that meets the needs of the producer as well as the needs of the land.

Through this program, a producer develops a long-range conservation plan on the entire operating unit with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service. The conservation plan serves as the basis for applying to total conservation treatment on the farm or ranch. The SCS provides the technical assistance to producers in the installation and maintenance of all conservation practices. In a GPCP contract management items are just as important as the cost shared jobs.

The length of a contract varies

according to the length of time needed to carry out and establish all of the scheduled conservation practices.

The period of any contract shall not exceed 10 years but must be at least for a period of three years. A GPCP contract is a legal contract.

Producers are expected to fulfill their contract by completing each job as planned. However a contract can be modified under specific circumstances. Contract payments do not depend on annual appropriations.

Money for the entire contract is set aside at the time the contract is signed. Cost share is paid to the producer as they complete each step of the plan. Producers receive 50

Judge Marilyn Cox gave the history of Bailey County, stating that Bailey county was formed in 1876, from Bexar Territory, and was organized as a county in 1917. Bailey County was attached to Castro County for two years. The county was named for Peter James Bailey, a young Tennessee lawyer who died at the Alamo.

E.K. Warren and sons used the Johnson Ranch for headquarters. The place soon became known as the Muleshoe Ranch and they began using the mule shoe brand, which they called the U.Bar.

The old Muleshoe Ranch headquarters is about four miles west of the present day Muleshoe near FM 1760.

The Santa Fe Railroad wanted to build a "track from Farwell to Lubbock." E.K. Warren gave permission. When building the road, the Santa Fe asked where the people would like the shipping pens...and that was why...or rather...the beginning of the town of Muleshoe.

The city of Muleshoe is a part of the county and covers most of the Muleshoe Ranch. The land was secured from E.K. Warren by warranty deed dated September 29, 1876.

## Host Families Needed For Exchange Students

Spanish Heritage, a student exchange program, is seeking local host families for boys and girls from Spain and Mexico, 15 to 18 years of age, coming to this area for the upcoming high school year. These personable and academically select exchange students speak English, are bright, curious and anxious to learn about this country through living as a part of a family, attending high school and sharing their own culture and language with their newly adopted host family.

The students are sponsored by Spanish Heritage, a not-for-profit, public benefit organization dedicated to promoting the Spanish language and Hispanic culture in the United States and Canada, and the languages and cultures of the USA and Canada in Spain and Mexico. At the same time, Spanish Heritage promotes closer ties of friendship between these countries. In the United States, Spanish Heritage is a member of the International Exchange Association (IEA) and its programs are conducted in accordance with the standards established by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET).

The exchange students arrive from their home country shortly before school begins and return at the end of the school year. Each Spanish Heritage student is fully insured, brings his or her own personal spending money, and expects to bear his or her share of household responsibilities, as well as being included in normal family activities and lifestyles.

The students are well screened and qualified by Spanish Heritage. Families may select the youngster of their choice from extensive students applications, family photos, and biographical essays. Student and families are encouraged to begin corresponding prior to the student's arrival.

Spanish Heritage is also seeking local high school students to become Spanish Heritage exchange

students abroad. Students should be between 15 to 18 years old and interested in living with a host family, attending school, and learning about the lands and peoples of Spain. Students should have a good academic record and desire to experience another culture and language through living with a warm and giving volunteer family. Academic year and shorter summer vacation programs are available.

## AARP Group Meets

Friday, February 28 at 12 noon, the Muleshoe chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons met in the Bailey County Civic Center with about 25 attending. Sammie Ethridge who presided introduced 5 visitors.

Alma Fay Carter, District Director of the organization from Littlefield was introduced to the group by Sammie Ethridge. Carter spoke about the rising costs of medical care.

She passed out a payment record for Health Insurance Policies form that is useful in helping members keep track of the various medical payments that they face when they experience extended medical treatment for a disease or illness.

Carter encouraged AARP members to itemize and date all hospital and emergency room services and to keep track of all medicine that they are administered during a hospital stay.

Keeping track of the doctor called, dates of service and amount of charges is crucial these days to keep ahead of possible confusion that results from having medical treatment.

Carter also recommends keeping track of what is paid by the patient, amount of medicine costs, other insurance, out of pocket costs, addresses of insurance companies, record of supplemental health policies, premiums owed. She advises keeping detailed notes on every aspect of the treatment and recording all prescriptions that the doctor recommends.

"Many Americans are living now with no insurance because of the high cost of it. But, everyone needs insurance."

With the new medical program being recommended to congress, \$84 billion more will be needed to enact it. This will come from U.S. tax payers.

Regarding long term care, many are agreeing that without insurance "we can't afford it." Carter advises AARP members to be aware of the medical cost situation and watch the news. She says members should know what to say to senators and representatives.

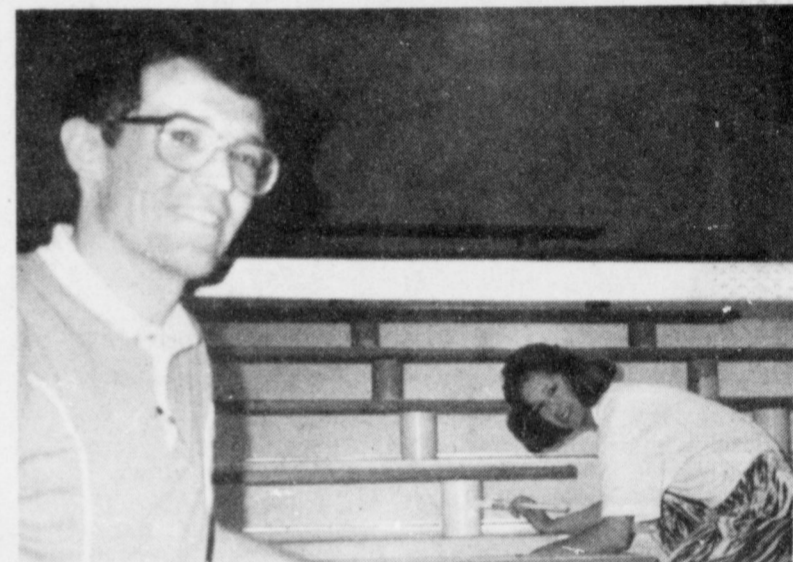

The Muleshoe and Northern Texas Railway Company laid the foundation for the settlement of this county and ultimately provided the incorporated town. On February 11, 1918, 76 persons signed the first successful petition to organize Bailey county as a self-governing entity. The county became independent from Castro County shortly thereafter and its officials occupied the courthouse which was constructed in its present location on Ruby Plaza in 1925.

Bailey County is approximately 900 square miles in area, being roughly 30 miles square. It contains the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge, which was the first and is the largest in Texas, consisting of 5,809.1 acres. It was established by Executive Order of President Roosevelt on October 24, 1935. The refuge is well known for the thousands of sandhill cranes that winter here each year.

Bailey County is also the home of the National Mule Memorial, the only monument of its kind in the world

Bailey County is mainly an agriculture county with feeder cattle, dairy cows, cotton, wheat, grain sorghum, corn, potatoes pumpkins, and various vegetables being the major commodities.

In concluding her speech, Mrs. Cox stated "What I would really like to see is one of the first members of the commissioners court. What I'd really like is to see Josh Blocker. 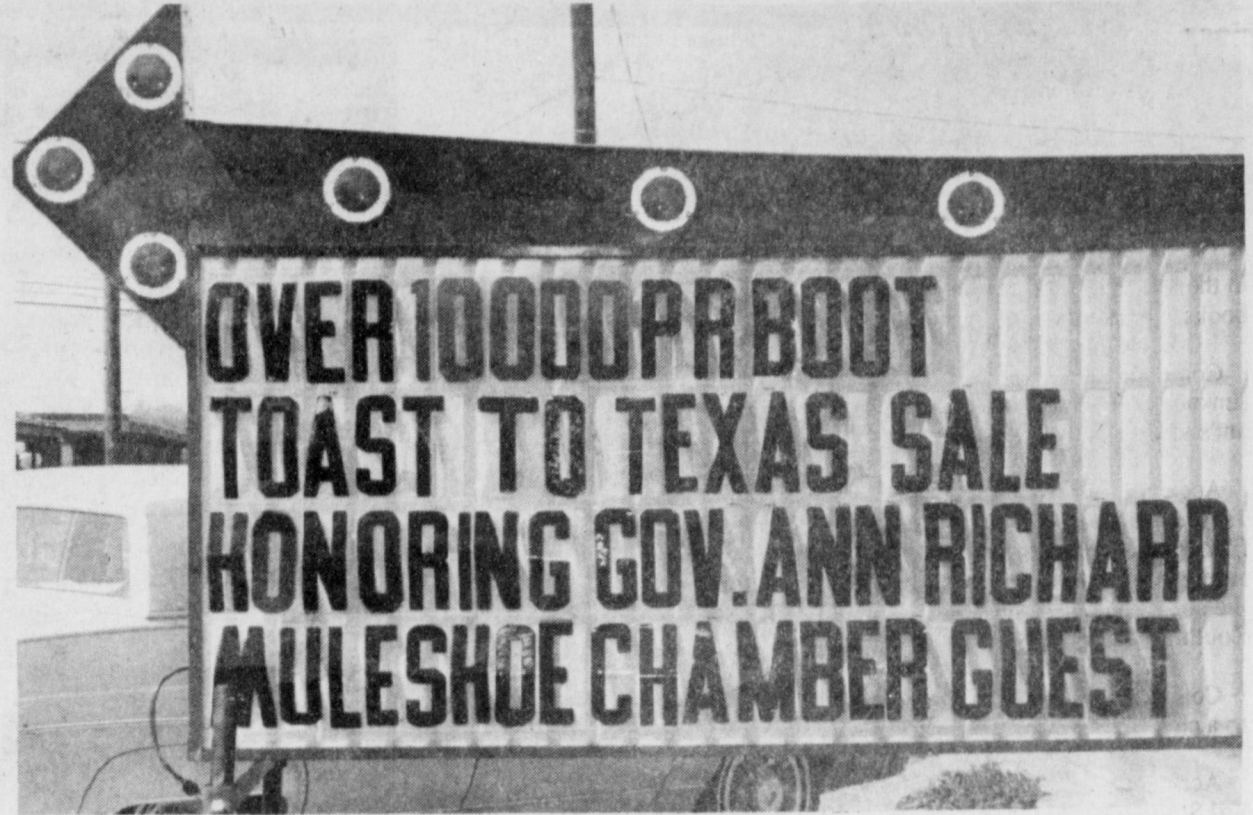

## COMMON DRUGS MAY HAVE NEW USES

Common drugs already in use may some day be given to pregnant women or to babies at birth to prevent brain damage.

Drugs such as phenobarbital and indomethacin may stop fluctuating blood flow in the brains of premature infants, said Dr. Jan Goddard-Finegold, a pediatric neurologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Such irregular blood flow can lead to problems like cerebral palsy, blindness, seizures or mental retardation.

Goddard-Finegold is studying the effects of these drugs on these drugs on blood flow.
